AUSTIN-Within the next five months measles may be a thing of the past in Texas. Authorities of two key health agencies have some un state-wide television and radio to urge parents to have their children vaccin a ted against the dangerous disease which can cripple and even kill.

Dr. J. E. Peavy, State Commissioner of Health, and Dr.

Sam Nixon Jr., chairman of the Texas Medical Association's Committee on Public Health, are telling Texans via TV spots that an effective vaccine is available to all children who have reached their first birthday.

June had been set earlier by Governor John Connally as the target date for measles eradication in the state.

In one of two statements made by the Health Commissioner-which will be viewed and aired on Texas stations from now through June-Dr Peavy points out that the goal can be achieved only if parents cooperate with their private physician, local health department and the State Health Department. 




