There are three simple guidelines to follow when removing the broken branches Refread Tires The damaged branches should be removed flush with the branch. Stubs will only lead to a proliferation or sucker growth later on.

To prevent tearing the bark and causing additional damage to the tree in removing heavy limbs, make the first cut with the saw from the bottom side of the limb about 12 inches from the main branch. When the saw starts bind make the second from above about eight inches from the main branch. Af-ter the branch splits off remove the remaining stub with a saw flush with and paralle to the main branch. Lastly apply the tree wound dressing to the exposed surface to prevent the entrance of disease and insects.
