Bulldogs Stop Mounties Friday Night 14-6

The Ranger Bulldogs put together a tough ground assault and a crushing defense here Friday night to hold off Santa Anna's Mounties, a team that constantly seemed in danger of being blown off the field, but somehow never was. The win Friday night for the Bulldogs gave them their fifth straight victory. The Bulldogs played one of the best Class A

games in the State. As the final whistle sounded the Ranger team had won 14-6. Tom Fox, fullback for the Bulldogs, powered through the line for 139 yards and scored one of the touchdowns for the Bulldogs to be the leading ground gainer of the night. Ricky Squyers, tailback for the Bulldogs got 61 yards on the ground and the other touch-

down to be the second ground gainer of the night for the strong Bulldogs. Outstanding defensive men for the Bulldogs were Dwight Brown, Andy Hamilton, Preston Sunday and Floyd Parks. The defensive team of Ranger held Santa Anna to only 87 yards rushing in the game. Ranger scored first as Quarterback Tom Golemon pitched

to Ricky Squyers on the option play as Squyers ran eight yards for the touchdown. Charlie Orms was called on to kick the extra point which was good and the Bulldogs lead 7-0. The Bulldogs controlled the ball the first quarter as they racked up seven first downs. Deep in the second quarter, the Bulldogs were forced to punt which set the Mounties up for their lone touchdown of the game. With strong running by tailback, Tommy Blanton and a 9-yard pass completion to Tommy Wardlow from Larry Williams moved the Mounties into Ranger territory. Williams completed a pass to Ricky Abernathy, who made a sparkling catch on the 29-yard line. Santa Anna lowered its way to the nine yard line then on keeper to be left by Williams gave the Mounties first and goal at the two yard line.

New Industry Financing Is Topic at Special Meet

Next Wednesday At 9:30 a. m.

Financing new industry in Eastland County will be the subject of a special information meeting Wednesday, Oct. 11, at 9:30 a. m. in the County Courtroom on the third floor of the courthouse, west end.

The public is invited, and particularly those persons who are affiliated with industrial foundations, chambers of commerce, and all others interested in the industrialization of this county.

The program is sponsored by Eastland County Newspapers Inc., in cooperation with the county (Technical Action Panel, which made arrangements for the special speaker.

Bringing the program will be R. C. Hill, chief of the loan division of the Small Business Administration, Dallas. His primary purpose will be to explain new concepts for rural areas.

The Eastland meeting will be the first in the state, and arrangements were made by J. M. Boyie, local Farmers Home Administration supervisor, and chairman of the county TAP group. (TAP is made up of department heads of the various Department of Agriculture agencies here and meets monthly. Its purpose is to coordinate programs for improving the rural community, and all towns in this county are considered rural.)

Other members are Gilbert Meredith, county office manager for Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Com-

mittee; E. E. McAlister, work unit conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service of this area; and County Agent De Gordon, participating member.

The Wednesday meeting will be the regular monthly meeting for the group.

Also expected to attend the special meeting will be Charles Rogers of De Leon, recently appointed to a State Department of Agriculture position there of research and promotion of marketing for peanuts.

Representatives of the newspapers and the TAP members extend cordial invitations to everyone throughout the county interested in industrialization, to attend the Wednesday meeting.

One of the major topics to be discussed by Mr. Hill will be the new provisions in which the SBA loans sums to a local foundation which in turn helps new industry. Primary interest throughout the county by many is the possibility of establishing a peanut butter plant or similar facility which could profitably handle the county's chief product—peanuts.

It was pointed out that the SBA loans are loans and not grants, to be used for stimulating the rural economy. "It is a continuing outreach program of the USDA to help the rural area," Mr. Boyie said.

The program will probably last about an hour and a half and will afford ample time for questions and answers.

The role of the TAP and its individual members is one of supplying information to local individuals and organizations. A governing county industrialization foundation could conceivably be organized at a subsequent meeting, it was reported.

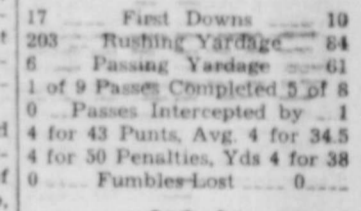

School Systems In All States Due To Be Surveyed

DALLAS — Elementary and secondary school systems in all 50 states will be surveyed this fall to obtain information about the racial characteristics of student bodies and faculties, the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare has announced.

Previous surveys have covered school districts in 17 southern states which have historically operated dual school systems for white and negro students, and which are now in the process of desegregating. These districts were surveyed last year.

An additional 2,000 of the nation's largest school districts will be surveyed for the first time this fall. Most of them have never operated dual school systems. These districts each enroll a minimum of 3,000 students. They represent less than ten percent of all districts, but an estimated 70 percent of the nation's public elementary and secondary school students are found in them.

Peter Libassi, Director of the Department's Office for Civil Rights said, "Under Title VI, this Department has a responsibility to assure itself that students in districts which receive Federal aid are not being subjected to discrimination or being denied the full benefits of educational programs on the ground of race, color, or national origin."

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Gorman Peanut Tour Conducted

A tour of five Gorman area peanut farms was conducted Thursday morning by De Gordon, Eastland County agricultural agent. The tour began at 9 a. m. with the Wallace peanut digger demonstration on the D. D. Warren farm.

Next stop was at the Claude Fuller farm for a check of irrigated peanuts. Fuller has harvested an early crop of peanuts with 60-bushel-per-acre yield, which is below the 1966 average but still a good yield.

Irrigated peanuts were also checked at the Gene Snyder farm north of Gorman. He harvested nine acres that produced 129 bushels per acre with a grade of 73.

Results of Di Syson for

thrip control were checked at the Durwood Burgess farm. Last on the Gorman tour was the J. O. Jackson farm west of Gorman.

These peanuts have been treated with Terroclor for control of southern blight.

The peanuts were in the process of being dug and complete results will not be known until the peanuts are harvested.

Fire Prevention Week To Be Observed Here

Observance of National Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 8-14, in Eastland County is being urged by both rural and city fire prevention leaders.

Ranger Fire Chief Charlie Isbell, Cisco Fire Chief H.L. Ferguson, Eastland Fire Chiefs Wayne Jackson and Guy Robinson, and Jack Cozart, President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, all urge citizens of Eastland County to pay special heed to the observance this year by taking steps to prevent costly fires.

"We urge everyone to develop good fire safety habits which include such things as care with matches and smoking, good housekeeping to get rid of rubbish, proper use of electrical fuses, appliances, and extension cords, and a constant general awareness of the ways fires start and how to avoid them," the local fire chief said. He added that fires killed over 12,000 people and the cost was approximately \$2 billion in the United States last year.

The local Farm Bureau President said the Fall and Winter months are the most vulnerable times of the year for rural fires. "When fire occurs on farm or rural property, damage is three to six times greater than in the average city fire," Jack Cozart said.
