Ranger Bulldogs Start Fall Practice Monday

The Ranger High School Bulldog football team starts their 1967-68 practice Monday morning at 7:00 a.m. according to Coach Smith.

Workouts will be held twice daily from 7:00 to 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

Coach Smith stated approximately 40 boys will report for the workouts with 18 returning letterman from last years team. Of the returning lettermen six offensive players and seven defensive players will report Monday.

The Bulldogs are picked second in the District this season with Dublin being chosen as the number one team. The District as a whole is much stronger than the past season. All fans of the Bulldogs are invited to come to the football field and watch the workouts, but Coach Smith asked that the fans stay off the marked area of the practice field.

The Bulldogs will scrimmage the Brownwood "B" team here August 24 at 7:30 and will go to Winters for the second scrimmage September 1.

The first game of the 1967 season for the Ranger Bulldogs will be played in Bulldog Stadium against Cisco September 8.

Ranger Public Schools To Start September 5

Ranger Public Schools will begin school Tuesday, Sept. 5 with the two lunchrooms open that day and all buses running their usual route.

Registration for Hodges and Young Schools will be at 10 a.m. Friday, Sept. 1.

Juniors and seniors will register Monday, Aug. 28. Freshmen and Sophomores will register Tuesday, Aug. 29.

The seventh and eighth grade will register Wednesday, Aug. 31.

Supt. James R. Clark said that football practice will begin Monday, Aug. 14. The Bulldogs will scrimmage the Brownwood "B" team here at 7:30 p.m. Aug. 24.

Sept. 1 the Bulldogs will go to Winters for a scrimmage at 8 p.m.

The first football game is on Friday, Sept. 8 at 8 p.m. Football season tickets are now on sale in Mr. Clark's office. Since there are six home games this year, advance reserved seats will sell for \$7.50 per book. Holders of last years seats will have first choice on their same seats.

There is no school Monday, Sept. 4, due to it being Labor Day.

The first holiday will be two days for Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday.

PRELIMINARY BUDGET IS BASED ON 1967-1968 REVENUE INTAKE

Based on a preliminary budget submitted Tuesday night by Supt. James R. Clark to the trustees of Ranger Public Schools, the district will operate about \$5,000 in the hole based on 1967-68 revenue.

Clark told the board that he had slashed expenditures in every line item and still could not prepare a budget that would be within next years income. In fact should revenues be lower than anticipated, it will not be possible to finish in the black even counting balances from the past school year he said.

The final budget is not due until Nov. 1 and cannot be completed until all teachers are employed.

Low revenue for next year is due partly to a decrease in valuations. The values for this coming year is \$5,269,770 compared with \$5,451,790 for the year just completed.

Based on a \$1.50 tax rate this is \$2,731 decrease in tax money based on 100 percent collections. Fees totaling about \$3,000 were cut out two years ago which cut the revenues.

Pay raises allowed by the State totaled over \$18,000 for district employees and the district will have to absorb about \$3,654 of this cost. Other staff raises will total nearly \$1,000 in addition. Cost of maintenance and supplies has also gone up Clark said.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund and so long as the Court does not levy any outstanding bonds or other obligations or so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. "AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties, cities or towns to put all county taxes into one general fund, Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52c, reading as follows: "Section 52c. Honeydew is now appearing on pecan trees and other plants in Eastland County. The honeydew is caused by little yellow aphids or plant lice.

Many owners of pecan trees used Di-Syston this year to control the honey dew and black aphids. This is a systemic insecticide that is picked up by the roots and transmitted to the leaves. The granular material is cleared for use on pecan trees.

We applied the Di-Syston to the trees around the courthouse in May at the rate of one pound per tree. We ran out of material and did not treat one of the trees. This week the untreated tree has honeydew on the leaves. The yellow aphids are found on the underside of the leaves. The trees that were treated do not have aphids. County Clerk Johnson Smith said he had the same results on his trees. County Tax Collector Edgar Altom said the pecan trees he treated with Di-Syston has no honeydew. He said he usually has a lot of honeydew, especially on his Berkett.

The Di-Syston has to be applied in the spring or at least 80 days before the pecans are harvested. Most of the commercial pecan growers are also using Di-Syston. They apply it in 5 or 6 foot bands at the rate of 20 pounds per acre.

Only one application is permitted per season. Season-long control is most often the rule when proper application and moisture conditions prevail. Aphid damage most commonly occurs in mid or late summer. The systemic prevents the summer build-up and protects the pecans during the late summer period.

Sam Kimmell of Cisco put the Di-Syston in the soil around his elm trees to control the elm leaf beetles. The label on Di-Syston does not recommend it for elm leaf beetle control, but Sam is satisfied with the results. Other untreated elm trees in the county are almost defoliated. There are several insecticides that will kill the leaf beetle, but several applications throughout the summer are sometimes needed. The recommended insecticides are sevin, chlordane, DDT, diel-drin and toxaphene.

Most of the peanuts in Eastland County look good at this stage. The conditions vary in different parts of the county. Some farmers say that the peanuts look better than they ever have at this stage while others say that they do not look as good as last year's peanuts.

Many farmers had to plant late in June and even in July because of heavy rains. Some of the latter peanuts do not seem to be growing as well as they should. Claude Fuller of Gorman has some of the oldest peanuts in the county. He said these older peanuts were not going to be near as good as last year's older peanuts.

Foliage eating worms are causing a lot of concern among peanut farmers. Most of these worms are the corn earworms. Normally these worms do not cause economic damage since the peanut is very tolerant to foliage loss. However, I saw some fields in the Sabanno area last week where the small corn earworms were eating in the terminals and slowing growth of the peanuts. In this case it is advisable to spray. Sevin, at the rate of 15 pounds of active material per acre gives good results. One application should give satisfactory results.

Most farmers agree that the peanuts look better than average on Aug. 1, but no one can expect another year as good as last year. August will be a very critical month for peanuts.

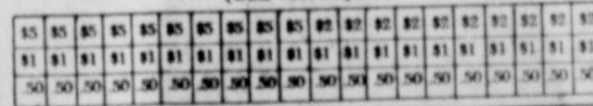

ASCS COMMITTEE ELECTION WILL BE ON SEPTEMBER 20

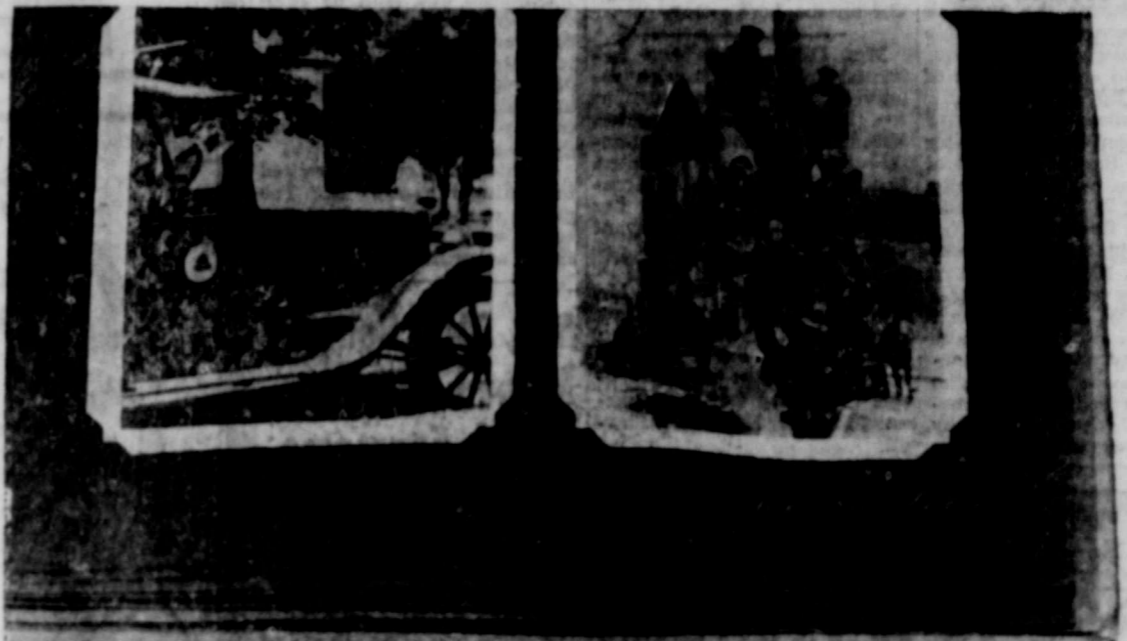
The 1968 Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service community committee election will be Sept. 20, according to Jesse G. Meredith, office manager.

Ballots will be mailed all known eligible voters on Sept. 16, and must be mailed or returned in person by Sept. 20.

The ballots will be tabulated in the ASCS office in Eastland on Sept. 22, Mr. Meredith said.

The ASCS is in the process of making payments on 1967 wheat, cotton and feed grain, and payments are being computed and processed by computer for the first time this year.

Producers who have acreage diverted under the feed grain and cotton program are reminded that their diverted acreage may not be grazed until Nov. 1, 1967, Mr. Meredith stated. No crop can be harvested from this acreage diverted under the Cropland Adjustment Program or Conservation Reserve Program during the entire period of the contract.
