College Students Are Asked To Send Data To Draft Board

The state director of Texas draft boards has advised nearly 100,000 draft-age college and university undergraduates classified in Class II-S to take action before the end of the spring semester on an "important matter for their possible benefit."

Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, urged these students to request their college or university registrars to send their class standings for the 1966-67 school year to their local boards as soon as these standings are available after the spring semester ends.

"If these class standings are not sent in for the 1966-67 school year, it is likely that a lot of these students will get reclassified into Class I-A next fall just because their draft boards don't have this information," the state draft director said.

"Some colleges and universities will report these class standings with out requests from the students," he continued, "but others will do it only when the student asks that it be done."

Because class standings were not sent in on many college students in Class II-S during the summer of 1966 for the 1965-66 school year, approximately a third of them in Texas were reclassified into Class I-A.

"Eventually nearly all of these were restored to Class II-S," Colonel Schwartz said "because they took steps to get the class standings upon reclassification, but some had to undergo the armed forces physical-mental examination, and some got orders to report for induction into the armed services before the certificates for class standing reached their local boards."

College and university registrars will be able to report the class standings during the summer after all grades are reported and compared.

The standings are reported to local boards by the registrars on Selective Service Forms Nos. 109 or 109-A, or on forms designed by the colleges and universities themselves.

Class standings are not reported on graduate students and students of professions such as medicine, dentistry, and law. Only satisfactory or unsatisfactory performance is reported on these.

May 17 Deadline For Applicants

AUSTIN—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced that the deadline for applying for the new cadet-warden force is May 17.

The period from May 15 through May 17 was designated for processing young men seeking to qualify for the 50 positions created to beef up the summer water patrol.

Robert G. Mauermann, Deputy Executive Director for the Department, said the response has been such that it might be desirable for some of the cadet candidates to report either May 16 or 17 to avoid "a long line" on opening day.

The applicants will be interviewed and tested at the Department's five regional offices at La Porte, Rockport, Waco, Tyler and San Angelo. Those tentatively accepted will be screened further by written examination plus the standard tests as to character, habits and previous employment.

Successful cadet candidates must agree to accept employment as a game warden trainee with beginning appointment effective September, immediately after the summer cadet program has been terminated.

This requirement, according to the Department, precludes applications by such as college students seeking summer jobs.

The cadets will be used on mobile teams assigned to Texas waterways that now are patrolled by the Department under the new water safety law.

They will be used primarily in a boat maintenance-operation capacity and serve on location under a regularly commissioned state game warden.

The pay will be \$397 per month from June 1 through August 31 and the cadets will be issued one-piece, "flight suit" duty-clothing.

They must be between 21 and 30 years of age, must have a high school education or the equivalent and be able to pass rigid physical examinations, particularly as to eyesight so vital in service of this nature.

Information to be presented will include various methods of freezing and proper packaging of fruits, vegetables, meats, and prepared foods. Interested homemakers in the county are encouraged and invited to attend and participate in the workshop.

**Over 3 1/2 Million In SS Benefits Paid In County**

Some \$3,593,928 in social security benefits was paid to residents of Eastland County last year, up 5.7 percent from the year before.

At the end of 1966, 4,774 men, women, and children in Eastland County were receiving benefits at a monthly rate of \$299,494, R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, reported today. 4,915 were older people, he said, receiving benefits as retired workers, the wives and husbands of retired workers and as the surviving widows or aged dependent parents of workers who have died.

"But social security is not just for older people," Tuley pointed out. 395 young widows and children in Eastland County were receiving benefits amounting to \$20,050 at the end of December. 364 disabled workers and dependents were receiving benefits at a monthly rate of \$24,961.

Texas totals were \$68,178, 136 going monthly to 1,038,955 persons. The national figures were \$1,638,548,392 to 22,767,252 persons.

Practically every young family in Eastland County has survivors protection under social security that can be worth up to \$75,000 or more, and equally valuable disability insurance protection.

Monthly payments to the family of a worker who dies, leaving 2 or more children, can range from \$66 to \$368 a month, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security.

Social Security survivors benefits, Tuley said, can be paid to the family of a young man who has worked and paid social security contributions for as little as a year and a half during the three years before his death.

Benefits to the mother and children continue until the youngest child reaches 18, or indefinitely, if the child has a disability which began before his 18th birthday and makes it impossible for him to work and become self-supporting.

Under a change in the law enacted in 1965, a child benefits can be continued up until age 22 if he or she continues in school, and is unmarried.

"As pointed out in testimony before the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives in hearings on changes in the law now being considered," Tuley added, "the financing of the social security system allows for increases in the benefit level as earnings rise in the future without any change in the contribution rates."

Comparing social security's retirement and survivor coverage for persons past age 65 to the state old-age assistance program, he noted that out of each 1,000 such Texans, 757 received social security and 256 received old-age assistance. The national ratio was 822 on social security and 116 on old-age assistance per 1,000 persons over age 65.

New Hampshire, with 892 of each 1,000 that age on social security, had the highest rate, while Louisiana, with 455 of each 1,000 aged on assistance, was high in that category.

# Warning Is Issued On Proper Fish Cooking

Persons eating fish caught in Eastland County ponds and lakes should be extremely careful to see that the meat has been cooked long enough and at high enough temperatures to insure killing of tapeworm larvae, Dr. R. C. Ferguson, County Health Director, reports.

Specimen of channel catfish caught at Lake Leon sent to the State Department of Health laboratory were found to contain larvae of tapeworm, Dr. Ferguson of Eastland reports.

In a statement released Friday, Dr. Ferguson said that Mr. Carl Timmons of Eastland first brought the matter to his attention and asked that the fish be examined. The Health Officer sent the liver of a channel cat which Mr. Timmons had caught and which he had suspected of not being well.

The Director of Laboratories reported to Dr. Ferguson as follows:

"We performed a direct microscopic examination on the cat fish liver for acid-fast bacilli, however, none were seen. The cyst contained larvae of a tapeworm which appears to be of the general type, Diphylobothrium. As you are well aware, there are hundreds of species of Diphylobothrium and it would be virtually impossible to determine exactly

which one this is. Theoretically it would be impossible for the cysts to be located throughout the tissues."

Dr. Ferguson explained that the acid-fast bacilli test was a tuberculosis strain, and as shown was found to be negative.

Mr. Timmons reports that from 50 to 60 percent of the channel cat that he has caught this year, he believed to have been infected with the tapeworms. However, no signs have been observed by him in the yellow cat, crappie or bass, he said.

It isn't known for sure whether fish caught in other lakes and ponds have the tapeworms or not, Dr. Ferguson said.

He suggested that persons should expose cooking fish to high temperatures for at least 20 minutes and perhaps longer, depending on the thickness of the meat, in order to kill the tapeworm larvae.
