## Case Is Heard In 91st Dist. Court

Anytime four attorneys get together in a courtroom, there's bound to be a lot of talk — and there was three hours and twenty minutes of talk during the Kirk eligibility hearing in 91st District Court Friday.

And a final decision isn't expected until late next week according to Presiding Judge E. H. Griffin of Breckenridge, sitting in for 91st Judge Frank Sparks. Judge Griffin admitted that he was "puzzled" by some of the testimony he heard during the hearing.

The hearing was held to establish a ruling on a petition brought by Earl Conner Jr., holding that Truman Kirk is not qualified by residence as a candidate for the May 4 Democratic nomination to District Judge. Both Conner and Kirk are announced candidates for the nomination (Nomination in this county virtually means election).

Represented by Eastland Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry that a man's legal residence is established "by where his family lives." Kirk's wife and children live in Abilene, where she teaches school, testimony showed, although the family spends much time in Cisco, and eventually plans to move to this county when school is out.

Bryan Bradberry of Abilene, counsel for Kirk, cited other test cases which hold that the test is "physical presence" and "intention." He further pointed out that the husband has the right to determine domicile.

The legal brief outlining all the cases cited by Bradberry was given to Judge Griffin, and Attorney Seaberry is to present his brief to Judge Griffin Monday.

"I can readily see the need for haste," Judge Griffin said, "but I want to take some time on this." He said it would probably be Thursday or Friday of next week before he announces whether he grants the temporary injunction to keep Kirk's name off the ballot.

The County Democratic Executive Committee will meet Monday, March 18, to draw for positions on the ballot.

The courtroom wasn't full, but had a good number of spectators including seven of the nine county election judges, who were seated in the petition, along with Kirk.

A meeting was held Monday afternoon between the four attorneys, principals in the case, but a statement of facts apparently was not agreed upon, and the hearing went on as scheduled Friday.

It had been reported that if certain facts could be agreed upon, the matter could be taken on up the judicial ladder for decision — possibly directly to the State Supreme Court.

Kirk spent two hours on the witness stand himself, and volunteered more information than was asked for in nearly every instance. Only other witnesses were J. W. Pruitt of Abilene, Tom Stark and H. A. McCanlies, all of Cisco.

Kirk, 43, stated first that he was not separated from his wife, on questioning by Seaberry, and that they had three children. Much was made of when Kirk actually closed his Abilene law office and moved to Cisco. He said the close was gradual, and that he did business in both towns for quite a while. A series of documents was introduced, some of which stated that Kirk was a resident of Taylor County. His voter registration was pointed out — he registered in Abilene, but did not vote there, he said. He was appointed a notary public in Abilene.

Deeds on record showed Kirk to be a resident of Abilene. He stated that he

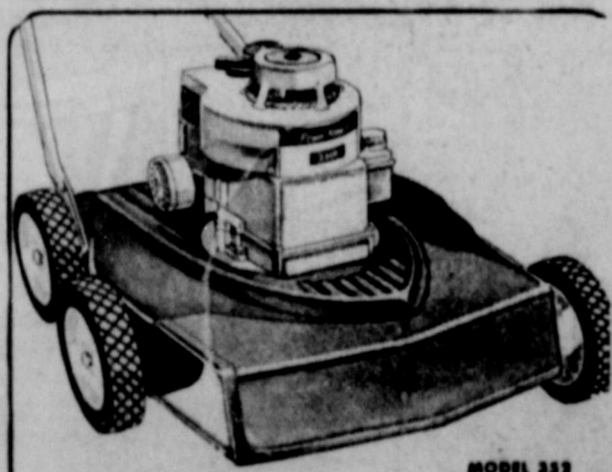

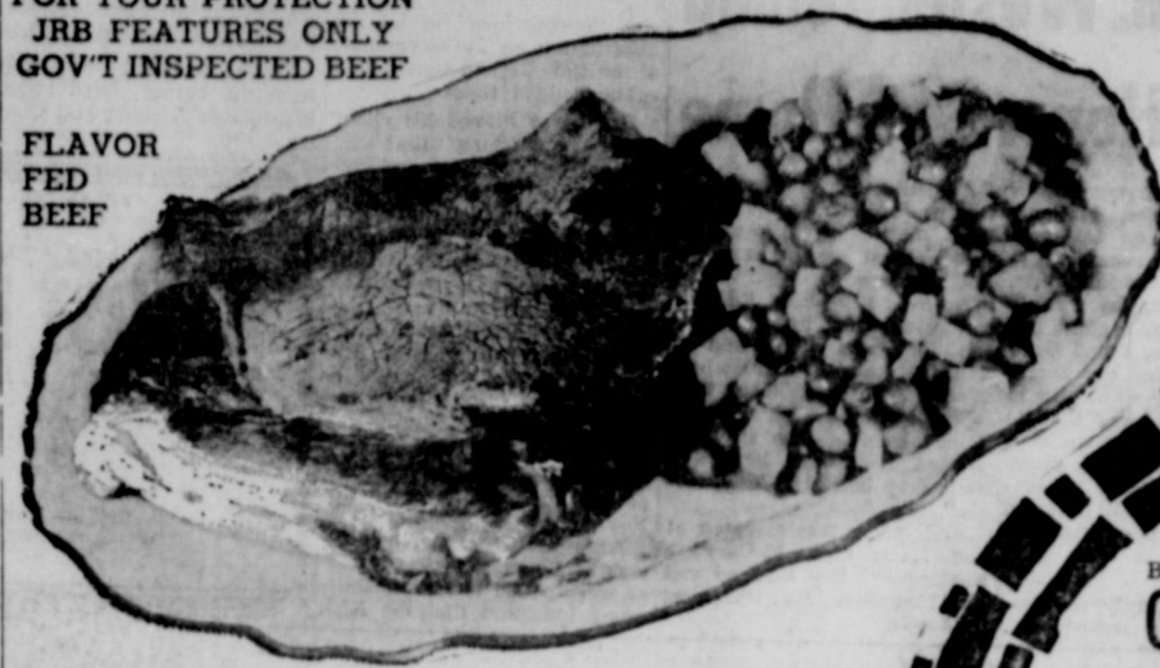

was "unconscious" of all the information on the documents at the time he had signed, and acknowledged them.

Bradberry moved his client faster, establishing that he was active in business and civic undertakings in Cisco, that he was an instructor at Cisco Junior College, a position he gained by proclaiming that his intentions were to move his family to Cisco to become permanent residents. Other testimony showed that Kirk had been appointed attorney in cases in 91st District Court for residents as early as September, 1965. (Candidate eligibility on residence covers the period two years prior to the Nov. 7, 1968 election).

After a 30-minute lunch recess at 1 p.m., Kirk's witnesses were called and their testimony indicated that the Kirk

family considered Cisco its home. A total of 22 affidavits were introduced, each of which was to show that Kirk was a legal resident of Cisco.

These included testimony from his barber, from school officials in Abilene and Cisco,

and others. Closing arguments were devoted to legal points and the appropriateness of test cases on which to judge the point in question. The case is believed to be a "milestone" -- the first of

## RANGE SEEDING GETTING UNDERWAY IN COUNTY

Range seeding is now getting underway. Several ranchers and livestock farmers have already seeded range grasses. Others who have grass plantings scheduled will be planting as soon as conditions lend themselves for them to do so.

J. R. Files, L. M. Files, Arlton Smith, H. L. King, Jeff Fields, Ed Harrison, Bill Harrison, and Mrs. Kenneth Jameson have already seeded native grasses on brush land

after destroying the brush. Where the pastures already have a fair or better stand of native grasses, seedings are done only in disturbed areas from where the trees were removed.

If the pasture does not have enough good native stand to reseed it, the whole pasture is disturbed with heavy equipment—root rake, chopper, or tandem, and seeded during the same operation.

With the good deep moisture conditions, excellent stands are expected. Especially plantings made early enough for the seedlings to become rooted well below its mid-summer competition. January through April is the most ideal seeding time.

Seedings are being made of side oats grama and king ranch bluestar on shaley sites and other tight land sites. Sides oats grama and little bluestar and Indian grass are being made on our sandy loams and shallower on tight sands. While a lot of our deep blow sands are going to weeping lovegrass.

There is a cost-share in range seedings through the ACP. Also the Great Plains Conservation Program has a cost-share for those with GP-CP contracts.

drilling seed on prepared seedbeds the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District has drills available on a lease basis.

If you are planning on some range seedings this year, it's time to act.

## Irrigated Acres Account For Half of County Crop

Peanut-crop irrigation looms bigger and bigger as the bright star for Eastland County, judging from the reports just compiled.

With 1968 giving every indication of being another stellar year, the figures on dry, dry 1967 are quite impressive. The irrigated acres, some 9,000 of them, accounted for virtually half of the total county yield, according to figures released by the ASCS office.

In 1967 the county's 31,826.6 acres produced 29,814,188 pounds for an average per-acre yield of 937 pounds. The 90,000 irrigated acres had a per-acre yield of 1,604 pounds, accounting for 14,436,000 pounds of the total. The dry land crops yielded 675 pounds average per acre, for a total of 15,379,000.

It is no secret that 1967's yield at 937 was far below the bumper 1966's 1,259 per acre, but it's refreshing to note that even 1967 was ahead of 1965's 757; 1964's 597; and 1963's 529.

The value of the 1967 crop at 11 cents per pound came out to \$3,279,560.68.

Irrigation got its start here in 1964 and in 1966, there were 5,950 acres under sprinklers and 8,450 last year. Cost for installation is about \$135 an acre.

The Staff, Gorman and De-demona area, where the heaviest irrigation is concentrated, continues to report the heaviest yield.

Congressman Omar Burleson announced that a \$1,048,000 REA loan has been approved to the Earth County REA, serving Erath, Comanche, Eastland, Hamilton, Bosque, Coryell, Hood, Somervell and Young Counties, to finance 130 miles of distribution line to serve 900 new consumers and to finance extensive system improvements, including 34 miles of new tie line and the conversion of 48 miles of existing and related facilities.

Most of Eastland County's rural area are served by Texas Electric Service Co., West Texas Utilities Co., and the Comanche County REA.

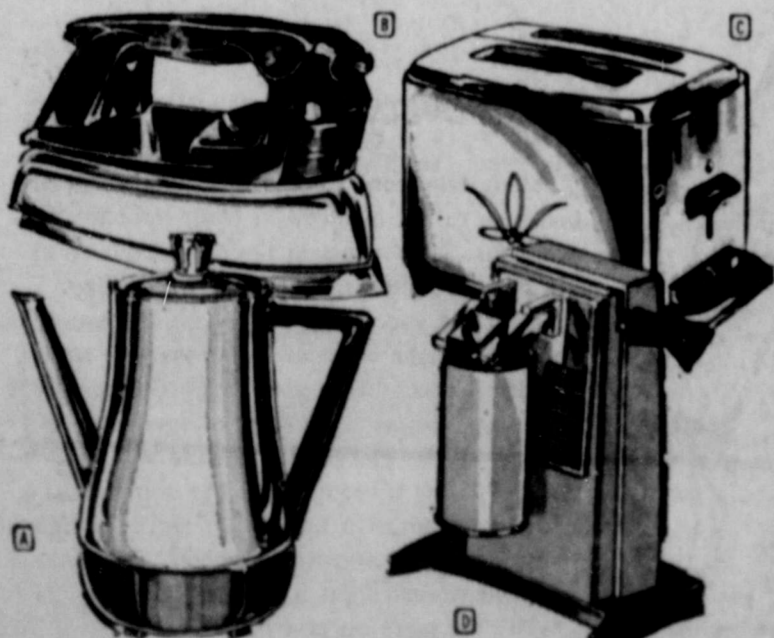

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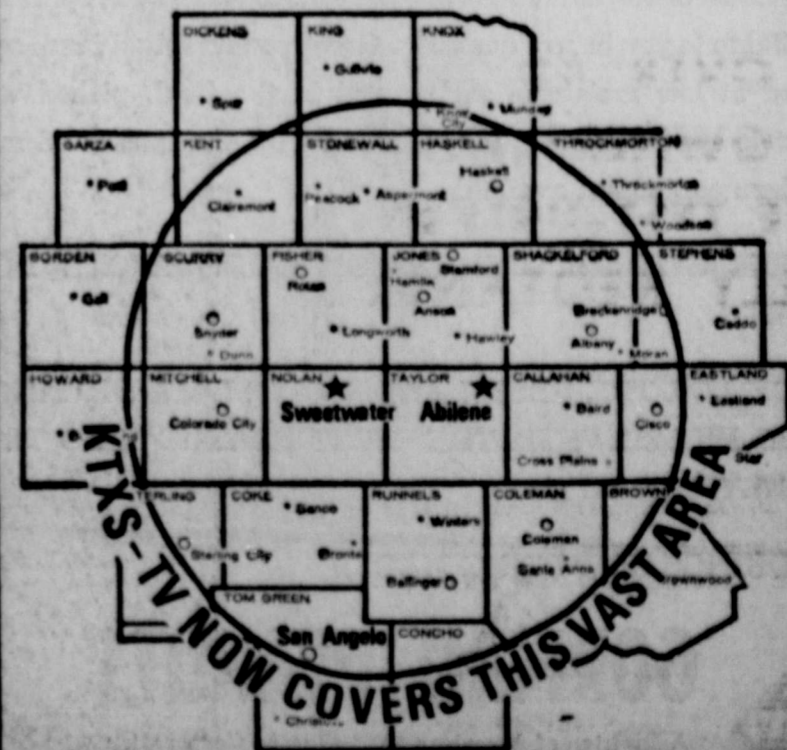
