They were few and far between for the Ranger baseball team as it was shut out twice by Odessa Junior College in the Region IV playoffs in Odessa Monday.

Gilbert Vasquez set the Rangers down on one - hit for a 3-0 victory in the first game, then Steve Prater allowed only three safeties as Odessa completed the sweep with a 5-0 triumph in the second contest.

The Ranger Public Schools have been approved again for four routes as in the past according to a letter received Monday from the Texas Education Agency.

Coach Butler Is Named As Coach of Bowl Game

SHAWNEE, OKLA.—Coaches have been named for the upcoming Faith-7 Bowl to be held Aug. 17th in Shawnee, Okla.

Named as the Texas All-Star Coach is Ronald Butler, head basketball coach and athletic director of Ranger Junior College, Ranger. Heading the Oklahoma forces will be Don Ward, high school basketball coach and junior high principal at Hobart, Okla.

This will be the third year for the benefit basketball game, featuring the top Texas and Oklahoma high school senior all stars. Proceeds of the tilt go to the Mental Health Program. Over \$11,000 has been donated over the last two years as the result of the games.

Both coaches have impressive records. Butler, at Ranger, sports an over-all record of 10 wins and only 7 losses. He has served as head coach at Ranger for four years. In 1966-67 his team was ranked fourth in the nation among junior colleges. A graduate of Midwestern University, Butler coached high school basket-

ball for five years before going to Ranger.

Ward's record over a 19-year span is 395 wins and 173 losses, including several district and regional championships at Hobart. Twice, Ward was led his teams to the State Meet and has coached two all stars, Kenneth O'Neal of Oklahoma State and Paul Clear, Oklahoma University. He has served as head coach at Hobart for the past seven

Bowl director, Jerrell Chesney also announced that the Faith-7 All Star Coaches Clinic will be held again this year in conjunction with the game. Basic rosters for the two teams will be announced sometime in June, Chesney said. "Both Coaches will then want to wait until after their respective state's All State games to complete their squads," he added.

The Oklahoma-Texas All Star Basketball game was formerly known as the Oil Bowl, but was discontinued until 1966 when Shawnee picked up the series. Since coming to Shawnee the two states have split, Oklahoma winning in '66 — the Lone Stars last year.

Another Putnam Stickhorse Is Off and Running to Far Places

The internationally famous toy pony, Gold Dust, is resting in the stickhorse stable at Putnam, but his son, Don Amistad, is riding in the true Gold Dust fashion set back in 1960. Don Amistad was born when officials at the HemisFair asked for Senor Amigo and he could not go because he was helping Alaska celebrate its centennial. They had heard what a tremendous job he was doing in Alaska and wanted to help promote the HemisFair.

His master, Roger Reynolds, Roddy's little brother (Roddy had originated Gold Dust) took him to Dallas where he was set on the trail after a ceremony and a news conference in the Adolphus Hotel.

His first stop had been Newark, New Jersey, where his presence is credited with helping keep Halloween quiet. He rode from there to Olympia, Sacramento, Washington, Little Rock, College Station and then back to the corral at Putnam.

While on this run he was hosted by one police department, three governors, one college president and the chief of protocol for the Department of State.

The latter, James Symington, had this to say in a letter to Roger about his visit in the nation's capitol:

"Don Amistad arrived, tired but still peppy, on his way from California. I had him invited to a few embassy parties where he behaved extremely well considering the crowds and the fact that he is, after all, a horse."

"The diplomatic community is grateful to you for a chance to hitch a ride on the spirit Don Amistad represents. Congratulations to you from all of us for your initiative in raising and sending this fine animal."

Don Amistad hit the trail again two weeks ago, ridden by the regional manager of the Royal Globe Insurance Company at Dallas who had delivered the pony an insurance policy designed to give him protection as he rides through the badlands of India.

On his itinerary are places like Montevideo, the Hague, Djakarta, Belgrade, Tunis and Kabul.

He is scheduled to arrive in Kabul, the capitol of Afghanistan, about two weeks prior to August 24, the opening day for a fair that commemorates the 50th anniversary of the country's independence. He is to be a part of the American exhibit at the fair.

In a letter he received Sunday, Roger reported that his pony had been successful in hitching a rider to New York. This rider reported:

"I am reasonably sure your horse will make it to Afghanistan by the appointed date and will probably cover a lot of ground in between..."

Roger will be sending some information and pictures to Kabul. He will appreciate some pictures of some real live Texas horses along with some true unpublished stories about famous horses.

Don Amistad rides under the motto of Senor Amigo which is: "To keep alive the principles supported by great men like Simon Bolivar and Abraham Lincoln — Freedom, Equality and Friendship between peoples."

He carries a commission that designates him as an official ambassador of HemisFair which gives this as the function of HemisFair: "The purpose of the HemisFair is to foster mutual understanding among the nations of the world and of the Western Hemisphere, to promote the recognition of our common heritage, problems and goals, to extend the ideals of human dignity, individual liberty and freedom from hunger, ease."
