Jury Trial Set Monday; Liquor And Racing Propositions Put On Ballot

A final decision is expected in Truman P. Kirk's court battle for a place on the Eastland County Democratic Primary election ballot before printing presses begin rolling, according to information Friday.

County Democratic Committee Chairman A. E. Crawley reported that printing can be delayed until April 12 to await the outcome of a jury trial that has been scheduled for 9 a. m. Monday, April 1, in 91st District Court in Eastland. This would allow ballot printing before the beginning of absentee voting 20 days before the May 4th election.

At the same time, Mr. Crawley announced that the county committee has re-considered an earlier decision and will permit advisory propositions to go on the ballot, including liquor-by-the-drink and horse racing. Most counties will include these two measures on their ballots to permit people to express an unofficial opinion.

body knows, but we're entitled to a trial."

He said there is plenty of time for a trial because the ballots can wait to be printed until April 10 or 12. Absentee balloting being April 15.

Mr. Seaberry, Conner's attorney, maintained that it would be impossible to hold a trial before the ballots have been printed. He said printing must begin April 1, next Monday.

"The evidence is undisputed," Seaberry said.

It was agreed between the parties before Judge Griffin that the evidence in a trial would be the same as it was in the hearing on the injunction. However, Seaberry admitted to the court that time is the essential element.

If there were time, he said, Kirk would be entitled to a trial on the merits.

Seaberry also maintained that a jury trial would not be proper because the challenging of the eligibility of a candidate is a "statutory procedure," a matter of the court's interfering with the political process.

Judge Sparks reported that he was requesting Judge Holland to assign a replacement as he was still ill.

Mr. Kirk deposited money for jury fees with the 91st court when he prepared his brief to appeal the decision.

The high court was told Wednesday that the question of whether Kirk should be allowed on the May 4 Primary ballot for 91 District Court Judge is a "mixed question of law and fact."

Judge Griffin issued a temporary injunction to keep the Eastland County Democratic Committee from listing Kirk on the ballot, at the request of Earl Conner, Jr., the other Democratic candidate for the judgeship.

Bradbury said that Kirk met with Conner in January when he filed and asked that, if Conner planned to contest his candidacy, the matter be taken into court then so the question could be disposed of without the pressure of time. However, Bradbury said, Conner refused and waited six weeks to ask for the injunction.

Conner maintains that Kirk is not eligible to run for the office because he is a resident of Abilene, where his wife is now living, and not Cisco, where Kirk maintains a law office and teaches at Cisco Junior College.

A temporary injunction is not a substitute for a full dress trial on the merits, Bradbury argued, because one has to have only a "minimum of proof" and show probable injury to himself to get a temporary injunction.

"Many things" were permitted on the hearing on the injunction which would not be permitted in a trial, he said, adding that Kirk would have more witnesses present at a trial than he did at the hearing.

"I don't know whether we'd win," Bradbury said. "No-

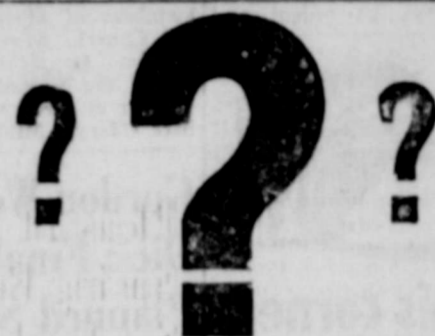

AUSTIN — A federal court lawsuit filed with little fanfare may have far-reaching consequences for the state's welfare system and finances. Suit challenges the one-year state residency requirement for eligibility to receive aid to needy families with dependent children. Actually, the issue goes considerably farther than a single class of assistance. Texas attaches this residence requirement to all major types of welfare eligibility.

Attorneys for Mrs. Angelina B. Alvarez of San Antonio, mother of six children, entered the federal court suit to require the State Department of Public Welfare to grant her AFDC assistance, although she admittedly has not lived in the state a year. Suit claims the residence restriction is unconstitutional, since 76 per cent of AFDC funds are provided by federal government.

Legislatures of 40 states and Congress recognize a residency requirement as a condition of eligibility, Martin argues. Suit, he maintains, would compel withdrawal of money from the state treasury without a pre-existing law.

A Pennsylvania federal district court has upheld a similar restriction as the one applied in Texas, but a Connecticut court threw out that state's limitation as unconstitutional restriction on free travel. Latter suit now has gone to the U.S. Supreme Court for review.

Legislative Budget Board staff forecasters see a \$122,800,000 tax bill as necessary to finance the 448,500,000 general revenue spending bill tentatively recommended by the Board for 1969. This is about \$25,000,000 above 1968's spending level of \$443,800,000.

State Constitutional Revision Commission panel has voted to call on Gov. John Connally and ex-Govs. Price Daniel and Allan Shivers for advice on best standards for deciding how to change the governor's powers and length of term.

Executive office committee debated at length whether the governor should be limited to one or two four-year terms and whether Texas should adopt a cabinet form of state government with strong governor provisions.

Texas Department of Public Safety reports that Texas crime increased 11.8 per cent in 1967 over the previous year, for a new all-time high number of criminal offenses — one every minute and a half.

An estimated 332,086 major crimes were committed in Texas during 1967, compared to 297,810 offenses the year before, said DPS Director Homer Garrison Jr.

All major categories of crime — murder, rape, robbery, burglary, aggravated assault and theft — were up 10 per cent or more. Only 27 per cent of known offenses were cleared by arrests during the year.

State Building Commission has picked the site for the long-delayed museum building at Washington-on-the-Brazos State Park in Washington County.

Museum building will be of five-point star configuration. Legislature appropriated \$500,000 to build it, matched by \$200,000 in private contributions. Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham indicated an additional request for \$150,000 to \$200,000 may be made to the legislature next year.

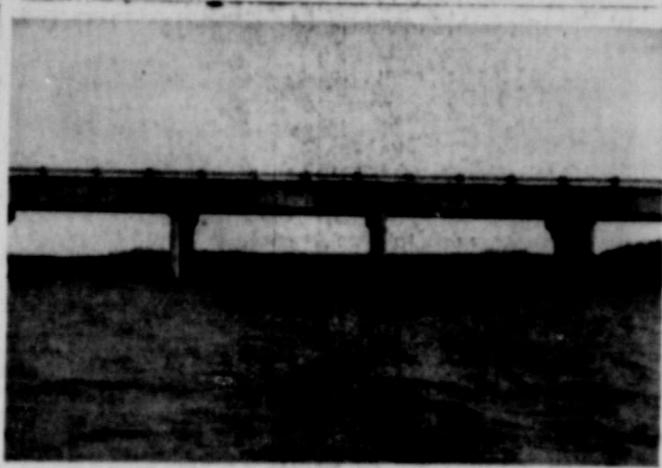

PLANS UNDERWAY FOR BIG EASTER PAGEANT

Final preparations will begin this week for the annual Kendrick Easter Pageant to be presented at 3:30 a.m. Sunday, April 14, at the Kendrick Amphitheater on Highway 80 midway between Cisco and Eastland.

The cast of more than 100 persons from throughout this region will portray the entire life of Christ from birth through the resurrection in a total of 60 scenes. The amphitheater is a complex of 12 separate stages and buildings spreading 360 feet. The stages are finished in crystal white stone and include the running River of Jordan, the Sea of Galilee, and the Mount Calvary.

A real live camel, borrowed from the Fort Worth Zoo, has arrived at Kendrick Farm and will take part in rehearsals. Other animals will be a grey donkey for the Mother Mary, a white donkey for the triumphant march of Jesus, horses drawing chariots, mounted guards of Herod, sheep for the Shepherds in the Field, and animals for the Manger scene.

The script, as in the past pageants, was taken word for word from the Bible and arranged into pageant scenes by the Kendrick family, well known throughout this region for their quartet singing.

Improvements have been made during the past year on the Kendrick Amphitheater, including a new building enclosing lighting equipment, a better concession facilities and additional space for auto parking.

"We can accommodate 10,000 cars and 100,000 people," said J. H. Kendrick. "Just bring a blanket to sit on and stay warm in. There is no admission charge, and parking is free."

The annual pageant has grown in interest each year and many thousands of people are expected again this Easter morning from 3:30 until sunrise.
