FB Membership Week Gets Underway Here

County Judge Scott Bailey has designated the week of Feb. 11-17 as "Farm Bureau Week" in Eastland County. The county Farm Bureau organization will have a special enrollment drive during this period as part of a statewide effort to push Farm Bureau membership in Texas over the 105,000 figure achieved in 1967.

The Eastland County Farm Bureau ended its 1967 membership year with 729 members. The official proclamation called for citizens "to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Eastland County Farm Bureau."

Earlier Gov. John Connally proclaimed the same period as "Farm Bureau Week in Texas."

Jack Cozart of Cisco is president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau. Membership chairman is B. T. Graham of Cisco; other volunteers who will be working on the drive are Sam Kimmell, R. L. Ricks, B. M. Campbell, Dora Schaefer, Mrs. Henry Fry, Mrs. K. F. Kirk, Luke Palmer, and John Love.

The committee chairman said every farmer and rancher in the county is needed

"as a member and leader" in Farm Bureau.

"Each of us in agriculture has too great an outlay in our business not to do all that we can to protect our investment in capital, time and labor," he declared.

The text of the proclamation issued by Judge Bailey reads:

GREETINGS: WHEREAS, agriculture is essential to the economy of Eastland County, our State and Nations and

WHEREAS, the productive efficiency of our farmers and ranchers have helped stabilize food prices and the cost of living for all our citizens; and

WHEREAS, this record of achievement has resulted from educational and technological advancement in agriculture under free choice system; and

WHEREAS, farmers and ranchers have recognized the value of joining together in organized effort to promote and protect their interests; and

WHEREAS, three out of four farm and ranch families in this Nation belonging to a general farm organization are members of the Farm Bureau; and

WHEREAS, Farm Bureau is a free, independent non-governmental, voluntary organization of farm and ranch families united for the purpose of analyzing their problems and formulating action to achieve educational improvement, economic opportunity, and social advancement, thereby promoting the national welfare;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Scott Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County, do hereby designate Feb. 12-17 as Farm Bureau Week in Eastland County and urge our citizens to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

Ranger To Vote Tuesday On City Sales Tax Issue

Polls Open 8 a.m.

Ranger voters will cash ballots for or against the adoption of a City Sales Tax in an election to be held on Tuesday, Feb. 13.

The proposed one per cent tax is offered as an equitable source of revenue, designed to allow the town to provide facilities adequate to meet the needs of a growing community. The tax has been accepted

by many and rejected by a few Texas cities and towns within the past six months.

The election will be held in City Hall with polls open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., according to A. E. Crawley, election judge.

Mr. Crawley reminds residents that qualification for voting in this election is a 1967 poll tax receipt or exemption for that year. Elderly voters are required to submit registration for the present year (1968).

Lloyd Bruce, Glyn Gilliam,

Wayne Mathews, James Ratliff, and D. W. P. Watkins were named as the study committee by the City Commission to study the feasibility of a one cent sales tax in Ranger.

This committee was appointed by the City Commission several months ago for the purpose of making a study of the City Sales Tax Issue which hundreds of other cities had been confronted with. A survey was made by interviewing numerous individuals

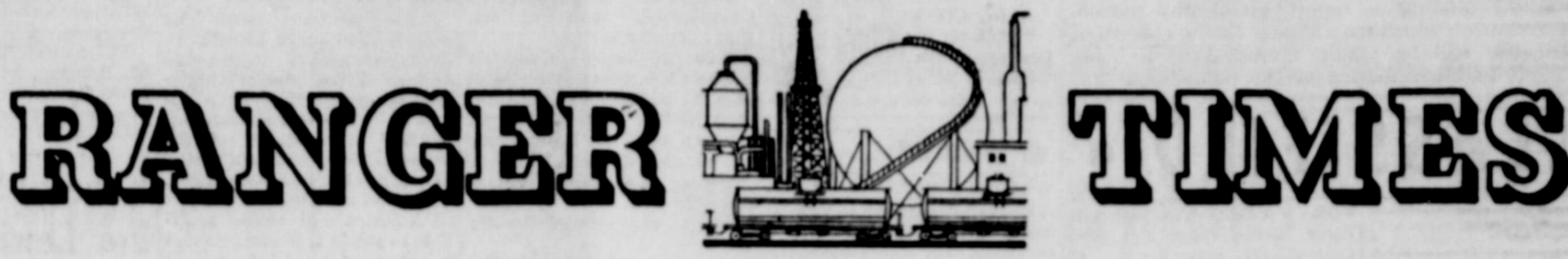
and business people as to whether or not the City Commission should call an election for the purpose of voting upon the matter of a City Sales Tax. Results of the survey indicated that a majority of those interviewed felt that this was a "Fair Tax" and would be in favor of the City Commission calling an election to vote on this matter and that they would support the issue.

In a meeting with the City Commission, the report of the

committee was presented and discussed at length as to how the additional revenue would be used should a sales tax be approved by the voters. At that time the City Commission expressed the opinion that the additional revenue was needed badly and that should the election be called and carried, the funds would be used for: better wages for city employees, replacement of worn-out equipment, better street maintenance, park improvements, and improvements to the water

sewerage departments. Subsequently, the city commission voted to call the election for Feb. 13 so that the voters could be determined for themselves whether or not they wanted the City Sales Tax.

It is the opinion of those interviewed as well as the committee that this is a "Fair Tax" and the committee joins other local citizens who are interested in a better and progressive Ranger in urging for themselves whether or not the passage of this measure.

Students of RHS To Participate In State Contest

Students of the Ranger Public Schools will be making fire prevention posters this month and next in preparation for the state contest April 1.

Pilot Receives Concussion As Chopper Crashes on Ranch

A U. S. Army helicopter pilot from Fort Wolters, crashed his TH-55 helicopter on

the A. J. Rogers Ranch about 12 miles southeast of Ranger Friday morning about 1:30.

Major Louis J. Rochat, public information officer at Fort Wolters, said the flier was on a routine training mission when the accident occurred.

Major Rochat credited Buddy Rogers, the first to arrive on the scene, with helping the pilot from the wreckage and possibly saving him from more extensive injuries.

The pilot was treated at Ranger General Hospital and then moved to Besch Army Hospital at Mineral Wells. Spokesmen here said he was suffering from a minor concussion and facial lacerations.

The pilot was on an advanced training mission and was flying one of the three Huey helicopters of that type stationed at Wolters. The craft was reported to be extensively damaged in the crash and an investigation is under way to determine the cause of the accident.

The name of the pilot was withheld by Wolters officials pending the notification of relatives.

Wilson Is Named County Leader For Annual Easter Seal Appeal

H. T. Wilson, President of Eastland National Bank, will serve as Easter Seal Representative and Treasurer for the 1968 Easter Seal Appeal in Eastland County, it was announced by Robert W. Milam, M. D. of McAllen, President of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

Residents of Eastland County will receive the annual Easter Seal Appeal letters in the mail beginning March 1. The Easter Seal Appeal, conducted yearly to provide disabled persons and their families treatment and service adapted to specific community needs, will be conducted until Easter Sunday, April 14.

Mr. Wilson is one of 169 men and women throughout Texas who are serving in this capacity. The cost of the one million dollars, financed mainly by the Easter Seal Appeal. Almost 90 per cent of all funds raised by the Easter Seal Appeal remain in Texas to support the growing needs of the disabled in the state.

Special emphasis is being given in the 1968 Easter Seal Appeal to the disabled citizen or his family in Eastland County who may need assistance and not know where to obtain it. Any disabled person can contact Mr. Wilson at Eastland National Bank, Eastland, who will refer the request for services to the Easter Seal Society. A determination of the extent and type of assistance needed and the most efficient means of obtaining that assistance will be made. Arrangements for needed treatment or service will be made by the Easter Seal Society.

Misuse of Drugs

Can the practice of misusing drugs and other sensation-distorting substances add to creativity? Expand mental abilities? Give insight?

There is increasing evidence that it does not. On the contrary, drug misuse can limit abilities. A number of medical and psychological tests show that a conviction of increased power is part of the drug abuser's feelings about the experience but not supported by objective evidence.

The true facts about drug misuse need to be brought to every community to provide balance to the false and exaggerated claims that have appeared. Executive secretary Wilbur B. Simmons of the National Association of Retail Druggists has announced, "For that reason the druggists of America will make available to youth and adult groups a broad range of information on drug use and misuse."

Among the drugs presently misused are amphetamines and barbiturates, Simmons points out, which can have dangerous effects if not used according to a doctor's prescription and druggist's recommendations.

It is known that the sniffing of glue, cleaning fluid and other chemical fumes can cause physical damage to the body. Additional dangers are unconsciousness, coma and possible suffocation when plastic bags are used.

In New York at the present time, over 200 patients a year are being admitted to Bellevue Hospital with LSD-caused paranoia and schizophrenia. Many go on to state mental hospitals.

IQ has been found to drop markedly under LSD ingestion. Visual - motor functions are disorganized and impaired. Brain wave abnormalities are recorded.

Salute to Police Departments . . .

(Editor's note: Paul Harvey, noted commentator and journalist, strongly defended the law enforcement officer in this recent column reprinted from the "FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin".)

What are policemen made of? Don't credit me with this mongrel prose; it has many parents; at least 420,000 of them: Policemen.

A policeman is a composite of what all men are, a mingling of saint and sinner, dust and deity.

Culled statistics wave the fan over the stinkers, underscore instances of dishonesty and brutality because they are "news". What that really means is that they are exceptional, unusual, not commonplace.

Buried under the froth is the fact: Less than one-half of 1 percent of policemen misfit that uniform.

That's a better average than you'd find among clergymen.

What is a policeman made of? He, of all men, is at once the most needed and the most unwanted.

He's a strangely nameless creature who is "sir" to his face and "fuzz" behind his back.

He must be such a diplomat that he can settle differences between individuals so that each will think he won.

But . . . If the policeman is neat, he is conceited; if he's careless, he's a bum.

If he's pleasant, he's a flirt; if he's not, he's a grouch.

He must make instant decision which would require months for a lawyer.

If he hurries, he's careless; if he's deliberate, he's lazy.

He must be the first to an accident and infallible with a diagnosis.

He must be able to start breathing stop bleeding, tie splints, and above all, be sure the victim goes home without a limp.

Or expect to be sued.

The police officer must know every gun, draw on the run, and hit where it doesn't hurt.

He must be able to whip two men twice his size and half his age without damaging his uniform and without being "brutal".

If you hit him, he's a coward; if he hits you, he's a bully.

A policeman must know everything—and not tell.

He must know where all the six is—and not partake.

The policeman must, from a single human hair, be able to describe the crime, the weapon and the criminal—and tell you where the criminal is hiding.

But . . . If he catches the criminal, he's lucky; if he doesn't, he's a dunce.

If he gets promoted, he has political pull; if he doesn't he's a dud.

The policeman must chase bum leads to a dead end, stake out ten nights to tag

one witness who saw it happen—but refuses to remember.

The policeman must be a minister, a social worker, a diplomat, a tough guy, and a gentleman.

And of course he'll have to be a genius . . .

For he'll have to feed a family on a policeman's salary.

He runs files and writes reports until his eyes ache to build a case against some felon who'll get dealt out by a shameless shamus or an "honorable" who isn't.
