"We are writing you in the hope that you may be able to locate Marcus Alvin O'Bryant or his heirs, so that we may be able to pay him or them certain moneys as the result of oil production."

Then the girls laid out patterns on their material for dresses and cut them out, after which they marked their darts with tracing paper.

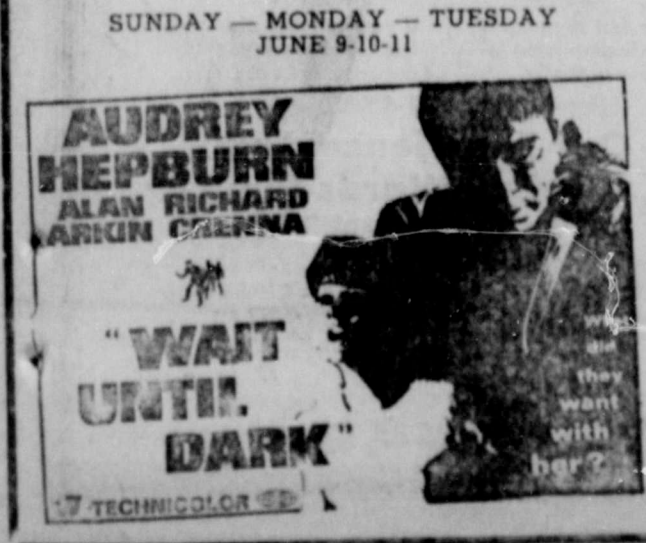

The Sears Roebuck Foundation sponsors the swine program in 126 counties in the State of Texas. The individuals participating in the program receive a registered Duroc gilt free of charge. In turn the boys and girls agree to

AUSTIN — Texas' Constitutional Revision Commission has completed its series of winter and spring work sessions, rewriting the Texas charter of government. It will not meet again until August.

Any fair analysis of the status of constitutional revision in Texas would have to be based on a note of pessimism regarding the chances for ultimate acceptance of the committee's work to date. Main problems for the 25 revisionists to overcome was

created when the Commission was established — by a divided legislature — in the spring of 1967.

There will be a hot time in this old town... extending from the June 4 opening of the special legislative session until whenever it ends... and that is anybody's guess. Main business, of course, is passing a \$2,500,000,000 appropriations bill to finance state government for the 1969 fiscal year beginning Sept. 1 and approval of about \$125,000,000 in new taxes.

Governor Connally has recommended general revenue spending of \$465,200,000. That would require \$123,800,000 in additional state taxation. Legislative Budget Board proposes a budget of \$471,000,000 from the fund over which the legislature has direct control, which would boost the tax bill to \$129,600,000.

Connally's tax bill calls for an increase of the state sales tax rate from two to three per cent, with cities to get most of the additional revenue in the form of a direct rebate. Many services not now taxed also would be included in the three per cent levy. Statewide tax would do away with one per cent local sales tax now charged in more than 300 cities that contain the vast majority of Texas' population.

Session also is expected to come to grips with the explosive issue of liquor by the drink. A slight majority of the legislators live in districts which approved the May 4 mixed drink referendum by margins ranging from slight to overwhelming. But that's no assurance the measure will pass.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith

and House Speaker Ben Barron also are urging Governor Connally to submit riot control bills to the legislators. They propose laws which would give cities authority to contract with each other for the exchange of police officers in the event of violent outbreaks; empower cities to enact strict curfew ordinances curbing sale of liquor, flammable materials and weapons; make it unlawful to trespass on public property with intent to interfere with public business; ban disturbances of public meetings and provide stiff penalties for interfering with police and others performing public duties in riot-hit cities.

Hold onto your hats and fasten your seat belts. This could be a good one!

Attorney General Martin has held that four new junior colleges can get \$32,369 in state funds based on "full time student equivalents".

Opinion aids Bee County Junior College (\$3,780); Central Texas College at Killeen (\$21,658); Galveston Community College (\$3,733) and College of the Mainland at Texas City (\$3,196).

Martin also held that Comptroller Robert S. Calvert could exempt certain equipment from annual inventory requirement for Clients of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the Texas Education Agency.

Attorney General said a justice of the peace in an administrative hearing on driver license suspensions may not make findings or issue orders when licensee does not appear and where service is attempted by certified mail but there is no post office receipt showing delivery.

Short Snorts

Governor has named City Corporation Judge Thomas A. Curtis district attorney at Amarillo and Earl Conner judge of 91st District Court in Eastland County.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith named Republican Sen. Ike Harris to the Senate finance committee.

Rep. J. A. Garcia Jr. of Raymondville was sworn in as a new member of House of Representatives, replacing Rep. Bill Rapp who resigned.

Governor Connally asked President Johnson to declare Hill County a major disaster area due to 18 inch rains in the area May 7-10.

A planning commission grant of \$698 went to the South Texas Council of Governments and a \$500 grant to VVictoria and Cuero Council of Governments.

State Highway Department initiated planning for an additional bridge on U. S. Highway 290 across the Brazos River in Washington and Waller Counties.

Texas Gulf shrimping is in a closed period until July 15 to allow migrating shrimp to reach minimum legal size, according to the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

National Legislative Conference has issued a code of fair procedures for state legislative investigations and survey of the laws, principles, and guidelines which surround such probes.
