"Requiem" by Gabriel Faure To Be Presented by Local Choirs April 7

The combined choirs of Ranger Junior College, Ranger High School, and numerous people representing local church choirs will present on April 7, 1968 at 3:00 p.m. in the First Baptist Church, a major choral work called "Requiem" by Gabriel Faure.

A Requiem may be said or sung for a person or persons who have only recently passed on or as a remembrance. This performance is to be dedicated to those people who have been lost in the Vietnam War. It is also dedicated to

pre-Easter music for the Ranger community.

The following is a translation of the "Requiem by Gabriel Faure.

Ranger Marine Killed In Vietnam

Marine PFC Larry J. Rodgers, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Burrow of Ranger, was reported killed in action March 17 at Quang Nam, South Vietnam. Military authorities said Thursday night that Rodgers died of fragmentation wounds received from a hostile explosive device while on a military operation.

Born Nov. 3, 1947 in Waxahachie, he moved with his parents to Ranger two years ago. Following graduation from Ranger High School in May, 1967, he enlisted in the U. S. Marine Corps and on July 23, where he received his training at Camp Pendleton. Prior to departure for Vietnam on Dec. 11, he spent a 30-day leave with his family.

He was a member of Memorial Baptist Church.

Survivors include his parents; two sisters, Bonnie and Mrs. C. V. Shumgers and Caris Burrow of home; maternal grandparent Mrs. Golden Rodgers, all Waxahachie.

Funeral arrangements and a paternal grandmother pending and will be announced by Rudolph's Funeral Home of Waxahachie.

May GOP Ballot Will Offer 2 Referendums

The May 4 Republican primary ballot in Eastland County will offer the parimutuel betting and liquor-by-the-drink referendum proposition County Chairman Mrs. H. Bulgerin of Eastland has announced.

The Eastland County Democratic Executive Committee recently decided to omit questions from the Democrat primary ballot.

Mrs. Bergin said: "This is a perfect example of the need for a two-party system in Texas. In a predominantly Democratic County, the majority of the voters will be unable to express their views on these issues. Since rural areas generally vote against these issues, the big city vote machines will carry more opinion value than usual."

"We feel that our ballot will allow at least some public opinion to be expressed either for or against these issues," Mrs. Bulgerin said.

Those seeking re-election in the Republican Party in Eastland County include: Mrs. Bulgerin, County chairman; Lloyd London, Cisco Precinct Chairman; Mrs. Ven Whit Ranger chairman; Mrs. Ne St. John, Eastland; Mrs. Patricia Goss, Rising Star; Mr. Keith Witt, Gorman; and Mr. W. C. Orde, Olden.

The Republican Executive Committee has set for a May 11, as date for the County Convention. Mrs. Bulgerin announced. Site will be the County Courthouse, exact location to be announced.

A boy died for me in Quang Nam last week.

I didn't know him, and he didn't know me, but he died for me just the same.

I read it in the morning paper and, later in the night, I talked with his grief-stricken parents.

He has gone home at last—but not the way he had dreamed of going.

I thought a lot about it as I ate a good, hot meal in my safe, comfortable home.

The news was pretty much as usual—the war in Vietnam... college kids demonstrating against changes in the draft rules, screaming and mugging for the camera—more teachers out on strike.

In the evening I tuned in a program on which a comic wisecracked sourly about the way the war was going—and probably got more money for doing it than this boy had been paid all the time he was in service.

Then I went to bed, free from any fear that the house might be blown up by the enemy. The enemy is busy over in Vietnam.

I haven't been able to get this boy off my mind. I just wonder if he was terribly frightened, but of course, I know he was. He assumed his duty willingly but deep down inside, he had probably come to hate war even more than I do.

But, somehow, those boys in the thick of it over there seem to understand more clearly than many of us just why they are there and the dreadful alternative if they weren't.

How had he felt about those characters who are defying the government, calling our leaders murderers, burning draft cards and pulling down the American flag?

However he may have felt, he fought for that American flag until he was killed.

It's too late now, of course, to try to thank this boy for what he did; but it's not too late to thank his buddies for what they are doing.

But just how do you thank someone for facing death for you?

How do you reassure him that as long as men like him are willing to die for freedom, freedom is worth dying for—even though it be abundantly both used and abused by the very ones who disdain to fight for it?

So you hope that the buddies of our marine who died last week in Quang Nam realize that gratitude is quiet and seldom makes the headlines while dissent is loud and demands attention.

You hope that the buddies of our marine and all the other boys over there know that multiplied millions of Americans at home are with them all the way—at least as far as it is humanly possible to go.

I breathe a fervent prayer that the boy knew it as he died for me in Quang Nam last week.

Appeals Court Gives Mandate In Allen Suit

A mandate from the 11th Court of Civil Appeals in the Ivan J. Allen vs. Patsy H. Riedel damage suit has been filed in 91st District Court, ordering that the trial-court judgment was in error and is therefore reversed and remanded.

Mrs. Riedel and her four minor children were awarded \$770,000 in damages by a trial court jury in the February, 1967, damage suit. Defendant Allen appealed the judgment to the Appeals Court. In January of this year, the appeals court ruled that the judgment should be reversed and remanded. A cross action was filed by Mrs. Riedel, asking that the judgment be permitted to stand.

The mandate throwing the original judgment out was filed Tuesday morning. Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., Counsel with Bill B. Hart, both of Eastland, for Mr. Allen stated that the mandate puts us right back where we were before the trial.

Allen was acquitted of a murder with malice charge in the same court in January of 1966. The incident grew out of the shooting of Allen's nephew, Dr. Albert F. Riedel of Dallas on the Allen Ranch on Nov. 7, 1965.


