## Our Favorite Recipes

### Escalloped Eggs Deluxe

8 hard cooked eggs  
1 cup cooked peas  
6 tablespoons butter  
2 tablespoons flour  
1½ cups milk  
4 eggs  
½ teaspoon salt  
1/8 teaspoon pepper

Prepare a sauce using 4 tablespoons of the butter, flour, milk, salt and pepper. Cool slightly. Butter baking dish and arrange peas in a layer on the bottom of the pan (6 cup size) with the sliced hard cooked eggs on top. Season each. Add the raw eggs to the sauce and beat to combine thoroughly. Pour over the eggs. Bake in a slow oven, 325 F. until firm about 45 to 60 minutes. Let stand in the pan for several minutes before unmolding. Garnish and serve hot with or without sauce. A well seasoned white sauce to which ½ cup chopped, blanched almonds is added may be served with the dish. An attractive effect may be secured by placing the center slices of the eggs around the outside of the dish. Use other vegetables if desired.

## THE LAW AND YOU

by Robt. (Bob) Kirk



DO YOU KNOW that one who furnishes labor or material to erect or repair a house or building has a statutory lien against the house or building for the sums due to him?

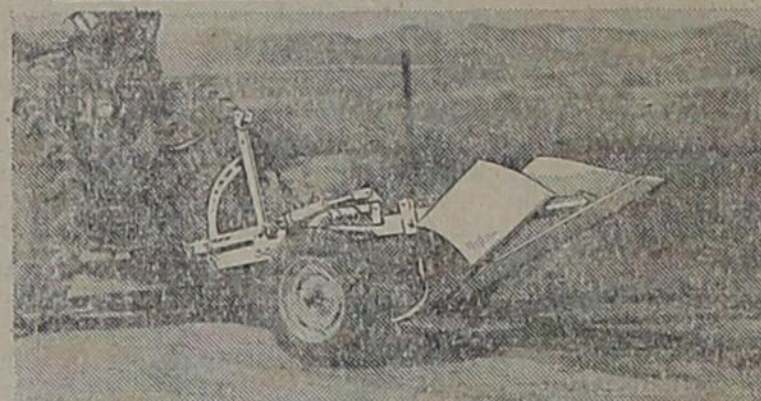
The Statutes of the State of Texas prescribe that those who furnish labor or materials in the erection or repair of a house or building or improvements to the same shall have a lien against the same, even though there is no express contract for the same, when the labor or material has been furnished, should said person fail to receive his pay for the labor or material, the Statutes set

out a prescribed manner in which he may secure a lien against said house or building. Certain definite steps are set forth by the Statutes, prescribing how this lien shall be established. Action to establish this lien, must be begun within three months, in some cases, and four months in other cases. If the party entitled to the lien, allows too much time to elapse before taking some action in regard to the same, he loses his lien, and has only an open account for the indebtedness.

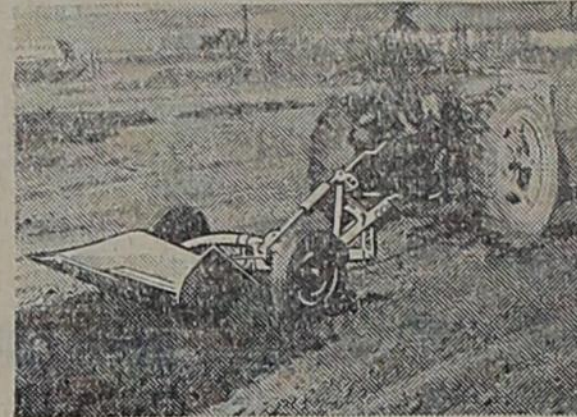
The preferable practice in all cases, would be to have a written Materialism and Mechanic's Lien and Note executed by the parties before any work is begun, but in the event the same is not done, the statutory lien, provides some protection for the laborer and materialman.

## WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

By Congressman Walter Rogers



TAXES: Taxes are still the number one worry of the low income groups. The present personal exemptions and exemptions for dependents are not much help with prices rising on all of the necessities of life. It is the low income group that suffers most and the higher the price of necessities go, the harder the struggle for existence. I have searched the tax laws continuously for an effective means of affording some relief to those hardest hit. My conclusion was that the quickest and most effective relief for the low income groups would be an increase in the personal and dependent exemptions. By making this change, there would be no discrimination against those in the higher income groups. In other words, the same rule would apply to all taxpayers. But the greatest relief from such increase would go to those who are in greatest need. On February 11, 1952, I introduced a bill in Congress to increase the personal exemptions on individuals from \$600.00 to \$1,000.00, and the exemptions for dependents from \$600.00 to \$750.00. If this bill is adopted, it will mean that a man with two children earning \$3,500.00 a year would not have to pay income taxes. Many people have said that it is not fair for those people to be relieved of paying taxes. This is not a very good argument because the greatest amount of federal taxes that all of us pay are hidden taxes on commodities that we buy, and local and state taxes still have to be paid as they are assessed. Under 1948 figures, it would amount to a tax reduction of about 25% of your entire tax bill if you are in this low income group. Passing this bill is not going to be an easy task, but I intend to do my best to get some relief so that those low income people can feed and clothe themselves and children. Another bill that I am preparing at the present time is a bill that would permit as an allowable deduction all medical and hospital fee incident to the birth of a child. Under the present tax laws and the law exemptions, a young couple is actually penalized for having children.

SOME OBJECTIONS TO WHAT THE VOICE OF AMERICA IS DOING: I have discussed the Voice of America with many people in this country and from abroad. Many of them praise it highly. However, many have some well founded objections that I think should be cured. They tell me that too much time is devoted to telling the people about the many luxuries that we have in this country; that the people in those Iron Curtain and Russian satellite countries actually

cannot conceive of any people enjoying the luxuries that we consider as necessities; that they are therefore very suspicious of those stories and doubt the truth of them. Those same people tell me that the broadcasts would be much more effective if they would talk to the people along lines they could understand. That is, tell them more about roast beef, mashed potatoes, turnip greens and cornbread, and less about ice cream and cake. In talking to citizens who have come over from those countries, I gather the same story. What the people in those countries want is talk about plain common everyday food and not talk about automobiles, electric ice boxes and television sets.

ONE WAY TO GET RICH: Ex-communist Whitaker Chambers is now publishing his book, "I Was a Witness". This book is being carried in the Saturday Evening Post in serial story form. The estimates here are that Chambers will get \$75,000.00 from the Post for those publication rights. It is also forecast that his book will be on the best-seller list and should net him several times the \$75,000.00. He is doing this under a system of government that he worked for many years to destroy and, by his own admissions, committed trea-

sonable acts against. Quite a reward for a confessed traitor. It is too bad he didn't get religion earlier. Some of the information that he had, and undoubtedly will publish, might have saved this country from the mistakes at Potsdam and Yalta.

THE BUFFALO LAKE MATTER: I am getting together a lot of facts on these Soil Conservation projects that are going to be mighty interesting. This situation may develop into a full fledged investigation, which I am sure the people of the Panhandle would welcome. One interesting point is that Buffalo Lake has cost the government about \$350,000.00 since 1939. According to the records I have been able to get hold of to date, the govern-

ment's cut out of the \$71,000.00 gross at Buffalo last year was approximately \$8,000.00. Another record I have shows an expenditure last year by the Government of \$5,806.00 up to October 1st. The concessionaire's contract calls for the project to be kept in good repair and fully maintained. If the government spent \$5,806.00 by October 1st last year, the chances are that they spent by the end of the year all of what they had collected, and more, on the project. This means that the government is furnishing a project that represents an investment of approximately \$350,000, and the only person making any money out of it is the concessionaire. That doesn't look like good business to me from the taxpayers'

and the fishermen's standpoint.

### County Teachers Hear C. M. Rogers

Castro county teachers Wednesday evening heard C. M. Rogers, superintendent of Amarillo schools, in an address on the work of the Texas State Teachers Association.
