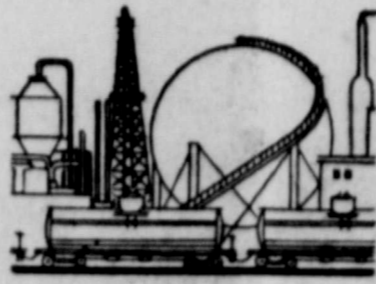

ACCORDING TO TEST ...

Students In Ranger Public Schools Progress On National Average

Students in the Ranger Public Schools made more progress last school year than those on the national average according to test results, O. C. Warden, supervisor in the Ranger system, said.
 Warden explained the test results this summer to school trustees and Supt. James R. Clark went over the results with the entire faculty last week.
 Students in grades two, three, four, five and six either were on the national average or progressed faster the tests showed.
 No test was given the first grade but the California test was given to grades two while the Iowa test was given to the upper elementary grades.
 Grade two scored 21 on their first test last November and in April scored 27 or an increase of 6 while the national average increase was 5.
 Grade three progressed from 3.1 to 3.5 and progressed the same as the average nationally.
 Grade four went from 4.2 to 4.9 for an increase of .7 while the national average increased only .5.
 Grade five broke even nationally, progressing from 5.2 to 5.7.
 Grade six also was average in their progress going from 6.0 to 6.5.
 Grade seven was given the Science Research Associates Achievement tests last November and again in March.
 When they took the first test they were at a grade six plus seven month achievement level (6.7) when they should have scored 7.2.
 In March, their educational progress was at 7.5 when it should have been 7.7. This showed above average progress since they were only two months behind then.
 The seventh progressed above the national level in social studies science and punctuation and capitalization.
 They were weakest in arithmetic (7.4) and reading (7.3) when the national average was 7.7.
 Grade 8 fared better since they were on the national average in their progress last November and in five months made seven months progress.
 When the national progress was eight years of schooling and seven months (8.7) last year's eighth posted an 8.9 score in social studies, 9.9 in science, 8.9 in the English tests, 8.6 in math and 8.7 in reading.
 Grade nine took the SRA TEACH battery last November and again in April and their composite score was 5, the same progress as was made nationally.
 In English they posted a 5.5 score or, under-average but a math score of 5.8 or over average. In social studies (history, geography and government) they scored 5.5 or under the national average.
 Grade 10 took two Iowa Tests of Educational Development and showed 4 1/2 months growth in four months.
 Their high scores were in natural science background interpretation of social studies and general vocabulary.
 Their lowest score was in quantitative thinking, interpretation of literature and basic social concepts.
 The tenth's total score was 5.9 per cent when the national average was 5.0 per cent.
 Grade eleven took the Iowa Tests on two different dates and showed good progress in all but correctness of expression, basic social concepts and interpretation of social studies.
 Their class ranked 76 per cent when the national average was 50 per cent.
 They made good progress in math but were still behind.
 On the same type test last year seniors scored a composite score of 70 per cent when the national average was 50 per cent. They showed four months growth in four school months.
 Their marks, from highest to lowest, were: basic social concepts, general vocabulary, social studies, interpretation of natural science, literature, lowest was quantitative thinking or math. They also were low in ability to express themselves.
 All grades will be tested again this year but only one time since last April's test can be used as a guide point for comparison.
 The faculties of each school will study the test results in an effort to raise the low scores and improve the entire teaching program.
 The title I program should help since this year each building will have a remedial reading teacher again while each section of grade one will have a teacher aide.
 Title I also pays for an office secretary full-time in each building thereby freeing teachers of almost all clerical duties so they can give almost full time to teaching.
 Parents are urged to visit their school and see how their child did on these tests Clark said. Students were given their test scores last year along with an explanation of the scores.

The fans of both Ranger and Cisco were pleased Friday night with the showing of their high school football teams in a non-conference game that ended in a 12-to-7 victory for the home team in Ranger stadium. Ranger won the game and the statistics and the Cisco team showed a lot of hustle and promise for the season ahead.
 The Bulldogs of Ranger, who were a two touchdown favorite, held the Lobos pretty well in check until the final minute of the game when Cisco's Randy Honea fell on a fumble to claim the ball. With 11 seconds on the clock, Fleety HB Brian Cotten took a pass from QB David Smith on the one and with five seconds left, Smith plunged over. Honea then converted.
 The Bulldogs held Cisco to only two first downs in the first half and to six for the game, while the Lobos gave up 18 first downs. Seven penalties for 85 yards, several at crucial times, hurt the Ranger cause.
 The home team's offense was sparked by QB Tommy Golemon, who passed for 109 yards, including one touchdown, a 21-yard toss to Ed Rudy Mendoza, and the running of Fullback Tom Fox, who was called on a total of 22 times and made 120 yards of 214 total. Ricky Squires had 56 yards in 13 carries.
 Cotten was Cisco's most spectacular runner. Several of his kickoff and punt returns

went for good yardage to give the Lobos field position and get them out of holes. He caught several passes. Cotten had a 46-yard gallop as the first half ended, only to be knocked out of bounds by Fox on the Ranger four.
 The first quarter was scoreless. Ranger took the kickoff and moved to the Cisco 25 where a penalty halted the threat. Late in the period, Cisco got possession on the Ranger 43. Smith hit Jim Turner for 22 to the Bulldog 21. Freddie Nichols drove five and Smith had a pass intercepted by Fox, who ran it back 22 yards to the Ranger 37.
 Early in the second period, a Ranger drive bogged down and Turner blocked a punt to give Cisco the ball on the Bulldog 29. After an exchange of punts, Ranger got the ball on their 20. Fox and Squires alternated to rack up a series of first downs, and Golemon drove to the Lobo 11. On fourth down, Golemon faked a line back to Fox and ran around right end (Continued on Page 4)

Public Schools inched up to 626 on Friday which was a net increase of two over the 1st day, Supt. James R. Clark said. "We have already had people move out and some move in which made a net increase of only two this week. This is an increase of 43 from one year ago."
 "Of the 626 there are 13 Negroes. Ranger Public Schools have been totally integrated for many years. Separate attendance is kept though and the government now requires that race be indicated on the records. For several years it was not permitted.
 All three buildings have a greater enrollment than last year this time."
 The board of trustees of Ranger Independent School District will meet Tuesday night at 8 p. m. in the office of the Superintendent of Schools. The public is invited to attend.

OVER \$4,000 WORTH ... RANGER SCHOOLS EXPECTS TO RECEIVE COMMODITIES
 The Ranger Public Schools last week received 450 pounds of canned chopped meat, 400 pounds of frozen boneless beef, 400 pounds of frozen turkey, 352 pounds of butter, 100 pounds of rice, 240 pounds of process cheese and 700 pounds of flour.
 This food is received free from the State Department of Public Welfare in Brownwood with each school paying a storage fee and doing their own hauling from Brownwood.
 Ranger Schools expects to receive over \$4,000 worth of commodities this year Supt. James R. Clark said.

A perfectly restored century-old circus wagon and horses will be part of the annual Peanut Bowl Parade, scheduled for downtown Eastland Sept. 23.
The wagon and horses are the property of Owens Country Sausage, Inc., of Richardson, Texas. The wagon was acquired four years ago by Clifford B. Owens, president of Owens Country Sausage, Inc., who found it dusty and neglected in a second hand store in Cleveland, Ohio. While its age and history are not known exactly, the firm that restored the wagon verified the dealers claim that it is an authentic circus wagon at least one hundred years old. It is believed that the wagon originally belonged to the Ringling Brothers circus, but this cannot be verified positively.


