## Adult Basic Education To Be Offered By Ranger Jr. College

Adults will have an opportunity to brush up on basic reading and writing skills this fall under a new program sponsored by the Ranger Ministerial Alliance and Ranger Junior College.

The program is designed to be of special benefit to those for whom the English language poses problems either

as a result of limited formal education or because English is a second language.

Under the program, classes will meet two nights weekly on the RJC campus. Classes will begin in September and run through April. Emphasis will be placed on reading skills, math, natural sciences and the social sciences.

Ranger Junior College will supervise the program and provide classroom facilities. The program is offered under

the Division of Adult Basic Education of the Texas Education Agency.

Ranger area residents who are interested in the program or who know of persons who might be interested in the program are urged to contact the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and leave their names with Mrs. Ben Collins. They will be contacted later and dates and times for the classes will be worked out to the satisfaction of those enrolled.

Classes will be offered free of charge and enrollment is limited to adults 21 or over.

## City Ordinance Due To Improve City Appearance (An Editorial)

A move on the part of city officials to make Ranger a safer, more sanitary and more beautiful place in which to live is a recent ordinance giving the Ranger City Commission the right to declare dangerous buildings to be public nuisances and unlawful. No person will deny the fact that, desirable as a very large per cent of real estate within the city limits is, there are buildings that are dangerous, hazardous to health and veritable eyesores in appearance.

However well they served their day and generation, years of standing vacant with no maintenance has caused deterioration to the extent that they are fire hazards, "pigeon apartments," breeding places for insects and unsafe for pedestrians.

It has been said that a chain is no stronger than its weakest link. Perhaps our community is safer than a single hazard, but for the welfare of all concerned, these hazards must be removed.

Surely all resident will be eager to cooperate with officials in this giant forward step toward a better town.

Ranger Public Schools have their first day of school on Tuesday, Sept. 5 when the schools open at the usual time and run a full day schedule. However, juniors seniors will register tomorrow, Aug. 28. Seniors register from 9 till 12 and juniors from 1 to 4 p. m.

Freshmen and sophomores will register on Tuesday, the seventh and eighth, Wednesday.

There will be a meet next Thursday of all school employees in the high school gymnasium at 9 a. m. Faculty meetings will be held in afternoon in each building again Friday.

The first six grades will register at 10 a. m. Friday, Sept. 1. The first six grades will report to Hodges Oak Park School while fourth, fifth, and sixth grades report to Young-Scott as usual.

Bus routes will make their usual runs Tuesday, Sept. 5; the first time out. New routes on the bus routes will ask their neighbors as to time schedule. There are changes planned. All bus drivers have been employed.

Next Friday night the Bulldogs will go to Winters for a science night at 8 p. m. The first football game on a schedule is with Cusco in Ranger at 8 p. m. Friday night, Sept. 8. The schedule for it on Saturday night is error supt, James R. Clark said.

Lunchrooms at Hodges as Young will serve their first meals on Tuesday, Sept. 5, the first day of school. Fried menus will be given to students each Friday for the next week, Clark said. Parents are encouraged to assist for the menus and look the over.

The Title I Kindergarten operated by the school district and taught by Mr. Bruce Golemon, will begin Sept. 5 also at 8:30 a. m. Those who wish may eat in the lunchroom at the regular student price at Hodges of 3 cents although they may bring a sack lunch or go home to lunch.

All students, but especially those entering kindergarten or the first grade, are required to be vaccinated for small pox before enrollment or have proof that the vaccinator did not take.

Birth certificates are also required in kindergarten and given one for enrollment.

Students desiring to enroll in grade one must be six years of age before Sept. 1 if the birthdate falls on Sept. 1 the law requires the student to wait until the next school term to enroll.

Transfers from one district to another must be made before the Oct. 1 deadline.

The new NYC work program begins Sept. 5, Clark said. Students who get on the new program will work 1 hour weekly at a rate of \$1.25 per hour. It is expected about half the present number on the program will be allowed on the new program due to a cut in funds.

Legal Notices

AN ORDINANCE granting the Ranger City Commission the right to declare dangerous buildings to be public nuisances and unlawful.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ranger, Texas:

I. Dangerous Buildings defined and prohibited: Any buildings as described and defined herein below shall be, and the same are, hereby declared to be public nuisances and unlawful.

(A) Any building with the roof, ceiling, floors, sills, or foundations, or any combination thereof, rotted or decayed and falling apart; windows out, uninhabitable, untenable, and unsightly, due to obsolescence and deterioration caused by neglect or vandalism or fire damage or old-age or elements; or

(B) Any building in danger of falling and injuring the person or property of another; or

(C) Any building which is a fire menace to wit, by being in a dilapidated condition, as fully described in subsections (A) and (B) hereof, and which has an accumulation of rubbish and trash which is likely to become a fire, or be set on fire, in and around said building and endanger the person or property of others; or

(D) Any building which is in the condition or conditions described in sub-sections (A) or (B) or (C) hereof, which is damp and in unsanitary condition, which is likely to create disease and sickness.

When used in the Chapter the "Building" shall include

any erection or structure of any kind or part thereof. II. INSPECTION: An inspection shall be made of every building located within the City which is suspected of being in violation of this Chapter. The Building Inspector and his assistants are hereby authorized to conduct inspections of buildings suspected of being in violation of this Chapter.

III. NOTICE TO OWNERS: Whenever a violation of this Chapter has been discovered and reported by an Inspector under Section I, the owner of the premises involved and the occupant, if any, shall be given written notification of the nature of the violation and the date at which a reinspection shall be made to determine if the violation has been eliminated. No reinspection shall be made until the person responsible for a violation under the provisions of this Chapter has been given a reasonable time to eliminate the violation.

IV. NOTICE TO DEMOLISH: Whenever a violation of Subsections (A), (B), (C), or (D), of Section I of this Chapter is discovered upon reinspection and the violation presents an immediate danger of injury to the occupants of the premises or to the public, and the cost of alleviating the violation is not reasonable related to the value of the building, a notice of intent to order the demolition of the building shall be served on the owner by the Building Inspector, by certified mail, to his post office address as shown on the City tax rolls; or, if his address is unknown and cannot, by the exercise of reasonable diligence be ascertained, by publication for not less than two (2) times within ten (10) consecutive days, in the official newspaper; and, in the event the violation is not eliminated within thirty (30) days from the date of said notice, the City may demolish said building, or cause the same to be done and charge the expenses incurred in doing such work or having the same done, to the owner of said land; and if such work is done at the expense of the City, then said expense shall be assessed on the lot, tract, or parcel of land, or to the premises upon which such expense was incurred.

V. ASSESSMENT OF LIEN: The City Manager or the Building Inspector of the City shall file a statement of such expenses incurred under Section IV, giving the amount of such expenses, the date on which said work was done or improvements made, with the City Secretary of Ranger, Texas; and the City shall have a privileged lien on such lot, lots or other premises or real estate upon which said building was located, to secure the expenditures so made, which said lien shall be second only to tax liens and liens for street improvements; and said amount shall bear ten per cent (10%) interest from the date said statement was filed. It is further provided that for any such expenditures, and interest, as aforesaid, suit may be instituted and recovery and foreclosure of said lien may be had in the name of the City; and the statement of expenses so made, as aforesaid, or a certified copy thereof, shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended for such work or expense.

VI. PENALTY FOR VIOLATION: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding (\$100.00), and each and every day's violation shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. In case the owner or occupant of any building under the provisions of this Chapter, shall violate any of the provisions of this Chapter, the president, vice president, secretary, treasurer of such corporation, or manager, agent, or employee of such corporation, shall be also severally liable for the penalties provided for a violation of this Chapter.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT HE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows: "Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the term of office to which they were elected or appointed." "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the term of office to which they were elected or appointed."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT HE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; and further that at the time the Commissioners' Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxpayers voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

## Peanut Growers To Convene In Stephenville September 1

D. B. Warren, President of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association has announced that the Annual Meeting of the big peanut growers organization will be held at Stephenville, on the campus of Tarleton State College beginning at 9:30 a. m. on Sept. 1. The meeting will be held in the Student Center. Warren explained that this year's meeting will again feature production research findings of scientists at Texas A&M University and Oklahoma State University as these findings relate to practical every-day application of the peanut grower on the farm. This, he said, has proved to be the most popular type program with peanut growers in previous years. For example, the topic of "Disease Prevention" will be discussed by Dr. Wendell Home, Plant Pathologist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, one of the noted authorities in this field. Peanut growers are known to have lost from 25 to 30 percent of their production in the field the past two years, because of plant diseases. Therefore, this topic should be of prime interest to all peanut growers because to some degree all growers in peanut producing areas in the Southwest experience serious difficulties due to diseases. Another common problem, that of "Insects in Peanuts", will be explored by Mr. Phillip J. Hamman, Assistant Entomologist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In the area of peanut quality the most critical period probably exists from the time that peanuts are dug until the time that they are actually processed by shellers. This phase of maintaining quality through the best known practices will be discussed by Mr. William S. Allen, Agricultural Engineer, Texas Agricultural Extension Service under the

### Levenworth Written-Writ Asks Removal of Writ

Hocking things in somebody else's name can prove to be well, sticky - particularly if one expects to ask favors later in one's own name.

This fact was indicated last week from a writ of habeas corpus document filed in Eastland County which names Sheriff L. E. Sublett as respondent.

The story goes back to last year when five expensive band instruments were stolen from the Cisco Junior College band hall. The sheriff's department in Eastland, through a great deal of detective work, found three of the instruments in Fort Worth pawn shops under the name of George H. Freed. A local grand jury indicted one George H. Freed for theft.

Shifting over to Atlanta, Ga., the sheriff there picked up a man for car theft who listed his name as Freed. Acquainted with Sublett through previous police work together, the Atlanta sheriff called to ask if Eastland County wanted the man for anything.

"Yes, indeed," said Sublett. And a "detrainer" was placed on the man for prosecution in Eastland County.

Through fingerprint identification, it developed that the man in question wasn't using his real name, so when he was found guilty of car theft in

Georgia, he was sentenced to four years in Levenworth Prison, Kansas, he went in under his real name - but the "Freed detrainer" went right along with him.

But now, with the detrainer hanging over his head, he doesn't get any "privileges" - thus the hand-written writ asking that the detrainer be removed or that he be given a fair and speedy trial.

But the man named on the writ isn't charged with anything in Eastland County or doesn't have a detrainer on him.

It's among quite a few interesting cases that were on Judge J. Frank Sparks' desk as he returned to 91st District Court Monday after a vacation.

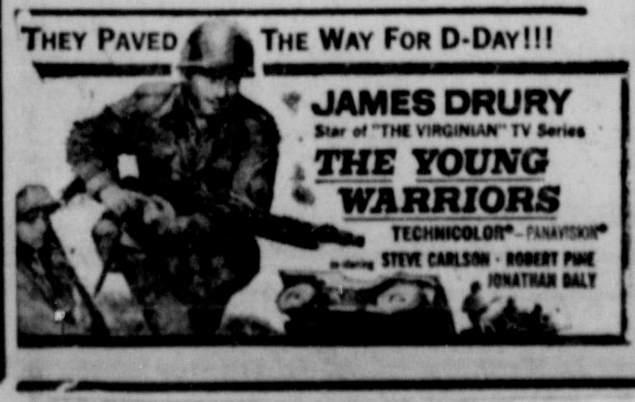

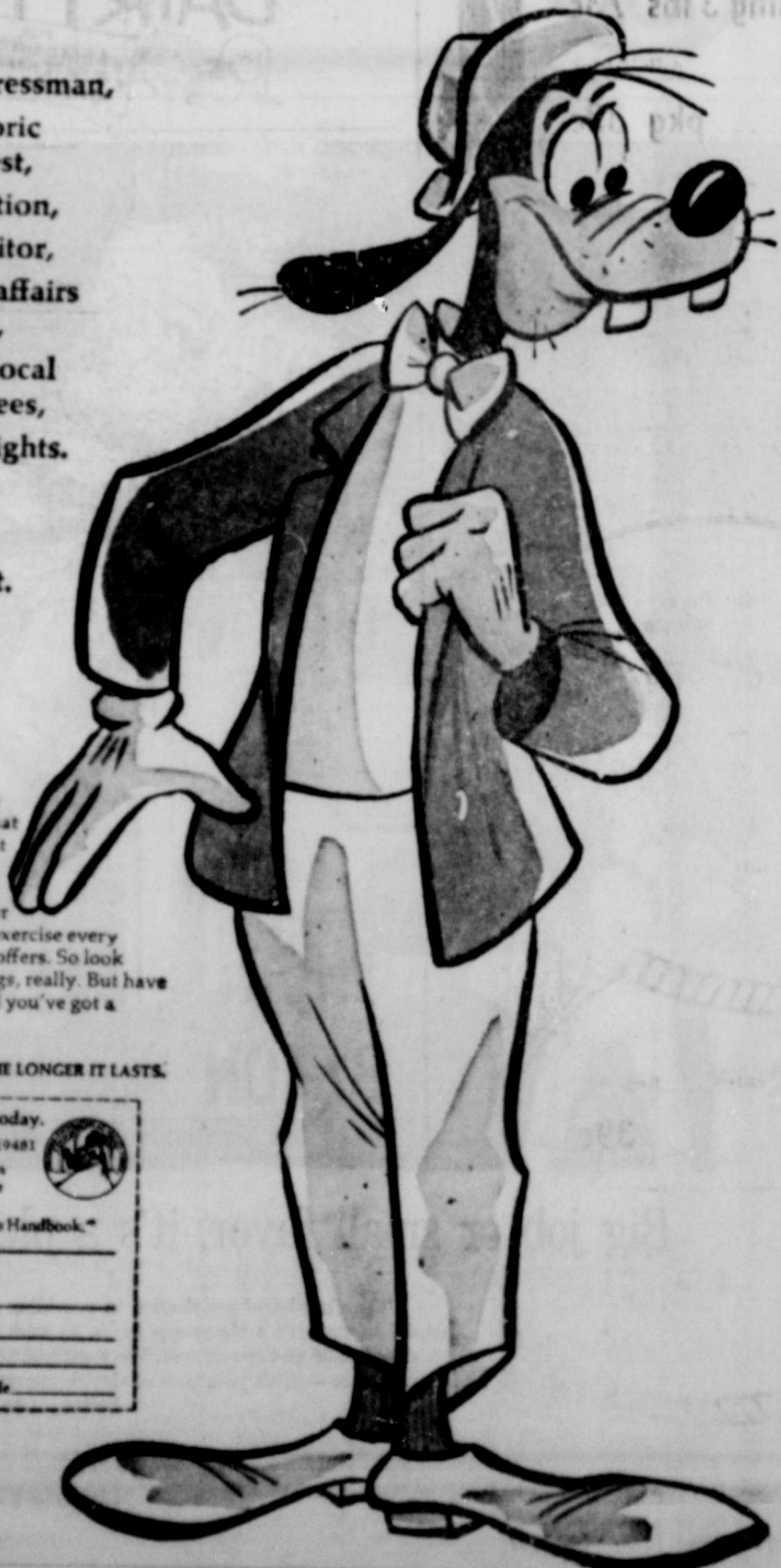

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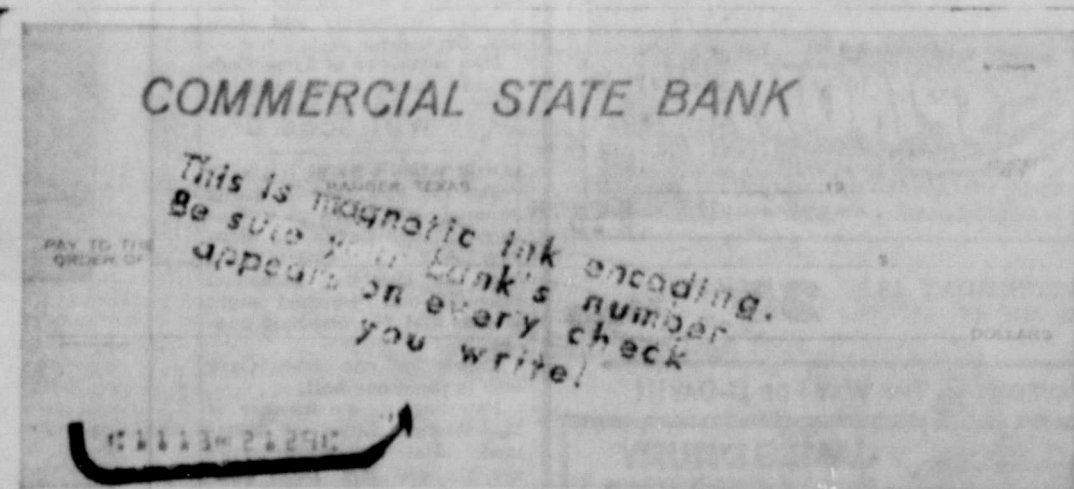

## Abolishment Of 4 Boxes Is Considered

Expected to be considered at the Monday Eastland County Commissioners Court meeting is the possible abolishment of some four voting precincts in Eastland County in compliance with recently revised voting legislation.

The new law is quite explicit on the requirements for a voting box. The pertinent paragraph from the Texas Election Code, states:

"No election precinct shall be formed out of two or more justice precincts or commissioners precincts, nor out of the parts of two or more justice precincts or commissioners precincts; and no election precinct shall be formed out of two or more congressional districts or state senatorial districts or state representative districts; nor out of the parts of two or more such districts. If in September of any year there exists any election precinct in the county which does not comply with the foregoing requirements, the commissioners court shall make the necessary changes before the first day of October, either at a regular meeting or at a special meeting called for the purpose; and the order shall be published as provided in Paragraph (a) of this section. Subject to the provisions of the first sentence of this paragraph, no election precinct shall have a resident therein less than fifty (50) nor more than two thousand (2,000) voters as ascertained by the number of registered voters for the last preceding presidential general election year; provided, however, that in precincts in which voting machines have been adopted for use in accordance with Section 79 of this code, the maximum number of voters shall be three thousand."

There are no voting machines in Eastland County.

Voting boxes to be considered include Scranton, Nimrod, Pioneer and Kokomo. There are presently 12 voting boxes in the county.

Re-location of the voting precincts probably will be easily decided, County Judge Scott Bailey said, with the possible exception of Kokomo, where voters could easily go to one of two boxes.

The Pioneer and Nimrod boxes are presently in County Commissioners Precinct No. 2, and therefore, would be transferred to the only other box in that precinct — Rising Star.

The Scranton box, in Precinct No. 4, would go to Cisco, Judge Bailey said, and the Kokomo box could go either to Gorman or Carbon. This will be decided Monday, based on a check of the most logical location for the most voters in the Kokomo box.

The re-locations would simplify one aspect of vote announcements — the voting boxes would all be located in towns which have high schools in the county.

Hunters are being reminded of Daylight Savings Time as they make plans to take to the fields on Sept. 1, opening day of dove season, according to Game Warden Maurice Dry.

The law specifies "2 noon, Central Standard Time," but that means 1 p. m., Central Daylight Savings Time, so Warden Dry is warning hunters not to "jump the gun" by an hour and be in violation.

One p. m., Friday, Sept. 1, is the legal opening time, he says, closing Oct. 30, with sunset still the daily legal time.
