With everyone participating in the nation-wide Cancer Crusade, we would like to share with our readers a statement made by TV star Lawrence Welk, 1968 Crusade Chairman for the American Cancer Society.

"I am a volunteer for the American Cancer Society because, first of all, I want to help wipe out the killer-cancer, the disease that will cause over 300,000 deaths in this country in 1968. I believe that working with the Society provides me an opportunity to help stop this terrible waste.

Also, America has been good to me. I was born in a small farm community, Strasburg, North Dakota. I had little formal education and few advantages. I trapped beaver, badger and other wild animals to buy my first accordion. Yet the American way made it possible for me to achieve national prominence and make music for millions over a span of 40 years.

Only in America could I have gained that kind of success and only in America could an army of 2,000,000 volunteers be raised to fight cancer. At last, I can express my thanks for what America has done for me.

AFFORDING PLEASURE was a recent perusal of the March 27, 1966 edition of The Cisco Pilot. This priceless publication, the property of Mrs. Lillian Eastland, Rt. 1, Ranger, is yellowed with age but loving hands have completely encased it in cellophane for preservation. One front page story tells of the untimely death of a fifteen year-old boy, brother of the late Haden Neal, father of Mrs. Eastland. The lad was struck on the head by a baseball during a sand lot game on Sunday afternoon and died immediately. The editor's comment stated that the new game was really taking hold in the area, even to the extent that children and some adults considered it nothing amiss to play on Sunday afternoon.

The advertising section contained such bargains as ladies corsets, 35 cents to \$1.00; any case of granulated eyelids cured in 20 days and announcements that one local barber had just received a new shipment of shaves and haircuts.

There was the account of a child's death from drinking carbonic acid and the warning that there was a mad dog loose in the vicinity. Things may not have been ultra-modern, but there was no evidence of boredom.

A FIRE completely destroyed a home here Wednesday night. The first alarm was sounded at 9:37 and the local firemen rushed to the scene. By the time most all of the firemen had reached the fire there were several automobiles at the scene. The firemen were unable to get the trucks to the fire hydrant, due to the traffic and several hundred spectators. It is possible some of the contents of the home could have been saved if the firemen could have done their job without all of the unnecessary bystanders and traffic. Several traffic tickets were handed out by fire chief asks that citizens do not follow a fire truck to a fire, it not only hampers the firemen but also endangers the life of the spectators.

Registration For RJC Summer Classes To Begin June 3-6 p.m.

Courses in English, government, history, and mathematics will be offered at Ranger Junior College this summer. RJC Students Elect LBJ at Mock Convention

Lyndon B. Johnson was "nominated" for another term as United States President during a mock Democratic national convention held in the Ranger Junior College gym on Thursday evening. The nomination was by a landslide margin on the second ballot. A first ballot showed Johnson and Sen. Robert Kennedy within five votes of each other with Gov. George Wallace leading. On the second ballot, a switch from Kennedy to Johnson proved the determining factor. Almost all of the college student body were participants in the mock convention which was attended by some 500 enthusiastic spectators. Music was provided by the Ranger Junior College Band. Charles Deaton, government professor, was general chairman with history professor Leonard Marcusak delivering the keynote address. Representing the three candidates were Don Bunton of Ranger as Johnson; Robert Tavernia of Yonkers, N.Y. as Kennedy and Louis Langford of Dallas as Wallace. Johnson received 1,175 "votes", Wallace 800 and Kennedy 350.

Mail Pamphlet Spanish Edition Planned by P. O.

The Post Office Department is publishing this week a Spanish edition of its new military mail pamphlet for helping families pick the best possible service for sending letters, packages and other mail to the servicemen and women stationed overseas, Representative Omar Burleson announced today.

Correo Militar, Guia Postal Para Acelerar El Servicio will soon be available in Texas post offices with a significant number of Spanish-speaking patrons. Copies of the pamphlet are also available through the office of Representative Burleson.

The Congressman said that "as a result of new legislation and action by President Johnson we are now airlifting more than 75 per cent of all mail going to the military men and women stationed abroad. We hope this guide will also help our Spanish-speaking citizens be fully familiar with these services and use them."

The eight-page pamphlet illustrates the three services for airlifting parcels at rates the average family can afford, the speedy service now available for newspapers and news magazines—to most overseas bases, the special rates for books and similar educational materials, and how to mail sound-recorded personal messages. The guide also provides parcel wrapping instructions, information on the time it takes parcels to reach Vietnam and other overseas bases from major U. S. cities, and pointers on the correct way to address a military mail.

One of the newest military mail services is PAL. Packages up to 30 pounds in weight and 60 inches in combined length and girth now receive

airlift service from a U. S. city through the overseas base in a "space available" basis. The family sending a 10-lb. parcel from Anson to Vietnam for example, will pay only \$2.75 on a package marked "PAL," while the air parcel post rate for the same package is \$6.55.

Measles Due To Become Rare In State of Texas

AUSTIN—Within the next five months measles may be a thing of the past in Texas.

Authorities of two key health agencies have used state-wide television and radio to urge parents to have their children vaccinated against the dangerous disease which can cripple and even kill.

Dr. J. E. Peavy, State Commissioner of Health, and Dr. Sam Nixon Jr., chairman of the Texas Medical Association's Committee on Public Health, are telling Texans via TV spots that an effective vaccine is available to all children who have reached their first birthday.

June had been set earlier by Governor John Connally as the target date for measles eradication in the state.

In one of two statements made by the Health Commissioner—which will be viewed and aired on Texas stations from now through June—Dr. Peavy points out that the goal can be achieved only if parents cooperate with their private physician, local health department and the State Health Department. He says leties, health departments and further that local medical socie groups must continue to get involved "if this measles eradication effort is to succeed."

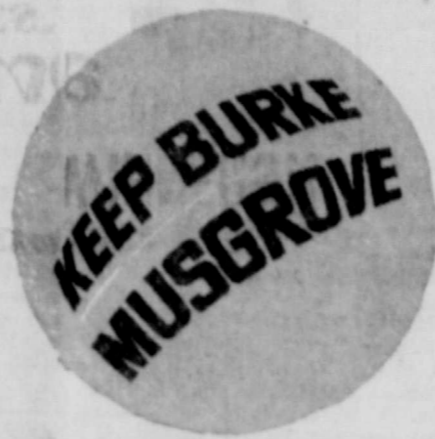
