Two Persons Killed In Auto Accident

A rain-slick highway resulted in the death of two persons on Highway 80 in Ranger Monday morning. The accident occurred at 10:45 a. m.

Killed in the accident was Mrs. Cora Asposito Caldwell, 52, of 909 Zeldia Dr., Hurst, Texas. Pronounced dead on arrival at the Ranger General Hospital was Clyde Douglas Caldwell, 43, also of Hurst. Injured in the accident was Allan F. Michaelson, 34, 4928 Forrest Bend, Dallas.

Mrs. Caldwell was reported to be driving a 195 Ford. A witness said that the Ford went into a spin in the rain-slick highway and spun for 40 to 50 feet before hitting the 1968 Buick, driven by Michaelson.

The two men were taken to the Ranger General Hospital by a Killingsworth ambulance. Police Chief J. W. Vinon investigated the accident.

Truman Snell Is Injured in Wreck Near Carbon

Truman Dwayne Snell of Carbon was admitted to Eastland Memorial Hospital Tuesday evening about 7:30 p. m. following a one-car accident a mile south of Carbon. Snell was taken to the hospital by an Arrington Hamner Funeral Home ambulance.

The 1966 Buick driven by Snell slid on wet pavement, struck a telephone pole, pulled down some ten feet of fence, and landed in a sand field about 80 yards from the highway, according to investigating officer Ken Perry of Eastland. Perry stated that the car body separated from the frame and car parts were scattered over a large area.

Snell was thrown from the car. He suffered lacerations on the back and head, Perry stated.

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WEATHER TIPS

TORNADOES — Part II

This is a continuation of the previous "Weather Tips" column that appeared in the last edition of this paper, and concerns the causes of tornadoes, and their disastrous effects. As stated before, in being in the lookout for the possibility of tornadoes, one must keep in mind that several important ingredients are necessary: there must be nearly always a thunderstorm taking place, or about to take place; the air should be warm and humid, with a low barometer; and, the approaching storm producing the thunderstorm should have cool air aloft.

Now, this cool air aloft situation causes a cloud condition that will sometimes fool people who are on the lookout for tornadoes, and this condition must not be mistaken for "a tornado aloft," or "tornado in the clouds."

To explain this, the cool air on top of the low, cumulus clouds often forms pockets that hang down, due to the heavier weight of the cool air. This is called an "inversion," and some of these inversions are often mistaken for tornadoes by conscientious observers. However, this is not to say that some of these pockets, particularly the elongated ones, cannot eventually begin spinning and actually turn into a full-blown tornado. But, they must be watched carefully, so that misinformation is not fed to the warning system, thereby unnecessarily alarming the community.

The following guidelines have been devised by the Weather Bureau to help set up an effective warning system: Set up a Community Warning Center. In East-

land's case, the center receiving and disseminating cloud and weather information during a Tornado Watch, is the Eastland Fire Department through their contact with Texas Department of Public Safety patrol units, Eastland County Sheriff's Department radio units, local police units, and Fire Department radio equipped trucks.

While these tornado watches are in effect, the aforementioned organizations carry out their assigned tasks, with most of the populace completely unaware that it is going on, and that their interests are being looked out for.

So, if you hear either through the television stations in Abilene, or local radio stations, that our area is in a Tornado Watch zone, it would be wise to pay attention to instructions issued by those in charge. No community is entirely free from the threat of tornadoes; and, a community warning network cannot be completely 100 percent effective. There is always a chance that a tornado will not be detected in time for the local warning system to go into operation.

You will notice that I have referred to Abilene television stations. This was not done in preference to these particular two stations, however, it is a known meteorological fact that all major weather patterns in the northern hemisphere move from the north, northwest, and southwest. Therefore, these two stations would have prior knowledge of the weather approaching our area, due to their connection with the Abilene Weather Bureau.

In our previous article on tornadoes, the local warning method was mentioned, and it should be mentioned again for the benefit of those who might have missed the last edition of this paper.

In case an actual tornado has been sighted and verified by one of the radio units mentioned; or, some responsible individual phones a verified report to the Eastland Fire Department, Fire Chief Wayne Jackson has stated that the following alarm has been authorized for alerting purposes: one long blast of two minutes duration on the fire alarm, followed by a wailing, or undulating, signal approximately 30 seconds to one minute in length.

If this should happen, and you are within hearing distance of the alarm, you should take immediate cover. However, it is rather doubtful that the fire alarm can be heard in the western parts of Eastland during a thunderstorm, due to the fact that prevailing wind currents would carry the sound away from that part of town. Perhaps the fire department will assign a vehicle to that part of town to alert the people by public address system or fire siren.

In our next, and concluding, article on the subject of tornadoes, we will go into the recognized and approved plan of self preservation while a tornado is in progress.

hair. Three Texas producers, James L. Powell of Fort McKavett, Al Dishman of Uvalde and Arner Earwood of Sono, have recently completed a study in South Africa which included production, grading and marketing.

Texas mohair producers have had a drastic reduction in income because of sagging prices of mohair. They pro-

duce more than half the world supply. The Council was organized to improve and promote mohair.

The meeting will begin at 10 a. m. on above date at Brady High School and is open to all who are interested in trying to attain higher prices for mohair. The program will include a report on the research facilities for mohair, and samples will be available from the Hanora Fabrics, Rodesco Co. of Philadelphia, which has built machinery to use Texas mohair in products.

The meeting should con-

clude by 1 p. m. Lunch will be available in the school cafeteria.

Joe Jackson and Perry Horton are directors from District 10 which comprises six counties. Directors are elected according to number of pounds of mohair sold and applied for parity through the local A.S.C.S. Office.
