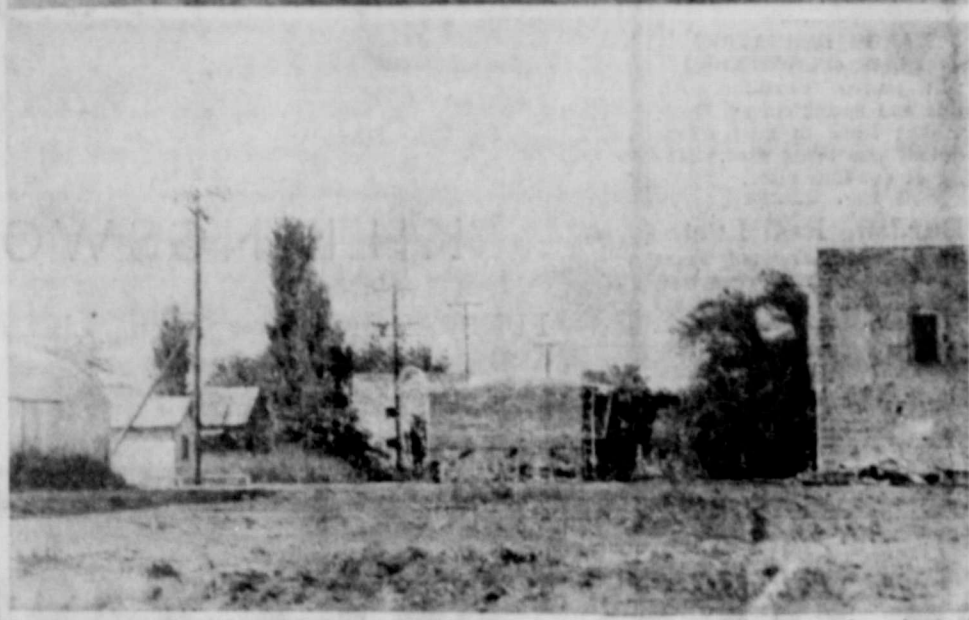
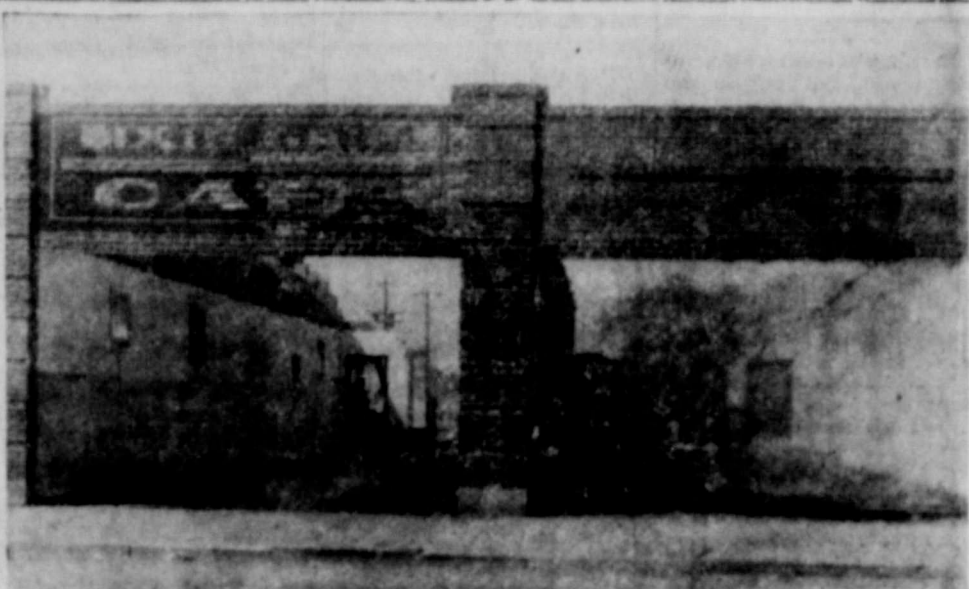

SUMMER HOMEMAKING TO BEGIN JUNE 1st

Summer homemaking work for Ranger High School youth and adults will begin June 1st with a 15-hour short course including clothing construction and crafts. This part of summer course will be completed in five sessions of three hours each, June 1, 2, 5, 6 and 7, from 8 a. m. until 11 a. m. Additional hours may be planned with the homemaking teacher, Mrs. Ruby K. Halbert, to meet individual needs.

Interested adults are asked to bring any pattern and material they would like to work with and subjects to be covered will be determined by their interests. Students are asked to bring a spiral notebook for keeping their goals and records. Applique with rick-rack will be demonstrated and students will have opportunity to choose craft work or clothing construction projects to fit their ability. All this should be brought to the first session, June 1, 8 a. m.

Floyd Ash To Preach For Church Of Christ Gospel Meeting Here

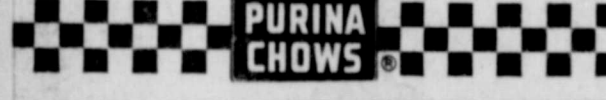

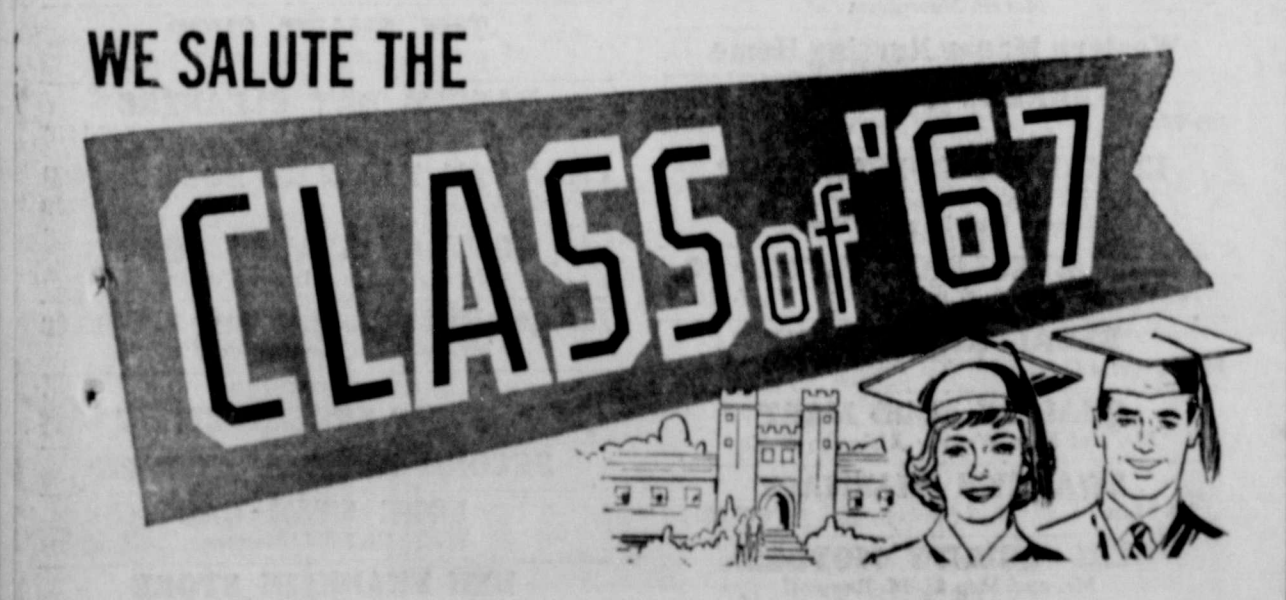

Randell Mahaffey To Attend Nuclear Science Symposium

Randell Mahaffey of 1121 Young Street, a junior student at Ranger High School, has been selected to attend the Seventh Texas Nuclear Science Symposium for High Schools at the University of Texas in Austin, June 11-14.
He will be accompanied to the symposium by Larry Hunt, principal at Hodges Oak Park School.
Sponsors of the symposium are the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the university. The foundation is made up of Texas Electric Service Company and nine other electric power companies in Texas.
Some 500 outstanding science students and their teachers, selected by their schools, will attend the four-day meeting. They will have the opportunity to hear scientists from the fields of both industry and education discuss nu-

clear physics and related topics, according to Mr. Bill Collins, company manager.
A full day will be spent touring the science laboratories at the university. Included will be visits to the experiments being carried on in thermonuclear (fusion) research by the university for the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.
"These experiments are aimed at eventual control of the nuclear reaction which takes place in the hydrogen bomb. When harnessed, the energy released in this nuclear reaction could be used for peaceful purposes, one of which could be the generation of electricity," Collins said.
John Young, representative from the 1th Congressional District of Texas, and a member of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, will speak at the symposium.
Harold B. Finger, associate administrator for organization and management of NASA, also will address the participants. Finger formerly was manager of the Space Nuclear Propulsion Office for the AEC-NASA.
Other noted speakers include Dr. Norman Hæcker, vice chancellor of the university; Dr. J. R. Maxfield Jr., of the Maxfield Clinic and Radiological Center, Dallas; Dr. William Drummond, director of the Center for Plasma Physics and Thermonuclear Research at the university; Dr. Richard E. Wainerdi, head of the Activation Analysis Research Laboratory of Texas A&M; Dr. H. O. Pollak, director of the Mathematics and Statistics Research Center of the Bell Telephone Laboratories, Murray Hill, N. J.

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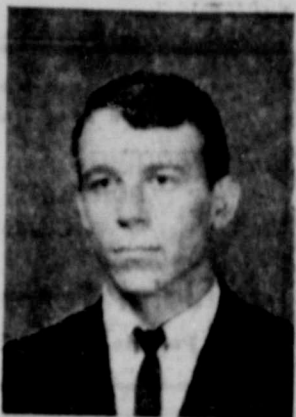

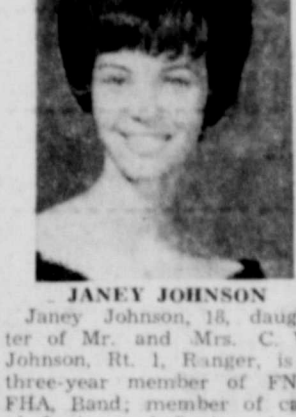

In brief ceremonies at the Capitol building here, Governor Connally received a gold Trimline telephone from Bill Holman, Austin division manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, and a hand-illuminated scroll from Claude H. Gilmer, president of Rock Springs and Nueces Canyon Telephone Company, Rock Springs, and president of the Texas Telephone Association. The presentations were made in behalf of the Texas telephone industry.

In his remarks, Gilmer said that sometime this year, one of the 134 Texas telephone companies will place the state's 5,000,000th telephone in operation.

Gilmer said "Texas' phone growth, particularly during the post-World War II era has been phenomenal." He cited these figures to reflect the pattern of this growth.

At the end of the war there were only 916,775 business and residential phones in service in the state. By 1955, about a decade later, there were 2,550,428 and by 1965 4,503,680.

Since the end of 1965 the total phone figure has climbed to 4,864,590, or more than five times the number in service at the end of World War II.

In 1947, only 54.5 per cent of the state's telephones had been converted from manual to dial service. Since that time, manual service has virtually been eliminated in Texas with 99.99 per cent of the state's telephones now having dial service.

Gilmer said the Texas telephone industry employs more than 36,000 men and women to install, service and maintain the state's sprawling and complex communications system. These employees were paid more than \$195,600,000 in wages and salaries last year to make a sizeable contribution to the economy of the state.

Gilmer who said the Texas telephone industry paid \$35,000,000 in local and state taxes last year, added: "As an employer, taxpayer

State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN—The proposed constitutional amendment to phase out bulk of the state's 47 cents per \$100 valuation property tax levy by 1977 is near legislative approval.

Senate has passed it and the House Constitutional Amendment Committee has recommended it. Proposal would go to the voters in November, 1968.

If measure is approved, all but 10 cents of the state ad valorem tax (that which is earmarked for state college construction) would be wiped out by December 31, 1976.

While this may be cheering news to property owners, it must be noted that the \$47,900,000 in revenue must be made up from other sources.

A new voter registration plan, product of a long study, came out of committee for Senate consideration. It immediately ran into criticism.

Bill would require personal registration with tax assessor-collector or authorized deputy at a public place sometime next year. Voters could register by mail for the big 1968 elections. Once registered in the 1968-69 sign-up, they could renew eligibility by simply signing and mailing back to tax offices a form card between October 1 and January 31 each year. A special supplementary registration period would be held August 15-September 15 during general election years.

Sen. Barbara Jordan of Houston assailed the bill as more restrictive than the present law. She hit sections prohibiting roving deputies and outlawing husbands registering for wives and vice versa. Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells acknowledged he will have a problem passing his measure in the Senate as it stands.

Both houses have passed the bill giving the 17-county Trinity River Authority navigation powers and additional tax authority to further their longtime goal of barge traffic.

Bill by Sen. Charles Wilson of Lufkin and Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine increases tax exemption for long-line trucks and buses. Railroads earlier got an exemption as direct competitors of barges. Counties of TRA are Anderson, Chambers, Dallas, Ellis,

Freestone, Henderson, Houston, Kaufman, Liberty, Leon, Madison, Navarro, Polk, San Jacinto, Tarrant, Trinity and Walker.

Texas' first major occupational safety bill, designed to cut the soaring industrial accident toll, has been signed into law.

It creates within the State Department of Health a division of occupational safety to be administered by a three-member board, assisted by a safety engineer and an advisory committee. Board would conduct a continuing educational, promotional and enforcement campaign.

Bill creating appraisal service districts and boards for tax appraisal and assessment of property for taxations is unconstitutional, as it elimi-

nates county tax assessor-collector from duties. So ruled Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin.

In a variety of other recent opinions, Martin held that: In writing a single-year budget, the Legislature can spend only funds in sight during that year.

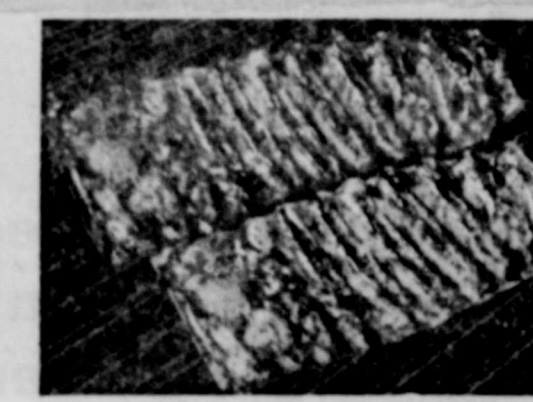
