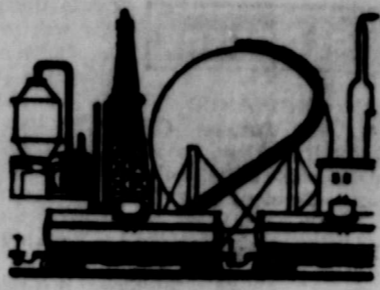

Ranger Public Schools Begin Term With Record-Stretching Enrollment

A total of 599 pupils have registered for classes in Ranger Public Schools, according to Supt. James R. Clark. This number is an increase of 23 over the first day of school last year.

Enrollment is expected to go well above 600 mark during next week, Clark stated. Ranger Public School teachers began their new school-year Thursday morning with a general meeting of teachers and other employees in the high school auditorium. School for the students will be Tuesday morning at 8:30.

Opening prayer was given by James W. Waller, new teacher in the Young School. Present at the meeting was 33 certificate employees, and 13 auxiliary personnel consisting of secretaries, cooks, bus drivers, custodians and office personnel. A total of 46 people are on the school payroll.

Of the 33 teachers employed, 11 are new on the payroll this year according to Supt. James R. Clark.

They are Mrs. Catherine Golemon, Kindergarten; Patsey Helmcamp, Young remedial reading teacher; Richard Helmcamp, high school band director; Marilyn Henderson, high school history; Dewitt Jones, assistant coach and history teacher; Mrs. Jones, Young teacher substituting for Mrs. Frances Worden who is ill; Jerry Keen, junior high math; Marie Mince, second grade; Beverly Pair, junior high English; James Waller, Young history teacher and junior high school coach; Robert Whitley, high school science teacher.

The new sick leave policy of the school district was explained by Clark to all employees. Clark also explained briefly new laws passed by the last State legislature that affect schools.

Refreshments were served all employees by students in the Home Ec department under Mrs. Ruby Halbert.

Following the general faculty meeting, teachers went to meetings in their respective schools and later prepared their rooms or the first day of school Tuesday morning.

According to pre-enrollment figures Ranger Public Schools will show an increase this year over last year.

Farm Tour Held Thursday For Ranger Businessmen

Twenty-nine members and guests were present Thursday noon as the Lions Club met for their weekly meeting in the Paramount Hotel Club Room. Lion President Glyn Gilliam presided.

It was announced the next Lions Club meeting will be held at Bryan's Steak House Club room on Sept. 7 at 12 noon with Lion Glyn Gilliam in charge of the program.

After the noon meal the Lions Club members left by bus at 12:45 to tour several farms and ranches in the area.

The first stop of the tour was the Melvin Adams farm. Mr. Adams rears Yorkshire and Hampshire hogs on his farm. He has approximately 100 brood sows and raises the pigs to sell.

The group of businessmen then went to the Allen Ranch south of Ranger to tour his coastal bermuda ranch. Mr. Allen has a 3000 acre spread with 900 acres in coastal bermuda and runs 2500 head of goats.

From the Allen Ranch the group toured the Marr pecan orchard (formerly the B. B. Freeman pecan orchard) in the Cheaney Community. Mr. Marr has several different varieties of pecan trees in the orchard along with peach and apple trees. Mr. Marr said he has 700 pecan trees that yield approximately 40,000 pounds of nuts per year. He said the harvesting of the pecans is done strictly by hand but later he plans to have the harvesting done mechanically. Local marketing is being done at the present time.

The peanut farm of Sam Yancey who resides south of Ranger was the next stop. Mr. Yancey exhibited 17 acres of peanuts which thanks to irrigation are expected to yield 80 bushels per acre. Continuing the group visited the feed lot of James Ratliff where they viewed the fine Angus cattle being fed for commercial purposes.

Final stop on the tour was the modern dairy of Norman Richardson located north of town. Mr. Richardson states that the 65 cows being milked at the present time will be increased to 100 by the end of this month.

Having completed the itinerary and highly informative itinerary the group returned to Ranger at 4 p. m.

TAN AN VIET NAM—The sight of the little Vietnamese children wearing their rags was just too much for the sergeant to bear. So he wrote to the folks back home to help him do something about it.

"It got results, too," says Army Sergeant David R. Herridge, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert T. Herridge, Eastland. "I thought away I received a letter from the Youth Fellowship of the Methodist Church back in Eastland saying that they had started a clothes project."

The young people went all out in their efforts to make the project a success. Within only two weeks they had collected more than 460 pieces of new and used clothing with a value of approximately \$150. The postmaster of Eastland packed and mailed the clothing in three large boxes.

Sgt. Herridge, a personnel sergeant and typist assigned to Headquarters Company of the 9th Infantry Division's 3rd Brigade entered the Army in 1964 and was stationed in Germany, before arriving in Viet Nam last December. He is a 1964 graduate of Paint Rock High School.

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Legal Notices

AN ORDINANCE granting the Ranger City Commission the right to declare dangerous buildings to be public nuisances and unlawful.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ranger, Texas:

I. Dangerous Buildings defined and prohibited: Any buildings as described and defined herein below shall be, and the same are, hereby declared to be public nuisances and unlawful.

(A) Any building with the roof, ceiling, floors, sills, or foundations, or any combination thereof, rotted or decayed and falling apart; windows out, uninhabitable, untenable, and unsightly, due to obsolescence and deterioration caused by neglect or vandalism or fire damage or old-age or the elements; or

(B) Any building in danger of falling and injuring the person or property of another; or

(C) Any building which is a fire menace to-wit, by being in a dilapidated condition, as fully described in subsections (A) and (B) hereof, and which has an accumulation of rubbish and trash which is likely to become a fire, or be set on fire, in and around said building and endanger the person or property of others; or

(D) Any building which is in the condition or conditions described in sub-sections (A) or (B) or (C) hereof, which is damp and in unsanitary condition, which is likely to create disease and sickness.

When used in the Chapter the "Building" shall include any erection or structure of any kind or any part thereof.

II. INSPECTION: An inspection shall be made of every building located within the City which is suspected of being in violation of this Chapter. The Building Inspector and his assistants are hereby authorized to conduct inspections of buildings suspected of being in violation of this Chapter.

III. NOTICE TO OWNERS: Whenever a violation of this Chapter has been discovered and reported by an Inspector under Section I, the owner of the premises involved and the occupant, if any, shall be given written notification of the nature of the violation and the date of which a reinspection shall be made to determine if the violation has been eliminated. No reinspection shall be made until the person responsible for a violation under the provisions of this Chapter has been given a reasonable time to eliminate the violation.

IV. NOTICE TO DEMOLISH: Whenever a violation of Subsections (A), (B), (C), or (D), of Section I of this Chapter is discovered upon reinspection and the violation presents an immediate danger of injury to the occupants of the premises or to adjoining property or persons or to the public, and the cost of alleviating the violation is not reasonable related to the value of the building, a notice of intent to order the demolition of the building shall be served on the owner by the Building Inspector, by certified mail, to his post office address as shown on the City tax rolls; or, if his address is unknown and cannot, by the exercise of reasonable diligence be ascertained, by publication for not less than two (2) times within ten (10) consecutive days, in the official newspaper; and, in the event the violation is not eliminated within thirty (30) days from the date of said notice, the City may demolish said building, or cause the same to be done and charge the expenses incurred in doing such work or having the same done, to the owner of said land, and if such work is done at the expense of the City, then said expense shall be assessed on the lot, tract, or parcel of land, or to the premises upon which such expense was incurred.

For the purposes of this Section any repair, alteration, or improvement which is determined by the Building Inspector to cost more than fifty per cent (50%) of the gross assessed valuation of the building, exclusive of land value, shall be deemed not to be reasonable related to the value of the building.

V. ASSESSMENT OF LIEN: The City Manager or the Building Inspector of the City shall file a statement of such expenses incurred under Section IV, giving the amount of such expenses, the date on which said work was done or improvements made, with the City Secretary of Ranger, Texas; and the City shall have a privileged lien on such lot, lots or other premises or real

The Red Cross said it had already committed a quarter of a million dollars in food, emergency clothing, and building supplies to help out in the emergency phase of relief for victims of the great flood which ravished this city and its neighboring villages, Aug. 13.

Hundreds of flood victims still were being sheltered by the Red Cross, which at one

time was operating 13 shelters and caring for 30,000 victims and relief were begun on the damage. A current survey of the damage according to Red Cross showed that although only 40 residences were destroyed, 3,291 were badly damaged and 773 had minor damage. The survey also disclosed that 552 apartment units were damaged to a greater or lesser degree.

The Red Cross said that 5,200 families had suffered loss in the flood and that organization already is processing 1,000 applications for assistance and expecting many more.

In the initial emergency phase of the disaster operation, the Red Cross flew in to Fairbanks and surrounding communities its most experienced staff from all over the United States and today there were 103 staff members serving with more than 1000 volunteers still working in behalf of victims. At the peak of the disaster emergency the organization was feeding and sheltering 30,000 persons

What do you do with one hundred pounds of beans? My wife and I attended the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association meeting in Amarillo August 6, 7, and 8. Thirty door prizes were given at the meetings. At least, I was lucky enough to win one of the door prizes — 100 pounds of beans!

It was a very good meeting. We heard several good speakers, including Ben Barnes, state representative and the speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

The people of Amarillo were very nice to us. They took us to Palo Duro Canyon State Park one afternoon and we had a barbecue and attended the musical, "Texas."

The lesser cornstalk borer is causing a lot of damage to Eastland County peanuts, especially to dry land peanuts. Phil Hamman, Extension Entomologist, and I inspected fields August 17 and found several fields infested with the cornstalk borer.

This small worm is an underground feeder and lives beneath the soil surface in silken tubes. They feed principally on the pegs, pods, stems and roots. The developing nuts are hollowed out. Stems and roots are scorched and may be girdled.

Spray application should begin as soon as moderate to heavy population of small worms are observed. Insecticide should be applied to cover the lower stems and a band of soil 6 to 8 inches wide on each side of the row. The three insecticides recommended are DDT, Parathion and Diazinon.

If the lesser corn stalk borers are present in your peanuts you will see silken tubes hanging on the base and roots of the plant. The borers are hard to see. They are bluish in color with rings around their bodies.

The Peanut Farmer is a magazine published in Raleigh, N.C. and is read by peanut growers all over the south. One of the features of the magazine is the "Peanut Roundtable." Each month, three farmers are asked to answer questions on a given subject.

In the August issue, one of the roundtable farmers is J. O. Jackson Jr., of Gorman. The topic was "Mechanical curing of peanuts on the farm." His answers to the questions were very good.

Eastland County Pit Order Is Set

The Railroad Commission Tuesday ordered all oil and gas operators in Eastland County to quit using unlined salt water disposal pits by Jan. 1.

The action followed a show cause hearing Aug. 7. The commission said oil operators will be cut off Jan. 1, on any lease still using unlined disposal pits.

The commission found that pits are contributing to fresh water pollution in the area, and that a no-pit order was needed to prevent pollution.

AUSTIN—The Texas Department of Public Safety announced today that its Statistical Services has estimated that 45 persons will lose their lives in traffic mishaps during the Labor Day holiday weekend.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director, pointed out that this is the last holiday of the summer and thousands of motorists will be crisscrossing the state in their travels.

"This increased travel increases the chances of an individual being involved in an accident," Garrison said. "We urge every motorist to exercise caution and to stay alert."

"There is always the possibility that the estimate of 45 deaths for this period can be proved to be too high, but only if all drivers put forth every effort toward avoiding traffic accidents."

"The Department of Public Safety will continue in its all-out effort to curb traffic accidents and to stop reckless and illegal driving on the highways," Garrison said. "Approximately 150 uniformed officers from other DPS services will be on the road to supplement the highway patrol enforcement action."

During the holiday period, from 6 p. m. Friday, Sept. 1 through 11:59 p. m. Monday, Sept. 4, the DPS will tabulate each traffic death and the totals will be announced three times daily from DPS headquarters in Austin in order to call public attention to highway dangers.



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PARENTS WILL ACCOMPANY TEXAS TEENS TO THE COURTS

A little publicized provision of the States new traffic safety laws requires that one or both parents of juvenile traffic offenders appear in open court with the youthful law-breakers. Highway Patrolman Roger Sosebee reports.

The law, now in effect, also states that juveniles can plead guilty only in open court before the judge and that parents or guardians must be present before the teen is convicted or fined.

"In today's busy world it is difficult for many well-meaning parents to keep up with the actions of their teen age children. This provision of the new law should benefit conscientious parents and their youngsters, Sgt. Sosebee said when commenting on this phase of the new traffic laws.

"Up until now," he says "teens could be arrested and fined without the parents

knowledge. Teens could and did build terrible driving records. In many cases, the parents could have called a halt to the dangerous driving; if only they had known what was going on."

It has also been pointed out that the driving records of all members of a family household effect auto insurance rates under the Texas Driving Insurance Plan.

A bad driver, either young or old, male or female, can cause a family's insurance rates to climb. At least under this law, parents will have an opportunity to do something about their teen age children's driving habits.

By knowing when their youngsters are arrested for traffic violations, parents will be able to put corrective measures into action. Perhaps they will be able to keep their children out of further trouble.

Fire Insurance Key Rate To Go Down A Cent Ranger, Eastland

Homeowners in two Eastland County towns will have reduced fire insurance premiums next year as the result of key rates just issued by the State Board of Insurance.

The key rates in Ranger and Eastland will each be reduced by one cent — making the new key rate in Ranger 37 cents, replacing the present 38-cent rate; and in Eastland the new rate will be 23 cents, down from the current 29 cent-rate.

Key rates are decided by the State agency through a system of charges for fire hazards and credits for fire protection practices in Texas towns and cities.

The key rate is a factor which insurance costs are figured.

Ranger had a total of 43 cents in charges, due to power for pumping units not up to standards, supply main not in duplicate, 29 per cent of the mains deficient in size in mercantile district, 40 per

cent of main deficient in residential districts, fire hydrants 15 per cent deficient in number in mercantile districts and 11 per cent deficient in residential sections wholly volunteer fire department, ladder truck deficient in number, only an electric siren, 90 per cent deficient in building code of enforcement, overhead wires in mercantile district, frame ranges in mercantile district and 25 per cent of roofs in residential areas combustible.

These are Ranger's credits: one per cent for one extra 100-gallon booster truck, two per cent for a separate booster tank truck with at least a 250 gallon tank, one per cent for chief's car, three per cent for methods of fire prevention taught in all public schools, two per cent for maintenance of arson reward and four per cent for firemen's training school.

Eastland has a total of 32 cents in charges, due to power for pumping units not up to standards, supply main not in duplicate, 29 per cent of mains deficient in size in mercantile district and 17 per cent deficient in residential districts, fire hydrants 15 per cent deficient in number in mercantile districts, fire department 60 per cent deficient in number of full paid men, only an electric siren, building laws inadequate, no alleys, overhead wires in mercantile district, frame ranges in mercantile district and more than 25 per cent of roofs in residential sections combustible.

Eastland had the following credits: one per cent for one 100 gallon booster truck, three per cent for teaching fire prevention in schools, two per cent for arson reward maintenance and five per cent for firemen's training school.
