Grand Jury Suggests Repairs To Buildings

Remodeling of the Eastland County jail and courthouse and more plans to facilitate the work of grand juries were recommendations of the Grand Jury of the 91st Judicial District Court's April term handed to Judge Frank Sparks Monday.

In two letters to Judge Sparks, the grand jury's recommendations were as follows:

"We the grand jurors of the 91st Judicial District Court April term, 1967, unanimously recommend to the Commissioners' Court that they inspect the courthouse and jail and make such repairs as they find are needed for the care and preservation of said buildings. We particularly call attention to the damages caused by water to the 91st District Court quarters."

The second letter: "Inasmuch as we, the grand jury, have been in session on three occasions during this term of our service and have done a very minimum of work, we urge and recommend that all witnesses be subpoenaed and present and that the docket be planned prior to the meetings of this or the next grand jury called to session so that we may more efficiently function."

Both letters were signed by W. C. Smith, foreman. The letters were filed by Judge Sparks in the District Court's office.

THE TEXAS Senate and House have under consideration bills that spell out the law under which optometrists are permitted to advertise their wares. These bills came up because the State Board of Optometry recently ruled that all optometric advertising would be stopped.

Freedom to advertise is a privilege every business and every individual should enjoy. It is a privilege that raises America high above all other countries in the world. And it is just as much a freedom as any other freedom.

It is the people who benefit most from advertising. Take away advertising and you eliminate competition. And competition makes for better prices for the public.

Many businesses, including that of optometry, have discovered and enjoyed the benefits of advertising. More Americans wear glasses as a consequence of advertising. More and more people pay attention to their eyes as a result of advertising.

If Senate Bill 423 and House Bill 933 are not passed, the professional services which these advertising firms offer will no longer be available. Optometrists who advertise will be no more. The cost of eye glasses could very well skyrocket in some areas.

If this should happen, other boards, bureaus and commissions who want to eliminate competition may try the same thing. Advertising of all types soon could be a thing of the past. And this shouldn't be allowed to happen in a free country.

EVER SO OFTEN we get an inquiry as to whether or not medical doctors can advertise. The answer is yes and no.

The executive director of the Texas Medical Association puts it thusly: "Solicitation of patients is prohibited. But advertising of all other kinds is fully acceptable." This is the medical code — not a law. The purpose is to prohibit boasts about one's outstanding qualifications or superior ability.

It's fully permissible, for example, for a doctor to join with other business men in and out of the profession to sponsor a page ad paying tribute to the accomplishments of some local group, club, team, etc. In fact, this is encouraged. But six on any type of ad that boasts of ability to cure.

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THE GORDON SPOT

Tuesday, May 16, is the date for the annual Eastland County Pecan Growers field day. If you have any interest in pecan production we hope you are making plans to be present.

The program will start at 9:30 in the Paramount Hotel in Ranger. Two outstanding horticulturists, Tom Demman of Stephenville and George Madden of Brownwood will be on the program. After lunch the group will move to the Freeman orchard in the Chaney Community.

Now is the time to start spraying pecan trees to control the pecan nut casebearer. Based on studies made by Demman, Madden and observations in Eastland County we have set the spraying dates for May 15th through the 20th. These are the dates we estimated in last weeks column. We not have more information to vary these dates.

Growers in Brown County started spraying last week, a few days of May which delayed the development of case bearers here and in Stephenville.

If you want to time the application exactly check for eggs and nut penetrations Monday, May 15. If the infestations seems very light wait until about Wednesday to spray. The eggs are usually found on the dark brown tips of the young pecans. These eggs which are just visible to the naked eye, are greenish white when they are deposited but assume a reddish appearance in a few days. When the pecans have been penetrated you will be able to see some dark material near the base of the nut.

If as many as three pecans in one hundred have been penetrated you should start spraying with a mixture that contains Malathion and one other insecticide such as Sevin, D.D.T. or Toxaphene. Malathion has a quick kill power, but a short residual. The other insecticides have a longer residual.

Due to the delayed development of some of the casebearers it may take two applications to do an effective job. If you spray twice I would suggest spraying early in the week and spraying again between May 25th and May 30th.

A new service is available to pecan growers. This service is a zinc analysis of pecan leaves to determine if zinc is needed or if that applied is adequate. The leaf samples should be collected

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in June and mailed to the Soil Testing Laboratory at College Station. The fee is \$2 per sample.

The growers will receive a report which will indicate as to whether or not the level of zinc is adequate or inadequate. It will give suggestions as to applications of zinc.

At the present time we recommend applying zinc sulfate as a spray once each year. The zinc sulfate can be added to the spray mixture when pecans are sprayed for casebearers control.

Form ASCS 406 Has Been Mailed To All County Wheat Producers

Form ASCS 406 has been mailed to all wheat producers who did not sign up to participate in the 1967 wheat program, according to Jesse G. Meredith, office manager of Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The ASCS office needs to know the wheat acreage on farms for the purpose of establishing future wheat allot-

ments, Mr. Meredith said. Failing to furnish this information will result in a reduction in future wheat allotments, he added.

Producers who have signed to divert acreage under the feed grain or cotton program are reminded that no crop can be harvested and no grazing is permitted between April 30 and Nov. 1, according to the ASCS office.

Failure to divert intended acreage or stay within permitted acreage will cause a drastic reduction in payments. In order to be eligible for price support payments on cotton and feed grain on permitted acreage the crop must be planted and worked in a workmanlike manner, Mr. Meredith said.

He added that since planting time for peanuts is almost here, every farmer should check carefully the 1967 allotment notice to prevent over-planting. In many cases it will be smaller than

for 1966 due to the limited acreage under the release and reapportionment provision.

June 23 is the final date set to aerial spray mesquite, Mr. Meredith stated. Funds are currently available for cost-share on this practice, he added.

The 1967 support price for wool is 66 cents per pound and the support price for mohair is 76.4 cents per pound, according to the ASCS office. Original sales documents should promptly be furnished the ASCS office upon com-

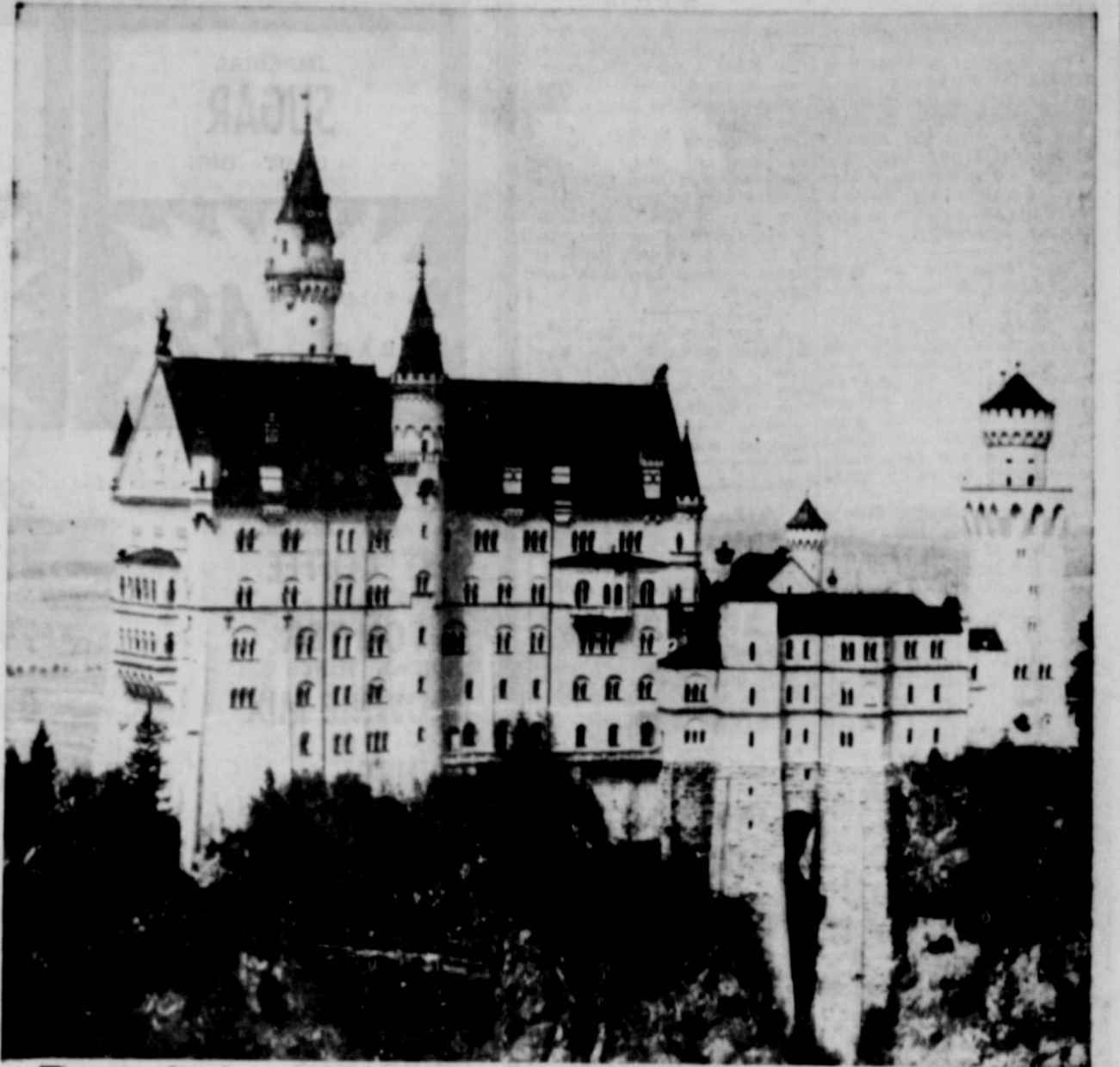

A wealth of new material in Drama Club this year created new talent awards presented by Bill Askew.

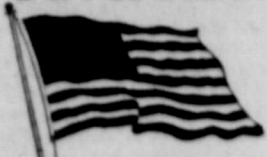
