Mrs. W. M. Choate, former resident of Ranger, died at 9:50 p. m. Wednesday in a Breckenridge hospital.

Funeral was held at 2:30 p. m. Friday in Satterwhite Chapel of Grace with burial in Pioneer Cemetery.

Born Aug. 14, 1879, she married William Choate on Dec. 10, 1899. He died Sept. 7, 1959. The couple moved to Ranger in 1920 where they resided until moving to South Bend, where she made her home until moving to Breckenridge three years ago.

Walton Speaks At RJC's Annual Commencement Program May 25

Marker to Honor Pioneer Doctor, Early Settler

The Texas Historical Survey Committee will dedicate the marker, Pioneer Physician, at the grave of the late Dr. J. D. Windham in the Tecumseh Cemetery, 20 miles south of Clyde, on Sunday, May 28, at 3 p. m., according to an announcement here.

Dr. Windham was born on Feb. 13, 1816, and died January 11, 1901. He was the first practicing physician in Brown County in 1865. He moved west to Callahan County in 1874 and established a truly needed outpost at Tecumseh. He owned a general store and the only post office for miles around.

A school house was soon built and school teachers were carefully investigated and, it was said, "the wilds began learning reading, writing and arithmetic." Children came for miles and miles, some on horseback and some walked.

The name, Tecumseh, it was said, was because the place was the burial location of the once famous Indian chief, Tecumseh.

Ezra Windham Preslar, a granddaughter of the late Dr. Windham, said that many friends and relatives had asked her to make this announcement as many Eastland County people would want to attend the dedication.

Ranger Teachers Are Recipients Of Scholarships

Bill Askew, Ranger High School Speech and English teacher and James Childress, High School Principal and Chemistry teacher, have received scholarships for summer study.

Mr. Askew will study under the American Studies Program at Abilene Christian College in Abilene. This program was begun in 1957 with the aid of a grant from the Coe Foundation of New York City.

Mr. Childress will study advanced chemistry under the National Science Foundation Program at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth. This program was begun in 1958 with funds appropriated through the National Defense Education Act and sponsored by the National Science Foundation in Washington D. C.

Dr. Walton has been listed in Who's Who in America since 1952.

He is past president of the Oil Belt Teacher's Association, Texas Association of Student Personnel Administrators, Texas Council of Church Related Colleges and the Regional Board of Girl Scouts.

Active in the Rotary Club, he was District Governor, district 579, 1957-58, and delegate to the international convention in Detroit in 1959. In 1957, he was again delegate to the convention in Lucerne, Switzerland, and in 1958 to Lausanne. He is past president of the Ranger and Abilene Rotary Clubs.

He served as a 2nd Lieutenant in the infantry during World War I.

Born in Mansfield, Texas, he married Juanita Tubbs of Canadian and they have two children, a daughter, Fleur, who teaches in Los Angeles Junior College and a son, Travis, who is an electrical engineer in Alexandria, Va.

THE GORDON SPOT

If you sprayed your pecan trees between May 15 and 20 you should have gotten good control of the nut casebearer. We inspected trees every day last week and found that the casebearers were hatching from the eggs and entering the nuts. Many trees we looked at had no casebearer eggs or damaged pecans. This indicates that the amount of infestation is very light this year. However, in orchards where we found the insects they were found in large numbers.

During the pecan field day last Tuesday we found plenty of casebearer eggs and damaged nuts in Ben Freeman's and Chester Murr's orchard located in the Chaney Community. They were spraying their trees Tuesday which seemed to be the optimum time for that orchard.

Twenty five people attended the spring field day of the County Pecan Growers last Tuesday in Ranger. Tom Denman did an excellent job of discussing the nut-casebearer and other pecan insects. Tom is a horticulturist at the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station near Stephenville.

The proper use of D-Syston, a systemic insecticide to control aphids, was discussed. Tom said there were many reports of the improper use of this material. This insecticide is applied in the ground underneath the trees and should only be applied by a qualified person.

After the morning session, the Commercial State Bank of Ranger sponsored a luncheon at the Paramount Hotel in Ranger for those attending.

Have you ever seen large, high quality peaches that ripened by May 15 in this area?

Tom Denman brought four boxes of ripe peaches with him to the field day Tuesday. He sent two boxes home with Bob Walsh so that he could show them on his WBAF-TV program. Another box was sent to Texas House Speaker, Ben Barnes, and the fourth box was passed out to the folks attending the field day. Most everyone said they were the best early peaches they have ever eaten.

This is a new variety released only last year. The name of this variety is Spring Gold. Peaches of this quality would be worth a lot of money around May 15.

In Past Year ... Local Interests Invested \$5 Million In Land Improvement

"State and local interests contributed \$5 million in funds and services to soil and water conservation districts in Texas last year," according to a report released recently by H. N. Smith, Soil Conservation Service State Conservationist, Temple.

"Cities, counties, State government, special purpose districts, individuals, and private groups are supporting conservation districts more than ever before," Smith noted.

"This indicates public approval of the way conservation districts are fulfilling their vital and changing responsibilities. These include: protecting water supplies; reducing pollution to streams, rivers and lakes by sediment; helping solve land use problems in rural and rural-urban fringe areas; reducing erosion of farmlands, non-farm lands, and roadsides; and improving recreational and wildlife opportunities."

Non-Federal contribution last year included \$2.6 million to speed up watershed work, \$5 million to help layout and install conservation measures, \$1 million for informational, educational, and other local activities, and \$53,000 for making soil surveys for urban uses.

"SCS resources are much more effective when financial and other help are given conservation districts by State and local sources," Smith said. "We, therefore, encourage conservation districts to use all resources available to help conserve and develop natural resources."

Smith said the fact that every State in the Nation appropriated money last year for soil and water conservation districts reflects the wide spread support they are getting from the public.

Life stated Texas was second only to California in the amount of non-Federal conservation assistance.

Pilot Escapes As Navy Jet Crashes In County

A U. S. Navy F-8 Crusader crashed and burned on the old Harris place six miles north of Rising Star at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday. Lt. Jim Mc-

Laughlin the pilot parachuted to safety and was uninjured. He was from Naval Air Station, Dallas.

The pilot told investigators that his engine failed (flamed out) at 46,000 feet. He was unable to re-start the jet engine and when the plane reached 3,000 feet, he ejected and parachuted to safety. The pilot landed in a pasture some two miles from the wreckage.

The airplane glided down in an upright position, plowing a path through oak trees for some 200 yards before hitting the ground. It caught fire and burned on the ground. Two small fires were started by the plane but they were extinguished without apparent damage.

Lt. Paul B. Porter and a

five-team rescue team went to the crash scene from Dyess Air Force Base, and a huge four-engine rescue plane, also from Dyess AF Base, showed up an circled at about 200 feet until the pilot was located and picked up and the fire fighters arrived at the crash site. The big plane apparently directed early operations from the air.

The Foy Warlick home was narrowly missed by the falling airplane, which came to a stop about 500 feet away.

Highway Patrolmen B. C. Rivers of Eastland and I. A. Chambers of Coleman handled the traffic in the area. Numerous cars brought people to the scene, including officers, ambulances and others seeking to determine whether they could help.

The airplane was a total loss. The F-8 Crusader is a Navy fighter plane and some of the older models are used for training purposes. They cost more than a million dollars.

Five Negro Women Are Held In Jail After Arrest on Shoplifting Charges

Five Negro women from Fort Worth were being held in Eastland County Jail today on charges of shoplifting, according to Sheriff Lefty Sublett.

The five were arrested in Weatherford about 9:15 p. m. Tuesday night after a Ranger business man suspected them and sounded the alarm. They were arrested by Highway Patrolman Bill Pruitt and two Weatherford city policemen, Sheriff Sublett said.

In the car were 115 cartons of cigarettes, one clock radio, two new men's suits, three boxes of spark plugs, and three bottles of scotch.

Sheriff Sublett said 53 cartons of cigarettes were stamped A & P, Eastland, and 62 cartons stamped Safeway but no town's name. Two of the women claimed that all they had in the car was picked up

in Eastland except the scotch which was taken at Hoot's Liquor Store in Ranger. The clock radio and spark plugs were taken from Western Auto, and the suits from Bray's Department Store, the report said.

Sheriff Sublett explained that when someone is picked up in another county on a pick-up order they must be taken before a magistrate there before being brought back. The women were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Pickard in Weatherford and advised of their rights, then brought to Ranger by Sheriff Sublett and Deputy Loy Williams. Appearing before Justice of the Peace M. D. Underwood in Ranger, all five plead guilty to misdemeanor on stealing the scotch. Each was fined \$100 and costs. They were then brought to

Game 'Crop' Is Believed In Good Shape Over State

AUSTIN—This may not be "THE" year for that ranked big time Texas college football team, as bumper stickers acclaim, but it could be a plain lower-case year for the ever-expanding hunting and fishing activity statewide.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game managers, however, in precisely the same compromising pre-season spot as the head coach of any football outfit rated skyward on the basis of "paper prospects."

the fall and winter dry spell have been erased with corresponding benefits for both big and small game, and particularly for game birds. Moisture, so indispensable for ground nesting birds, has reached various areas. Field men relay talk of another favorable year for both quail and doves. Likewise, Texas wild turkey flocks, largest in the nation, have at least attained a good nesting start in many places. In 1966, Texas turkey numbers increased and the harvest showed a substantial gain on the basis of surveys made on the major hunting ranges. The Department noted big game hunters may be heartened by the unexpected high survival rate of the state's huge deer herd. Down in the Rio Grande Valley, white-winged doves have begun to nest but biologists will not have sufficient data to judge hatching prospects until early June. Meanwhile, fisheries people report "they're biting" hopefully assuming that the seasonal angling millions are already reaping a fresh water harvest.

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
