Mr. Pierce was accidentally electrocuted while working at the top of a high line pole on the Clarence Ham Ranch 25 miles northwest of Big Lake about 1:30 p. m. Wednesday.

Born July 21, 1927, in Ranger, he married Alice Finney on Feb. 21, 1964, in Durant, Okla. An employee of R & S Construction Co., he had moved to Stanton from Missouri two weeks ago.

He was a veteran of World War II, a member of the Methodist Church and of the Moose Lodge of Stillwater, Okla.

Survivors are his wife; three sons, Michael Eugene and Bobby Don, both of the name and David of Dallas; a daughter, Nancy, of Dallas; his mother, Mrs. A. A. Adams of Abilene; one half-brother, Olin Barker of Oklahoma City, Okla.; two sisters, Mmes. J. E. Coleman of Sequin and Patsy Miller of Dallas.

The area's top-ranked Ranger Bulldogs won their fourth straight football game Friday night as they traveled to Comanche and defeated the Comanche Indians 30-19. Comanche received the opening kick-off on about the 10 yard line and returned the ball to the 19 where the Indians took over with first and 10.

Indian Quarterback Jack McDonald gave to fullback Gary Paul Johnson as he drove up the middle of the line for a two yard gain. On second down McDonald handed to halfback Rex Plumlee as Plumlee plowed for another two yards. On third down the Bulldogs charged in as McDonald handed the ball to Johnson and were thrown for a four yard loss. However, the Bulldogs were charged with a 15 yard penalty for unnecessary roughness and this the Indians their first down of the game.

The Indians started their drive again with McDonald giving to Johnson as he carried for one yard. A pass from McDonald to Johnson was good for three yards and on the third down McDonald again spotted Johnson with a pass and the Bulldogs again received a 15 yard penalty for roughness, which gave the Indians another first down. Seven plays and three first downs later the Comanche Indians scored first as McDonald passed to Johnson for the first touchdown of the night for the Indians. Billy Williams of the Indians kicked the extra point and Comanche led the Bulldogs 7-0.

The after touchdown kick-off, by Bill Adams, went to the 27 yard line as the Bulldogs returned it to the 35 where they started their drive for a touchdown.

Bulldog Quarterback Tom Golemon passed to Rudy Mendoza which covered 12 yards and the Bulldog's first first down of the game.

Golemon handed to Bobby Sipes as he carried for nine long yards and then Golemon passed to Ricky Squires for three more yards and a Bulldog first down. With Golemon at quarterback and Sipes and Squires carrying the ball the Bulldogs drove 34 yards for pay - dirt as Golemon handed to Squires as he hit the left guard for three yards and the Bulldog's first six points of the game. The point after was an option play as Golemon pitched to Squires for the extra two points. The touchdown drive covered 65 yards as the Bulldogs moved ahead of the Indians 6-7.

Comanche took possession of the ball after the kickoff on the 15 yard line as McDonald handed to Plumlee and he carried for six yards and another roughing penalty against the Bulldogs gave the Indians another first. As the Indians started their drive an illegal procedure penalty against the Indians placed the ball on the 30 yard line with first and 15 yards to go for a first.

Indian quarterback McDonald elected to keep the ball as the first quarter ended with the Bulldogs leading 8-7.

The Bulldogs charged the Indian back - field, as the Indians tried two unsuccessful pass attempts and ranger rushed in and threw the Indians for a 14 yard loss as the Bulldogs took over.

Quarterback Golemon elected to keep the ball as he circled the right end and gained enough for the first down for the Bulldogs.
