An all-male jury took 35 minutes Tuesday to find Larry Clark, 21-year old Dallas Negro, guilty of aggravated assault with intent to rape, and his punishment was set by Judge J. Frank Sparks of 91st District Court at 80 years in the state penitentiary.

Clark sat emotionless, but his wife broke into tears as she held their three-year old son as the trial ended Tuesday afternoon.

Court-appointed Counsel W. B. Wright of Cisco quoted scripture in his dramatic closing argument: "In so much as you have done it unto the least of these, then you have done it unto me."

In his close, Wright admitted aggravated assault but denied that intent to rape was evident.

Prosecutor Bill Thomas stressed hard at the fact that the victim was "terrified" and that intent to rape was clearly shown in the actions of the defendant. The jury retired to consider the case at 2:15 p. m. and returned at 2:50 p. m. A charge of burglary against Clark was passed on motion by DA Perry Brown. Bill Lee was jury foreman.

Evidence was presented by County Attorney Perry Brown, assisted by Bill Thomas of Abilene as a special prosecutor, late Monday and Tuesday morning. Judge Frank Sparks was on the bench.

Jury selection in the case began at 1:30 p. m. Monday and by mid-afternoon the sheriff was instructed to go out and bring in more potential jurors. A total of 15 additional tallies was brought in. (Continued on Page 5)

James Davenport Former Countian Buried In Ranger

James Andrew (Jim) Davenport, 87, died at 5:05 a. m. Sunday in a Fort Worth hospital.

Funeral was conducted at 2 p. m. Monday in Killingsworth Funeral Chapel with the Rev. J. Lester Davenport, pastor of First Methodist Church, Eastland, officiating. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Gene Harrison, V. V. Cooper, Felton Brashier, Hall Walker, S. G. Faircloth and W. McCleskey. Born Dec. 8, 1879 in Coryell County, he came to Eastland County in 1895. The son of former Ranger police chief Vol Davenport and Ella Blackstock Davenport, he lived in this area for many years before moving to Fort Worth.

Mr. Davenport had been a rancher and cattle buyer, was a former employe of Terrell Laboratories and Armour Co. both of Fort Worth, and for eight years was chief of police in White Settlement in Tarrant County. He was a member of the Methodist Church and the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. E. F. Latham of Brownfield; one sister, Miss Estelle Davenport of Fort Worth; one grandson, Richard (Dick) Latham of Austin and one niece, Mrs. John Kennedy of Fort Worth.

Memorial Day, 1967, will be remembered as a day of fright for many Eastland Countians as two tornados were reported touching down during a terrific thunderstorm which brought heavy rain, wind and a little hail.

No damage or injuries were reported, but the "scare quotient" was high as many sought the shelter of storm cellars in towns throughout the county.

Power was off in Ranger for about two hours; momentarily in Eastland; and in Cisco for about ten minutes.

A Ranger fire crew sighted the first twister while making a call after lightning struck a transformer on S. Rusk St., dipping down and up about 8:37 p. m. A weather alert out of Abilene had put Ranger on alert at 8:14. The other twister was sighted and confirmed by Ranger police and Eastland County sheriff's officers as touching the ground "two or three miles southwest" of Ranger at 8:45 p. m.

Indications were that the twisters had dropped into open ranges resulting in no damage.

Official Weather Bureau Observer W. J. Greiger at Eastland reported that 79 of an inch of rain fell in Eastland during the Tuesday night weather activity. He reported .69 of an inch from Sunday's rain — which will almost bring the city's total for May up to normal, with the 1.46 this week.

An insurance company man in Eastland reported that he did not believe that there will be enough hail damage in most instances to exceed the deductible because the large hail stones, which were "doo-knob" size in some cases, were so few in number. Hail in Ranger was reported to have been about the same, with a light showering of the bigger stones.

Sheriff L. E. Sublett reported Wednesday morning that he had had no reports of any damage from the weather.

At Cisco, 4 inches of rain fell and power was off for ten minutes. Cisco had light hail that damaged gardens and flowers.

A twister was thought to have touched down on the west side of Lake Leon, hitting somewhere between Highway 570 and the lake, probably in open range country. Eastland Police Department Dispatcher Jack Wood said Highway Patrol units in the area reported.

Wood said the severe storm conditions in the area were such that he thought for a time that he would have to alert the people in Eastland through the siren - warning system, but did not.

A heavy storm was situated between Eastland and Carbon, moving from the southwest, and another storm center was moving from the west toward Cisco and going on north. Hail fell at Eastland up to golf-ball size and heavy hail was believed to have fallen between Eastland and Carbon.

In the face of severe weather conditions, this warning: One long, one short and one long blast will be sounded. In the event that electric power has been interrupted, listen for vehicle sirens.

A 4-H Club project which might be of interest to livestock feeders in the 4-H would be a commercial market steer project. This is a project in which grade steers (5 or 6) are put on feed and records are kept on the amount of feed eaten during the feeding period. From these records such things as pounds of feed per pound of gain, cost of putting 100 lbs. of gain on a calf, and other items of economic and scientific interest could be obtained.

Several livestock shows such as Dallas and Houston

have special shows for commercial steers. In these contests animals are graded and then sold at prices according to how they grade. The Dallas show pays a premium; however, the Houston show sells only at market prices. If you are interested in such a project contact the Asst. County Agent.

\$2.4 Million Paid Non-Farm Workers In County Last Year

About 3,000 workers in Eastland County's nonfarm businesses earned taxable wages under the old-age, survivors, and disability insurance program, according to the latest edition of "County Business Patterns," according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Social Security District Manager in Abilene.

Some 446 reporting units of employers of nonfarm employees covered under the program paid out some \$2.4 million in taxable wages in the county during the first quarter of 1965. The report shows 12 of the employing units reported 50 or more workers at that time. The largest proportion of employment,

751 workers, was in retail trade.

The current edition is the 12th in a series showing county and industry statistics based on wage reports filed under the Federal social security program.

The data are uniform and comparable from State to State and County to County and are shown for many kinds of business under the following broad industry groups: agricultural services, forestry, and fisheries; mining; contract construction; manufacturing; transportation and other public utilities; whole-

sale trade; retail trade; finance, insurance and real estate; and services. The publication shows the number and location of workers, the industries in which they are employed, and how much they are paid in taxable earnings. The publication furnishes businessmen with data to evaluate private demand for both industrial and consumer products, is valuable in analyzing market potentials and establishing advertising and sales programs, in analyzing the industrial structure of regional areas, and in making

base economic studies of small areas.

Reference copies of "County Business Patterns" may be examined at district and branch offices of the Social Security Administration, and at many public libraries. The complete set of 63 books (one for the U. S. as a whole, one for each State, D. C., and Puerto Rico) of "County Business Patterns, 1965," costs \$36.30. The book for Texas sells for \$1.50. Orders should be sent to the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20540.

Game Wardens Give Violation Tickets to 287

Austin — Texas game warden, delegated by the State Legislature to enforce the new water safety code, wrote 287 tickets for assorted violations in that category last month. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reported 234 of 287 such cases filed involving the life preserver, or life jacket, requirement.

Boat operators got 230 citations for failure to have a coast guard approved life saving device for each person aboard.

Four other tickets were issued for operating rent boats without life preservers.

The monthly Department report was issued as water sports fatalities continued at a record pace.

Here are the other boating violation items in the report: Operating motor boat without number displayed, 23; Operating motor boat without registration, 12; Operating motor boat without rear view mirror, while pulling skiers, 6; Operating motor boat without proper lights, 5; Driving boat recklessly or at high rate of speed, 3; No fire extinguishers, 3; Operating motor boat in restricted area, 1.

While enforcing the safety code, the patrolling wardens issued 429 tickets for fishing violations, including 420 for lacking fishing licenses.

But the major fines marked some of the 159 hunting violations. Four men paid \$120 fines plus costs at Woodville for hunting deer with a light. Two other night hunters each paid \$100-fines and costs for possessing a "doe deer in closed season.
