## New Assistant DA Plans For Faster Prosecution

"Quite pleased and optimistic" is the comment of Assistant County-District Attorney Emory Walton after two weeks on the job in Eastland County.

Mr. Walton, a Goldwaite native, is a graduate of the Baylor University Law School, and was formerly an assistant city attorney in Abilene, before being appointed here by County-District Attorney Perry T. Brown.

Getting acquainted, and "learning the routine" best describes Mr. Walton's undertakings so far. He reports that public officials, law enforcement officials and the general public are being most cooperative, and that he is looking forward to working here.

A careful study of the some 117 felony cases on file is underway between Mr. Walton and Mr. Brown, with recommendations expected for dismissals of the older, untriable cases, and a definite docket of cases to be tried in the near future, he said. The assistant DA plans to work in the Justice of the Peace Courts on Fridays as needed, and called by the justices.

"We hope to get our work set up so that we can ask for

trials as soon as possible after indictments in all cases," Mr. Walton said.

The bachelor attorney who lists "no hobbies," has set up shop in the office formerly occupied by Mr. Brown, who has moved his desk into the reception area, where Secretary Mrs. Oleta Barker is desked in the second-floor courthouse DA offices.

"I've been riding with the law enforcement officers and hope to be able to cooperate with them closely on investigations," Mr. Walton said.

Mr. Brown further stated: "In my opinion, Eastland County is fortunate to secure the services of such a qualified man as Mr. Walton, and we are looking forward to working with him."

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# THE GORDON SPOT

The fruit crop was not injured by the late freeze as much as we had previously thought. Most fruit trees still have a heavy crop of small fruit. Now, the next step is to make sure that fruit is protected from insect damage.

There's really no secret to producing peaches which are worm-free at harvest time. But if you want them that way, now is the time to take action.

The insects which produce the worms can be controlled if a good spray program is carried out. Once the insects get a start and worms get into the peaches nothing can be done.

To do an effective job of controlling peach insects, trees should have been sprayed when 75 percent of the petals had fallen from the blooms. Then 10 days later when the shuck splits; then three more spray applications at two-week intervals should follow the shuck-split stage spraying.

As for the spray, use either methoxychlor or malathion. These materials are readily

available from feed and seed stores, drug stores or other firms which handle insecticides. Combinations of insecticides and fungicides may be used on fruit trees and make excellent sprays for use on peaches.

A control program for one tree in the backyard or many in an orchard is not only feasible but very practical. All insecticides should be used in accordance with label instructions and with care.

The 1968 revision of recommendations for weed control in Texas is now available.

Good weed control can increase yields, provide better quality crops, and reduce weeds by preventing weed seed production. Herbicides can provide cheaper weed control than hand labor. In test plots, it was found that preplant or preemergence herbicides cost from \$2.50 to \$8 per acre, while hand labor averaged between \$12 and \$14 for hoeing. The herbicides protected the crops from weed competition during emergence and early growth, while the untreated fields were weedy all season.

Certain mixtures of herbicides are available as pre-emergence treatments in grain sorghum, peanuts and soybeans in 1968.

The bulletin, B-1029, "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals," is available in my office. It is a joint Texas Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station publication.

The recommendations of the 35-page bulletin also include suggestions for spray equipment, information on herbicide application or non-crop site and cropland in fallow and ponds and lakes.

Don't forget the annual peach budding and grafting school April 19 at the Cisco Junior College. It begins at 9:30 a. m. in the college auditorium.

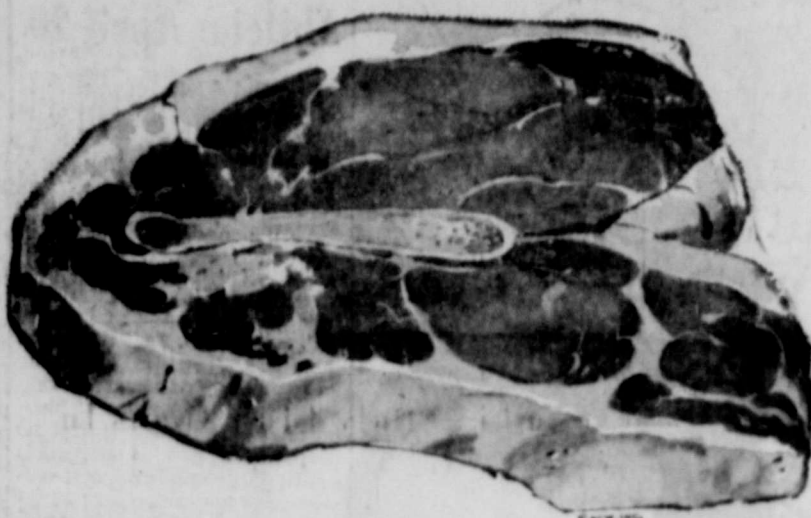

## Feb. Bond Sales Total \$26,343

During the month of February the sale of United States Savings Bonds and Savings Notes in Eastland County totaled \$26,343, according to a report received today from Mr. Guy P. ## Cook Chicken In Paper Bag, Save Your Utensils

COLLEGE STATION — No cooking utensils to wash. Does it sound good to you?

Try cooking chicken in a paper bag, the brown paper sacks that come from the grocery store.

Cut a fryer into halves or quarters. Brush the inside and outside with butter and season with celery salt, onion salt, garlic salt, pepper, and paprika, recommends Radora Massey, Extension foods and nutrition specialist.

Place the pieces in a heavy brown paper bag, allowing plenty of room without stacking. Twist the bag shut. Cook on a rack in a 400 degree F. oven for an hour and fifteen minutes.

The bag will not burn, and you can forget about the chicken until the cooking time is up, says the Texas A&M University specialist. A pan may be placed on a lower rack to catch any drippings.

A suggested menu includes potato baked with the chicken, a wilted spinach salad, ice cream and milk to drink. Lemon and orange slices are good with the chicken.

## Household Trash Is Still Biggest Cause of Fires

COLLEGE STATION — "Texas' major fire cause continues to be people who burn household trash, grass-ridden fields, garden patches and brush piles," announced Paul R. Krimer, director of the Texas Forest Service. "More fires resulted from these dangerous activities. People still fail to realize how easily fires can get out of hand during the dry, windy periods that occur between October and April."

Low rainfall, careless trash burners, smokers and incendiaries were responsible for a heavy increase in forest fires in Texas in 1967. According to Kramer, 1967 was one of the drier years in East Texas. Had it not been for the heavy rainfall in December, average rainfall in the Piney Woods would have been comparable to the 1963 drought, Kramer claimed.

The total number of fires reported in 1967 rose to 3,500 and the acreage burned increased to 74,000 acres. Nearly 17 million acres of Central and East Texas are under the protection of the Texas Forest Service.

Arrests and convictions of forest fire law violators increased nearly 600 percent over 1966, Kramer reported. Of that 40 percent of last year's the 389 cases tried in the J. P. and County Courts, 304 resulted in convictions. Convictions under the misdemeanor or law carry a maximum fine of \$200.

## Post Office Has Booklet on Mail To Men Overseas

An illustrated pamphlet — Mail or Servicemen — outlining the expanded program for airlifting letters, packages and other military mail overseas at low postal rates is now available through local Post Office window clerks, the Postmaster announced. The Postmaster said that "as a result of new legislation and action by President Johnson we are now airlifting more than 75 per cent of all mail going to the military men and women stationed abroad, we hope this guide will help more American families be familiar with these services and use them." The eight-page pamphlet illustrates three services for airlifting parcels at rates the average family can afford, the speedy service now available for newspapers and news magazines to most overseas bases, the special rates for books and similar educational materials, and how to mail sound-recorded personnel messages. The guide also provides parcel wrapping instructions, information on the time it takes parcels to reach Viet Nam and other overseas bases from major U. S. cities, and pointers on the correct way to address military mail. A family sending a 10-pound package to Viet Nam, for example, pays only \$2.75 on a package marked "PAL", while the air parcel rate for the same package is \$6.59, the Postmaster said. On parcels weighing less than 5 pounds it might be more advantageous for a family to use the older (SAM) Space Available Mail service, which provides surface transportation to the port of embarkation and airlift overseas. A four-pound SAM package to a European military post cost only \$1.10. On packages weighing under two pounds air parcel post is often the patron's "best buy" for through airlift service, the pamphlet suggests.
