THE GORDON SPOT

As I travel over the county I see more and more damage caused by the ice storms this winter. The ice broke and splintered shade trees as well as fruit and nut trees. Earl Walker's pecan orchard at Cisco was one that was heavily damaged. At least one-half of the limbs on many of the trees were broken.

Evergreen trees also received heavy damage. An excellent temporary tree wound dressing is orange shellac. This is sometimes hard to find, but is usually available at nurseries and garden centers.

There are three simple guidelines to follow when removing the broken branches. The damaged branches should be removed flush with the branch. Stubs will only lead to a proliferation or sucker growth later on.

possible premature death of the trees. It is best to hire a trained person to do the job if the ice damaged tree is large or the breakage has occurred high in the branches. However, many people will be doing their own work.

To prevent tearing the bark and causing additional damage to the tree in removing heavy limbs, make the first cut with the saw from the bottom side of the limb about 12 inches from the main branch. When the saw starts to bind make the second cut from above about eight inches from the main branch. After the branch splits off remove the remaining stub with a saw flush with and parallel to the main branch. Lastly, apply the tree wound dressing to the exposed surface to prevent the entrance of disease and insects.

The extension publication "Modern Pruning Methods" is available in our office and will be helpful when you do your pruning.

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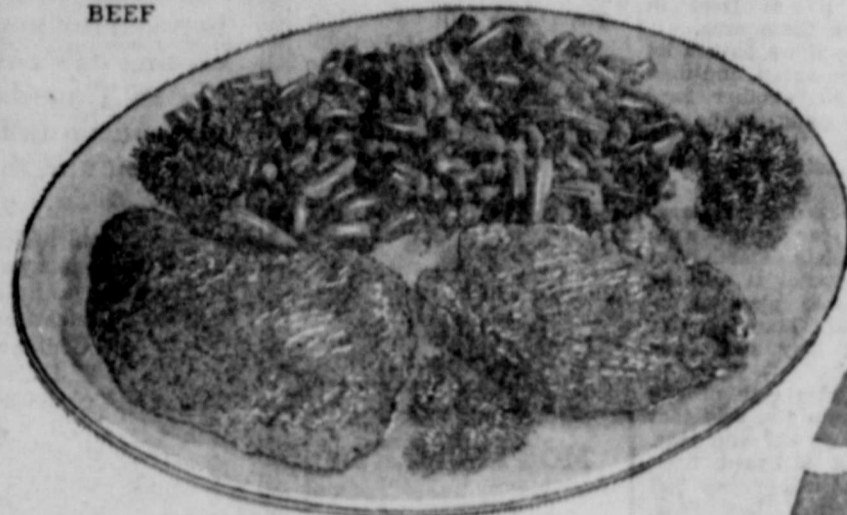

Crop Outlook Is Bright
If Weather Stays Right

Ever-weather watchful as is the custom of farmers in this area, everywhere, those in this area are particularly anxious because of what appears to be the makings of an ideal season ahead.

With a bounty of winter moisture already, the prospects for a bumper year are bright, according to County Agent De Gordon.

"The small grains are in, and with all the seasoning, it should be a good year," he said. Commenting on the moisture, he said, the prospects are excellent, but hurried to add that a lot can happen in the months ahead.

Evaluating the fruit crop prospects, Mr. Gordon said that overall, he doesn't believe the total crop has been hurt yet, although those trees which were in full bloom during the last freeze, probably

were damaged. He said he had had reports of many peach and plum trees in bloom in the Cisco area.

"Of course if we have a lot of warm days ahead, and then get hit with another hard freeze, it's going to be too bad," he said.

Peanut planting will probably be later this year, he guesses because the soil is so cold. Last year some were planted by late March but the agent guesses it will be April 15 before planting begins this year. Many wait of course until May and June he said.

Robbie Roberts on of the Gorman Peanut Co. said that he looks for a good crop year. He had just returned from the Southeast where they had a bumper crop last year "like ours two years ago."
