More School Cash Due On Title 1 Program

The Ranger Public Schools have been notified that they will receive an additional \$10 per additional child under their Title 1 program which will amount to \$2,210 more money than budgeted in the Title 1 budget in September. The total Title 1 budget will now be \$35,691 instead of \$33,481 originally planned.

The board of trustees recently approved moving one teacher from Title 1 to the State Foundation program which will permit another \$2,000 to be rebudgeted, Supt. James R. Clark said, or about \$4,210 total.

The original budget called for \$900 to be spent at the county level in administrative cost and \$300 at the local level for a total of \$1,200. None

Re-Hearing Is Asked In Appeal Case Filed Here

A motion asking a rehearing was filed Thursday in the 11th Court of Civil Appeals by Mrs. Patay Riedel of Dallas.

The Appeals Court ruled on Jan. 19 that the trial court decision be "reversed and remanded" — holding that a new trial should be held. Mrs. Riedel's motion, filed by her Dallas law firm and Attorney Jack Frost of Eastland, asks that the new ruling be reconsidered. Monday is the deadline for filing for request for re-hearing, it was said.

The trial court awarded Mrs. Riedel \$260,780 in February of 1967 in a suit brought naming Ivan J. Allen as defendant.

The trial court decision was appealed by Allen, through his attorneys, Bill B. Hart and Virgil Seaberry, Jr., both of Eastland, to the higher court.

Allen's appeal from the trial court decision was based on several points, chiefly that "certain evidence excluded in the trial court caused the rendering of an improper judgment," and that the jury used statements not presented in court to determine amounts awarded to each child, it was stated.

at the local level is for salary.

Under instructional costs was budgeted \$22,210 for teacher salaries and \$1,000 for supplies for a total of \$23,210. \$200 was budgeted for a school nurse and \$25 for general supplies.

\$200 was budgeted to be paid to the Ranger School district in rental for classroom use, janitoring, books, water, gas and miscellaneous.

Since the money can only be spent for certain items Clark said that the \$4,200 now available in it would be spent for instructional supplies, books, and some equipment such as maps and globes.

Personnel now working on the Title 1 program include a kindergarten teacher, a primary remedial teacher, a primary office aide, two teacher aides in the first grade.

At Young school is an office aide and a remedial teacher. At the High School is a remedial reading teacher and a choir teacher for one period daily.

The first year of the program over \$42,000 was received in Federal Funds while last year \$30,004 was received.

No new personnel will be employed in the program this year, Clark said.

After 46 Years in Business O. K. Grocery Closes Doors

Saturday, Feb. 3, marked the closing of the O.K. Grocery and Market. Thus Ranger's oldest business firm to operate under one ownership became history.

The 46 year history of the business reads like an exciting adventure story. It was early in 1922 that a young couple, Mr. and Mrs. George Fengler of Detroit, Mich. came to visit her brother, the late Morris Leville and family of Ranger.

Here they found delightful weather in contrast to that of Michigan, friendly people and a town that had weathered the hectic boom days and was building for the future. Ranger appealed to them as a desirable place to call home so, since the grocery store at 501 W. Main St. was for sale, they purchased it from the owner, Jim Whalen, sent for their household furniture and personal belongings and established themselves at home and in business.

High quality merchandise, and courteous service to the town of approximately 10,000 population resulted in sales requiring a personnel of eight employees and two full delivery trucks.

In Oct. 1928, Mr. Fengler needed an "extra hand" for a few days and Miss Mary Frances Higgingbotham agreed to "help out." Just how efficient her help was is seen in the fact that she was with the store from Oct. 3, 1928 to date of closing, a total of more than 39 years; assuming management of the store at the death of Mr. Fengler on March 18, 1967. Mrs. Fengler preceded her husband in death July 24, 1964. Their son, Francis Fengler, his wife and four children reside in Irving.

In conversation with a reporter, Miss Higgingbotham recalled incidents during the lean depression years, mentioned successes and discouragements incident to rendering public service and, looking at the near-empty shelves of the store said "I shall miss my many friends and my work here. It has been my life for so many years, but nothing goes on forever and this is as it should be." She has accepted a full-time position at St. Rita's Catholic Church.

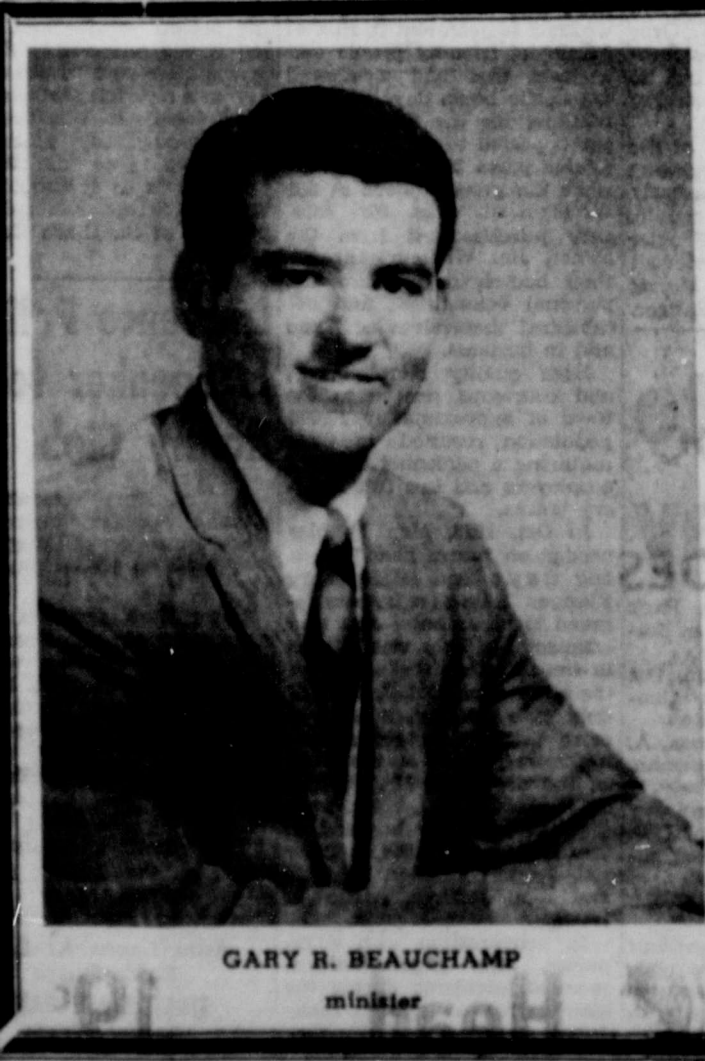

The Perilous Drugs: LSD

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles concerning the misuse of drugs.)

Drug misuse is in the news these days. "Hippies and beatniks appear in the pages of national publications," points out executive secretary Willard B. Simmons of the National Association of Retail Druggists, "but the true facts about drugs are not widely known. For that reason the pharmacists of the nation are pledged to bring a program of drug education to their communities, to help answer the questions of youth groups and adults." Druggists will cooperate with other groups including the Food and Drug Administration's Bureau of Drug Abuse Control.

Is the world of the drug-taker glamorous? Experts say it isn't. The person who abuses drugs tends to be child-like in personality, dependent, unable or unwilling to make realistic decisions, and reluctant to grow up. Psychedelic recruiters may stress new sensations of color and sound, a sense of love, expanded creativity. Court and medical records show otherwise, Simmons says.

Any use of LSD, known as acid, is potentially far more dangerous than misuse of am-

phetamines and barbiturates according to present research. Its effects may last beyond the present generation unless steps are taken to halt its use.

LSD is not distributed legally. No doctor can prescribe it and no druggist can sell it. Most street supplies are illegally produced, often under unsanitary conditions. A "trip," usually monitored by a non-taker of the drug to prevent the user from coming to harm, may or may not lead to a safe return. A "barn trip" can increasingly lead to the psychiatric ward or to a long period of hospitalization.

In its pure state LSD is odorless, colorless, tasteless, and one of the most powerful drugs known. Often it is bulked for sale with other substances. At the present time it has no known medical application although scholars have speculated that it might eventually help in treating alcoholics and in alleviating the pain of terminal patients. The drug produces hallucinations by crossing the sensory circuits so that sounds may appear as color, images may distort, unreal landscapes may appear. Unfortunately a round-trip is not guaranteed. Some users find it a one-way journey. A trip to the point of no return can leave the user imprisoned in a nightmare, dependent and maimed. Extensive hospitalization is often required. Abnormal brain waves that are recorded under LSD use may persist. An additional danger is the "afterflash," LSD's ability to take the user on an unexpected trip six months or a year after original use. When the hallucination recurs under unexpected conditions danger may increase.

Recent medical evidence also shows that chromosome damage may result. Genetic effects — which may appear — also are causing serious worry to researchers who are conducting animal tests as well as tests on confirmed LSD users.

Law enforcement officials also point out additional hazards that hover over the LSD user — delinquency, assault, robbery for the purpose of securing drug funds, highway accidents, arrests for drug distribution.

"These factors that affect the future health, the careers and the marital happiness of today's youth call for an all-out approach to bring factual material about dangerous drugs to all who are interested," Willard Simmons of the National Association of Retail Druggists concludes. "LSD and some of its new cousins are more potent than strychnine and cyanide. If young and old know the odds, they will join in a concerted effort to hold back these forces." Pharmacist Wayne Mathews of Ranger Rexall Drug, is presently aiding the national campaign to bring drug education to all interested groups.
