





The rest was for the marines at their jungle airstrip at Chu Ten hours after take-off, we landed at Wake Island. Our

We parked between dull green and brown combat planes and silver transports which dwarfed our four-engined craft. After fueling and reading weather maps, we climbed aboard. Then a refueler asked us for a stateside newspaper. We found a several-days-old Los Angeles paper, and four Navymen under a light pole eagerly divid-ed news from home.

We took off for Guem. It was cold in the air, and blan-

kets came into use. Six bours brought us to Guam at dawn. ## International **Postal Rates**

An increase in international surface and air mail rates went into effect Monday, May Postmaster Ross Hodges announced today.

The new international rates, he said, will not apply to mailings for members of the Forces overseas. Demestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's.

The rate increases for both surface and airmail - averiging 13 per cent — were first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed on March 1. The Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail oper-
