Eastland Depot to Assume T&P Freight Charge Friday

Another page in Eastland County's railroad history turns Friday when the Eastland T&P Railway depot officially assumes responsibility for the handling of Cisco freight shipment, according to announcement here.

By authority of the Texas Railroad Commission, the Cisco depot will officially be closed and eventually dismantled, and Freight Agent Carl Crews of Cisco will be in charge of the Eastland office, beginning Friday, the report said.

At the same time, the RR Commission further ordered that the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railway Co. be authorized to discontinue its agency at Cisco and to establish Cisco as a prepay station in the freight tariffs, with the provision that M-K-T business in Cisco shall hereafter be handled through Gorman.

The federal ICC recently approved M-K-T's request to abandon its line from Stamford through Eastland County to Waco. This is expected to become official late in August. Plans are in the making for a private company to take over and operate M-K-T's operations between Gorman and De Leon to handle peanut traffic. The T&P agent had been handling M-K-T's freight business at the union station in Cisco.

Record Attendance Expected for SW Growers' Annual Meet

The Southwestern Peanut Growers Association Annual Meeting will be held in the student center at Tarleton State College in Stephenville today, Sept. 1. The day's program will get underway at 10 a. m. with a brief welcome from Tarleton President William O. Trogon.

The 1967 program will return to some previous program formats emphasizing profitable and profitable production practices as verified through the latest research findings. Many growers have noted that this is the type of program which has been most beneficial to them. Research and extension personnel from Texas A&M and Oklahoma State University will present this information under titles of current interest to producers.

Included in the program agenda are presentations on plant diseases, insects, irrigation and water management, herbicide and fungicide demonstrations and harvest and drying.

A complete report will be given on the 1966-67 Association operation. The storage and handling of over 100,000 tons of 1966 crop farmers stock plus the handling and supervision of some 9,000 tons of shelled peanuts for CCC represents by far the largest annual operation of the association on record.

In addition, the association has been active the past year in fostering research developments and in several promotional projects in addition to carrying on its regular functions.

Two new subjects will be explored at this year's meeting. Peanut Marketing will be discussed by Mr. James S. Denton, Area Farm Management Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Another new and challenging area, "Future Prospects for Improved Production", will be the title of a talk to be given by Leland Tripp, Extension Agronomist, Oklahoma State University. A panel composed of those on the program plus other peanut research personnel from Texas and Oklahoma will answer questions during the afternoon session of the meeting. Also on tap for the afternoon session is the awarding of certificates to new members of the Southwestern Peanut Pacesetter Club. Many Texas and Oklahoma growers will qualify for the club this year based on their 1966 crop production which exceeded 1500 pounds on dryland or 4000 pounds under irrigation.

New Draft Form Available Now

On the form the student states his understanding of the provisions of law printed in the form, states he is pursuing a full-time college course, and asks for deferment in Class II-S, then signs the form. The blank forms may be secured at the board office in Eastland, Jewel Reeves reports.

Colonel Schwartz said that requests for deferment could be made by ordinary letter. "The form is for the convenience of students," he observed. "It will help them understand what the law provides."

Deferment of undergraduates in Class II-S is mandatory if they are full-time and satisfactory, under 24 years old, and request deferment.

To be satisfactory, a student must make normal progress toward his baccalaureate degree. For example, in a four-year course, he will be expected to earn 25 percent of his credits in the 12 months following the beginning of each year.

## Outstanding Conservation Work Is Observed By New Area Employees

An exceptionally well planned field trip by E. E. McAllister, Eastland Work Unit Conservationist, Eastland Work Unit, was held on Thursday, July 27, in Eastland County for new employees of the Soil Conservation Service.

Highlights of the field trip included on the farm observation of conservation practices. The first stop was Johnnie Aaron's bottom land Coastal Bermuda grass pasture.

Johnnie stated that it took several months to properly prepare a seed bed for the coastal sprigging on this type bottomland soil. Johnnie used 200 lbs. of 16-20-0 about March, and then in May, applied 150 lbs. of Nitrogen. Johnnie has a solid stand of Coastal now, on which he cuts hay, and practices a rotation grazing system.

Next the group moved to O. B. Rone's farm where an excellent job of strip cropping was seen. Mr. Rone used four rows of maize or two rows of sodan for strips in conjunction with eight rows of peanuts. As Mr. Rone demonstrated, strip cropping is a "must" in the deep sand of the Cross Timbers area in order to control wind erosion.

The next stop for the group was the Ed Harrison ranch near Desdemona. Mr. Harrison was present to guide the group over his ranch and explained how he used his bottomland fields of John on grass and hay grazer for summer grazing in order to practice deferred grazing on the rangeland during the growing season.

Here, the group also saw brush control practices, range seeding and the control of sprouts by girdling. Perhaps one of the most interesting points which was brought out by Mr. Harrison was a pasture of Coastal Bermuda grass on which he had wintered approximately 48 steers from October through December. The steers were fed no hay, and very little protein supplement, yet they gained 15 pounds per day on the Coastal. Mr. Harrison has fed no hay on his ranch in about four years which indicates what an excellent job of pasture and range management he is practicing on this ranch.

A good point to remember that Mr. Harrison brought out is "Hay on the ground in the form of grass is much cheaper than bales of hay in the barn."

The next visit was with the

"Father of Coastal Bermuda Grass" in Eastland County, Mr. Sam Powers. Mr. Powers gave the group many facts about establishing stands of Coastal, its fertilizer and management needs. He also brought out pertinent information about peanut farming, the value of strip crops, cover crops, and crop residue use.

The group moved to the R. L. Lewis farm where a good system of strip cropping with peanuts was seen, and a year-round grazing system on Weeping love, Coastal, and Mr. Lewis stated that on one field last year he made 114 bushels of peanuts per acre.

The last stop, a very impressive one, was on the B. D. Yancey farm. Mr. Yancey was on hand to give us a tour of his place. Here the group saw Coastal Bermuda grass and Weeping love grass used for pasture and for hay. Yancey has approximately 160 acres of Coastal now, and about 50 acres of Weeping love and 100 acres of rangeland. He has an excellent stand of weeping love.

Mr. Yancey stated, "If I had to make a choice between Coastal and Weeping love, I would choose Weeping love." "However," Mr. Yancey stated, "the two grasses together offer an excellent balance for year-round grazing by using the Coastal in the spring and summer, and going to the Weeping love and rangeland for winter grazing."

This field trip was a part of the Agronomy training received by new employees of the Soil Conservation Service. New employees attending this training from Area 9 were Larry Seymour, Larry Cathey, Orville Fretwell, Ronnie Boston, and Rayford Young. Also present were Arthur Bell, Agronomist from the state office at Temple, and E. E. McAllister, WUC, Eastland.
