Applications Now Being Accepted For NYC Work in Ranger Schools

Applications for summer work on the N.Y.C. in the Ranger Public Schools are now being received in the office of Principal James W. Childress. The present program ends May 25 and there will be no work during examination week of May 27-31. The summer program will begin Monday, June 3 and end August 24. Students must be 16 years of age to be eligible as well as meet certain financial requirements. There will be a vacation for N.Y.C. students in Ranger Schools from July 1 through July 12. Applications and requirements may be picked up from Mr. Childress. To be eligible financially a family of only one must not exceed \$1,600 income if they live in town or \$1,100 if they live on the farm. A family of

two is limited to \$2,000 or \$1,400 on the farm. A family of three would be limited to \$2,500 in town and \$1,700 on the farm. A family of four is limited to incomes of \$3,200 and \$2,200. A family of five \$3,800 and \$2,600. A family of seven \$4,700 and \$3,200. A family of eight \$5,300 and \$3,700. The Ranger program is administered from the Eastland County Courthouse by Mr. Tip Arther who has 13 other counties under his supervision. Students on the program either now or this summer will receive \$1.25 per hour and will be limited to 26 hours per week.

The Board of Trustees of Ranger Public Schools met Tuesday night at Hodges Primary School where they accepted the resignation of Coach Jack Gray for next year and inspected the building as to both immediate and long range needs. Cost of the needs total \$7,198. At the same meeting, bus routes for next year were approved, with no changes being made in them from this present school term. Guests at the meeting were Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Meredith and Mrs. James Clark. Mrs. Clark served the board before the meeting and Mrs. Meredith, Hodges Oak principal, took the board on a lengthy tour of the building pointing out the needs in each room. Total cost of their needs in the next few years total \$7,198 according to an estimate made by Supt. Clark. As time goes by and the building deteriorates and cost of materials go up, so will the total cost go up he said.

Needs of the school by rooms were listed by the teachers and Mrs. Meredith on mimeographed sheets for the trustees to study. Rest room needs totaled \$1,130 with the cost going for two new modern wash basins where the water flow is controlled by the feet pressing on rings that surround the semi-circular basin, for new commodes for the girls and for painting the restrooms.

Mrs. Meredith pointed out that the commodes for the little girls had springs on the seats that made it a task for the girls to use without pinching themselves and in any case posed a problem for them to use. The playground needs about \$300 worth of equipment, part of which might be made locally by donated pipe and materials. Repainting the lunchroom was estimated at \$50 with N.Y.C. workers doing the job. The principal's office has a large crack in the outside wall, bad window blinds and needs doors over book shelves for an estimated cost of \$94.

Mrs. Chamberlain's third grade room needs a new heater to replace a radiator that is not too safe, doors put on shelves now in the room, two more light fixtures, wall painted, windows weather stripped, panes replaced and new venetian blind. Estimated cost was \$530.

The kindergarten building needs a new roof after all two by four's are scabbed and new deck i-n-g applied. The walls inside need painting as well as some tables and chairs. Since students now have to go across the grass to the main building for water, a water fountain is requested. Cost for all this totals \$2,111.

General building needs include panic bars on all door leading outside, a guard light at front of building, two vent heaters inside and the repainting of all windows framing with at least three coats of paint. Many of the windows are in bad repair and have been nailed shut or spliced with one by four lumber or fixed otherwise. Not included in the \$7.11 cost are windows for Hodges. The front and north sides have 36 windows that need replacing with aluminum windows with double strength glass with moving sash in one part of the window. The install price of just this 36 windows would be \$1,132 approximately.

The painting and replacing of glass is normally done the summer when custodians have more time and would require overtime pay. A Hodges room has been painted in the past three years Clark said with exception of the ceilings. This year the ceilings need painting also.

Clark told the board the regular budget for next year cannot include a any of it above except painting, gl and routine repairs. Maintenance money in general has been used for instruction supplies and to offset increased salaries and increase of labor and supplies.

The board will visit You School next Tuesday night to inspect their immediate a long range needs.

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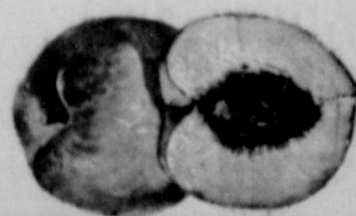
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Pecan Field Day Set In Cisco On May 24th

The annual spring field day of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association has been planned for May 24th at Cisco. The program will be held at the First National Bank meeting room, reported Anton White, Cisco, president of the association.

Picturephone Demonstration Set For HemisFair by Bell

Live demonstrations of the Picturephone combined with the fast-moving magic of nationally known magician Mark Wilson, is being featured in the Bell System pavilion at San Antonio's HemisFair.

It is the first time that Picturephone has been used in Southwestern Bell territory.

Also a computer plays The-Tac-Toe with visitors, an Age-Guesser tells how old you are, a display measures your ability to match the musical tones, a special "branch" is available for youngsters to talk with their favorite cartoon characters by phone and many other exhibits.

George Brooks, exhibit director for the Bell System Pavilion, said, "We are happy to be in HemisFair, not only because it gives us a chance to bring top-quality entertainment similar to that we have presented at other World's Fairs and Disneyland but also because we are a part of San Antonio and the Southwest region."

The pavilion is co-sponsored by AT&T, Western Electric and Southwestern Bell. It is located on the edge of a man-made lagoon that winds through the 93-acre park and at the foot of the 622-foot Tower of the Americas.

Fair dates are April 6 to Oct. 6. The HemisFair cost approximately 156 million. The theme of the fair is the Confluence of Civilization in the Americas and about 45 exhibitors have space on the grounds, including the Texas Pavilion, the United States Pavilion, the Women's Pavilion, and government and private exhibits.

Among the outstanding features of the Fair is the huge Tower of the Americas, the tallest observation tower in the Western Hemisphere. It is topped by a restaurant and observation decks that rotate. Visitors—up to 1,750 at a time—can see over 100 miles on a clear day. Other features are a mini-monorail, 1½ miles long, which runs through the grounds; a quarter-mile long sky-ride, along with gondolas and flower boats.

Gate fees will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for children ages (3-12). Children under 3 are admitted free.

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May 24-28 Is Period To Spray Pecan Trees To Kill Insects

May 24 through May 28 is the dates to spray pecan trees to control the pecan nut casebearer in Eastland County, reported De Gordon, County Agent. These dates are very important because the small worms must be sprayed during the time they are hatching and before they enter the small pecans.

The casebearer is the most destructive insect of pecans, the county agent said. A. D. Ellington of Cisco and the county agent have been observing the development of the casebearers. It appears that the trees in the southern part of the county should be sprayed earlier than those in the northern part of the county.

Gordon suggests spraying from May 23 to May 26 in the Rising Star area and May 24 to May 28 in other parts of the county. It will be necessary to spray twice to get good control. It is suggested that the second application be applied June 3 through 5.

The chemicals recommended for controlling the casebearer are Thiodan, DDT, Parathion, Malathion, Toxaphene, Sevin and Guthion. It is recommended that home owners use Sevin or Malathion because they are effective and less toxic than the other chemicals listed. If one ap-

A \$77,000 damage suit has been filed in 91st District Court by B. A. Butler of Rising Star, naming a Dallas-based Microfilming Company.

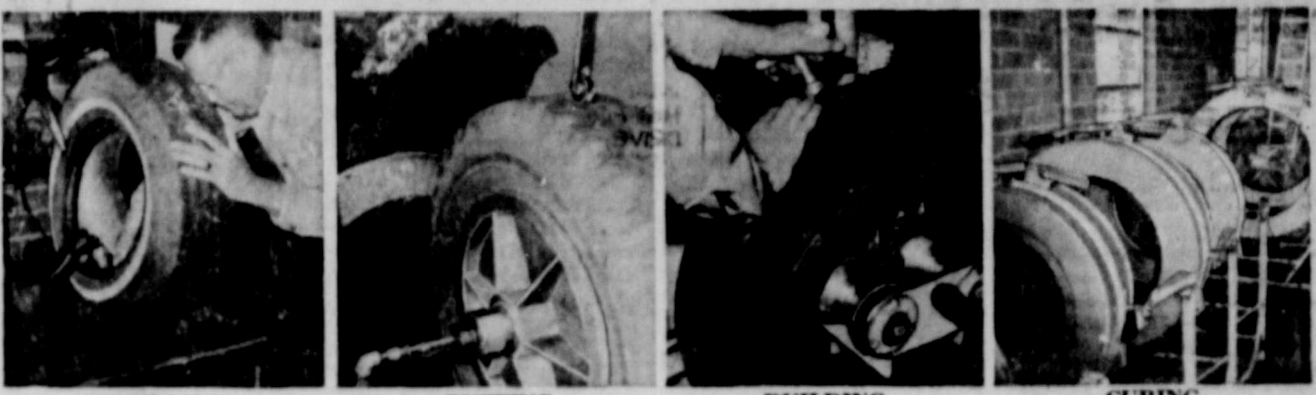

MODERN RETREADING IS SCIENTIFIC PROCESS

Since World War II, the tire shopper has seen the results of a growing skill in the production of retreaded tires due to improved methods, materials and modern equipment.

Today, retreaded tires provide economy, safety and long mileage; and good tire casings are such that they can be retreaded several times thanks to the advanced technology of tire cord and body construction.

INSPECTION

Lighter sections of the buffed casing are built up to achieve perfect balance before it begins to take on its final shape. The buffed surface of the casing is then sprayed with cement and a perfectly proportioned strip of tread rubber is pressed against it.

CURING
With its new layer of tread rubber applied to it, the casing is next placed in a mold where it is cured with heat and pressure. The molds must be at just the right temperature and just the right pressure for just the right amount of time to properly cure the tire. This thermal process completely fuses the new layer of tread rubber to the tire body and imprints a fresh new tread design.

FINAL INSPECTION
The last step in the retreading process is a final inspection. A finished retread receives a final inspection to insure against any possible defects that may have occurred in the final quality control step, preceding four steps. During the retread is also trimmed and painted. The retreader performs these final processing functions to make certain that his product meets the highest standards of safety, strength and endurance that scientific retreading provides.

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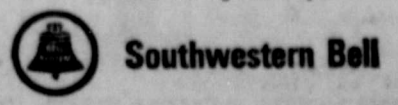

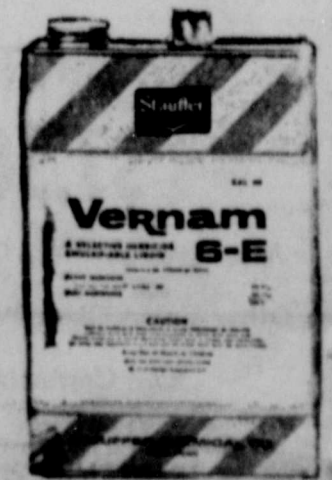

It is not yet time to spray your pecan trees for the control of the pecan nut casebearer, but get your equipment ready. As far as we can determine the date to spray will be sometime after May 20. The casebearers started emerging as adult moths on May 4. Only a few of the pupae have emerged as moths as of May 9.

A. D. Ellington of Cisco trapped 92 pupae and larva and is keeping record of their emergence. This is one of the best ways we have of determining the spray date. We should be able to give you the exact days to spray next week. This date will be sooner in the Rising Star area than in the northern part of the county.

Several insecticides are good for the control of the casebearer. They include Malathion, Sevin, Guthion, DDT, Thiodan, Parathion and Nicotine Sulfate. Sevin and Malathion are less toxic and safer to use on trees in the yard. Be sure to add zinc sulfate to your spray at the rate of two pounds per 100 gallons of water. Zinc is a nutrient which most pecan trees need.
