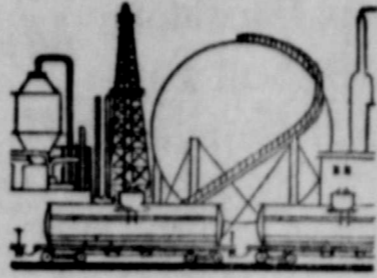

Over 6,000 Expected To Vote In County Primary Election Saturday

9 Boxes Will Be Used In County

Polls will open at nine locations at 8 a. m. Saturday, May 4, for the 1968 Primaries in Eastland County.

Democrats will be voting at eight boxes and Republicans will cast their ballots at one

The lone Republican polling place will be at the City Hall in Eastland with Mrs. Gordon Wadley as presiding judge, assisted by Mrs. Don Russell, Mrs. H. J. Bulgerin is county Republican Chairman.

There are 8,416 registered voters in Eastland County and best educated guesses are that upwards of 6,500 may turn out for the Saturday election. (This is the first time Eastland has had a complete list of registered voters, since over-all voters were not registered prior to this year. In 1966 there were only 3,126 registered voters.)

Voters have an interesting ballot to confront Saturday, particularly with the three "at-faw vote" propositions: liquor-by-the-drink, pari-mutual betting and the creation of a dairy commission.

The Democratic voters have a choice between ten candidates for governor and a long list of other races.

Only contest for the Republicans will be that for governor for which three candidates are listed.

One of the most spirited races, based on campaign activity, appears to be the State Representative Post. Incumbent Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge, completing his first two-year term, is opposed by Byron Richardson of Callahan County and Bob Mann of Palo Pinto County.

Two county commission posts are up for re-election and contests present in each. Commission Precinct One (Eastland, Ranger) pits incumbent Danny Woods, completing his first four-year term and Johnnie W. Morren of Eastland. Incumbent Rising Star commissioner Buck Collins is challenged by Delbert Tarver.

In the only other county contest, Incumbent Tax Assessor-Collector Edgar Altom is opposed by Eddie Pievaszek of Eastland.

In Cisco, Constable A. W. Dawson is challenged by W. A. Evans. At Earl Conner Jr. is opposed for 91st District Court Judge as is Incumbent Sheriff L. E. (Lefty) Sublett.

Voters are reminded that new election laws require that they check the box alongside the name of each candidate for which they want to vote, even if the candidate is unopposed. It reportedly is a "positive" approach, and w-11 mean "no check mark, no vote."

Election judges were being reminded to report early so that returns may be forwarded as quickly as possible to (Continued on Page 3)

Danny Woods Issues Final Announcement

"As your county commissioner I feel that a big majority of you know me personally. I am a native of Eastland County, having lived here all my life except for the three years I spent in the Army Engineer Core during the Korean conflict. I am married to the former Vera Dyer of Ranger. We have two children, and we are active church members. I attended school in Eastland, Olden and Ranger Junior College.

"When I took office in 1965 there was an indebtedness in Precinct One of twenty three thousand dollars. I now have this debt reduced to two thousand dollars in which I plan to pay off this year. I have tried at the same time to keep down all expenses when possible, as I am opposed to anything that would cause the voters of Eastland County a tax raise at this time. I have tried at all times to use good judgment on all things that come before the Commissioners Court.

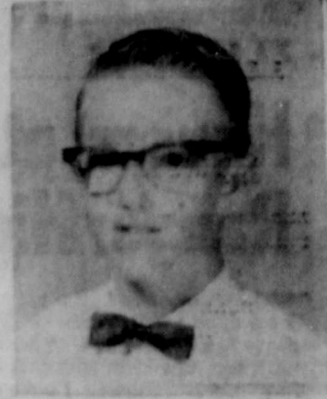
RHS Students Accepted To NSF Institute

Chaney-Morval Association Is Major County Sandy Soil

In a recent issue of this newspaper, the major soil associations or "kinds of country" were outlined on a general soils map of Eastland County. This article will dwell on one of the major sandy soil associations - Chaney-Morval Association.

The major central part of Eastland County is composed of the Chaney-Morval association. The soils have a sandy surface ranging from 4 to 20 inches thick, depending upon the degree of erosion. They have a sandy clay subsoil and have formed from material of the Lower Cretaceous Age. The association is gently undulating and is slightly to moderately eroded. Some areas are stony. This association has a total area of about 230,446 acres and makes up about 37 percent of Eastland County.

The major soils of this association are the Chaney and Morval soils, but there are small areas of many other soils. The Chaney soils have a strong brown loamy sand surface normally about 14 inches thick. The subsoil is red to yellowish red with prominent mottles of gray and brown, indicating improper air and water movement. The texture is a heavy sandy clay with blocky structure. The substratum occurs at about 36 inches and ranges from bands of sand and shale to conglomerate sandstone. The Chaney soils occupy about 50 percent of the association. Some of the Chaney areas have more than 35 percent by volume of chert gravel and are mapped as gravelly Chaney.

The Morval soils have a dark brown loamy sand surface normally about 14 inches thick. The subsoil is red, with no gray mottles. The texture is a sandy clay slightly more permeable than Chaney soils. The substratum occurs at about 40 inches and may be beds of red fine sandy loam or conglomerate sandstone. The Morval soils occupy about 30 percent of this association. Minor soils occurring in this association are Demona, Waurika, Bunyan, Gowen and stony Chaney. Demona is similar to Chaney except the sandy surface ranges from 20

be asked to adopt a resolution asking that Gov. John Connally be named the Favorite Son Candidate at the National Democratic Convention. There is pretty good evidence that many in the county will oppose the passage of such a resolution.

Giving as their reason for opposition, they say that the party is working toward the nomination of a gubernatorial candidate, and that if a Favorite Son is to be sent from Texas, it should be the nominee. (Gov. Connally is not seeking re-election.)

Those in favor of the resolution state that Gov. Connally is the state's party chief until Jan. 1, 1969, and as such deserves to be the standard bearer. They also add that the county is in the particular position at this time of seeking an appointment by Gov. Connally to fill the position of 91st District Court judge, a post which the present judge had resigned and will vacate on May 6.

Eastland County will have seven delegates to the state convention, to be picked at the county convention. This figure is based on the number of voters for the office of governor in the last general election (2,230), for which a delegate is permitted for each 300 voters.

Precinct Conventions will be held at each of the polling places in the county Saturday, with delegate to the county convention permitted for each 25 voters in the last general election.

**Voters Asked To
Back Connally

AUSTIN — Texans who for years have voted for Governor John Connally at the polls have another opportunity to support the popular chief executive this week, even though his name will not be on the ballot.

While the Governor is not seeking re-election, voters can assign to him what could be an even more important job for the state in the months ahead.

In view of the political uncertainty throughout the country at this time, Connally has agreed to become a favorite son candidate for the presidency from Texas and to head the state's delegation to the Democratic National Convention, provided voters throughout Texas support such action in precinct conventions Saturday.

The conventions will be held at neighborhood polling places, some during the day (primarily in rural areas), and many after the polls close. Any citizen who votes in the Democratic primary that day is eligible to take part in the precinct convention.

Governor Connally this week completed a round of visits with supporters in various cities, urging heavy turnouts at the conventions.

"It is imperative that responsible citizens turn out in large numbers in every precinct," he said, "to prevent a small minority to speak for Texas on matters of grave concern in the months ahead."

Connally pointed out that with President Johnson retiring from office in January, Texas will have no representation in the top leadership of the nation for the first time in almost 40 years.

"If Texas is to have a hope of helping shape the course of national leadership, we must be in a position to speak as a united voice in any eventuality," he said.

Connally asked that all who attend conventions vote to adopt the unit rule, and vote to designate the Governor as "favorite son" leader of the Texas delegation to the Chicago convention in August.

Local Citizens Planning to Attend Gorman Public Hearing Thursday

A large delegation from this city is expected to be in Gorman Thursday evening to speak out for the Sabanno Watershed Project.

The State Soil and Water Conservation Board is coming to Gorman on Thursday, May 2, to determine if and to what extent the residents of Gorman, DeLeon, Carbon and Rising Star are interested in obtaining a top priority for the Sabanno Watershed Project.

Folks everywhere want such projects approved granting funds for construction of dams

and reservoirs not only to provide flood control measures, but for the prevention of soil erosion, fence and road damage, crop damage and livestock losses. As important as these reasons are, this project can provide, if sufficient local interest is available, substantial sources of water for irrigation of area crops.

For example, the income from 1,000 acres of irrigated peanuts averaging 90 bushels per acre will put into the local economy \$150,000 more than 1,000 acres making 30 bushels

per acre. Solely from the standpoint of money this 1,000 acres of irrigated peanuts is equivalent to an industry employing 70 to 80 persons.

The five men on the state board want to know if the folks of this area want the Sabanno project more than people from other watersheds in the state who have also filed applications. How can you show these five men that you are interested? By being at Brogdon Field for the 6:30 p. m. barbecue and afterwards attend the brief hearing to be held in the high school auditorium beginning at 8 p. m. (Central daylight saving time). This hearing will last less than one and one-half hours.

Sabanno Association Chairman Ross Wilson has announced that detailed planning is underway in preparation for the 4 p. m. tour on May 2 and for the 8 p. m. hearing. The state board members will be taken on a two hour tour of the watershed beginning at 4 p. m. This tour is being planned by E. G. Henderson and a number of Watershed residents. The hearing on the same date at 8 p. m. is being organized by Ross Wilson and will consist of a series of brief statements by local citizens emphasizing the importance of the project to this area.

The importance of this project estimated to cost 2 million dollars cannot be overemphasized to Eastland and Comanche counties. Engineers studying the watershed last October suggested a total of some 33 structures along the route of the stream, 13 of which would be classed as major sites and 20 as small structures. Area farmers and ranchers have long endured the damaging effects of flooding along the Sabanno. At the same time they have lost the use of the valuable volume of water moving downstream during heavy rainfall periods. Both situations can be alleviated to a large degree through completion of this project. However, it should be quickly pointed out that the success of this project is equally important to all residents and businesses in the Watershed Communities because of the potential in the improvement of the general economy.

Area residents are urged to make plans now to attend the barbecue supper at Brogdon Field, Gorman at 6:30 p. m., May 2 and remain for the hearing at 8 p. m. in the Gorman High School Auditorium. A few hours of your time in attending these functions can best demonstrate your support of this important project. An open invitation is hereby extended to everyone to turn out on Thursday, May 2.

Soil or Dirt?

Various Kinds Of Soil Found In Survey of Eastland County

A local man showed up at the Soil Conservation Office early one morning. "This may sound foolish to you," the man said, "but I need some information. You know, sometimes a father can be embarrassed when his son asks a sudden question? Well, last night my son wanted to know the difference between soil and dirt."

"And you told him?" we prompted.

"I told him," the man said hopefully, "that I'd answer his question later when I wasn't busy. And after I'd talked with you, but I didn't tell him that."

Since there are about fifty distinct kinds of soil in Eastland County, (each one broke down into mapping units because of differences in the depth of the topsoil or subsoil, the slope on which it lies, its erodibility, or other factors that affect its suitability for use in agriculture or forestry) we began by locating the man's home on an aerial map.

The symbol for the soil on his particular lot was 72BCI. We ran that down and found that the soil was Chaney Loamy Sand. The surface was grayish-bed sandy-clay with gray mottles. (The man agreed with that.) Some 36 to 50 inches below the surface lay a varicolored plastic clay stratum. (The man said he hadn't dug down that deep, so he would take our word for it.)

The clay subsoil takes water slowly, so during wet seasons the water table is perched on top of the subsoil for some time. For this reason, much of the water during the hard rainstorms will run off and cause erosion.

The soil would be poor material for a road subgrade, but would have fair supporting capacity for building foundations. It is poor for topsoil material but has no bad features affecting terraces, waterways or highway locations. If the land were farmed, it would be only fairly productive.

It would be adapted to peanuts, grain sorghum, orchards, and practically all locally-grown crops. Under irrigation, the subsoil would take in about two tenths inch of water per hour and would hold about .15 inch water available to plants per inch of soil.

All this was a little bit more than the man had wanted to know about soil. But he copied it all down and was prepared to discuss the subject intelligently with his son. We were glad to have been of help; we're fathers, too, and know how hard it is for a father to be a hero inside his own home.

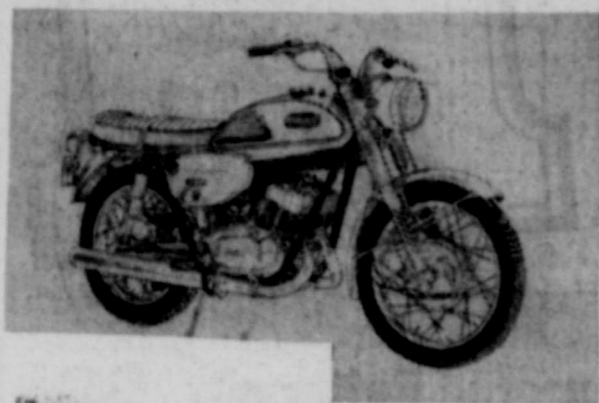
