COUNTY - City hospital, Ranger General at Ranger, could be in for a windfall of cash as the result of an anti-trust suit brought by the State against five drug companies. In a letter received by County Judge Scott Bailey, Attorney General Crawford Martin's office says in part:

"On Aug. 4, 1967, Atty. Gen. Martin filed suit against Chas. Pfizer & Co., Inc., American Cyanamid Co.; Bristol-Meyers Co.; Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp.; and The Upjohn Co. seeking treble damages arising from violations of the anti-trust laws of the United States. This law suit was filed on behalf of the State of Texas and its political subdivisions, including all publicly owned hospitals. The Ranger Hospital has a claim against the defendants in this case that could be quite substantial in money damages."

These suits, by nature, take a long time to resolve.

JUNE IS THE MONTH for all persons who will turn 65 in the next three months to file applications for social security benefits and enroll for Medicare.

## 12 STUDENTS APPROVED FOR NYC PROGRAM

Ranger High School's NYC program got off to a start Tuesday morning with 12 students approved for the program. Students get \$1.25 per hour and may work 26 hours each week for a total of \$32.50 a week per student. The weekly payroll will be \$390 which will help some in the economy of Ranger.

No more students will be put on the summer program since the limit for Ranger is 12 but applications will still be accepted in case someone moves or quits or is dropped.

Mr. Tip Arthur is administrator of the program and works out of the Eastland County Courthouse.

Students must be 16 years of age to apply.

They will not work July 1 through July 12.

Application blanks may be secured in the office of the high school principal James W. Childress or Supt. James R. Clark.

## TESCO Joins Other Companies In Major Nuclear Fuel Program

Texas Electric Service Co. and 20 other investor-owned electric utility companies have joined with Gulf General Atomic Inc. of San Diego, Calif. in a major new program to accelerate development of a nuclear reactor that will create new nuclear fuel faster than it consumes it.

Burl B. Hulsey Jr., president of Texas Electric Service, said that the two-year cooperative program meets a growing world-wide interest in gas-cooled breeder reactors. He said that while fast breeder reactors have been under development in the United States and Europe for almost two decades, the gas-cooled breeder system, using helium gas for the coolant, represents a new approach toward the development of a reactor system with an exceptionally high breeding gain if new fissionable material and resultantly low fuel cost.

The research sponsored by the group could ultimately lead to the construction and operation of a full-scale gas-cooled fast breeder reactor nuclear power system by the early 1980's, Hulsey said.

Four other electric utility companies operating in Texas are participating in the program.

## School Tax Rolls To Be Hiked To Makeup For Recent Value Loss

If the Board of Equalization of Ranger Independent School District should increase the present tax roll by \$200,000 in value it will just make up by over \$100 in revenue in value lost this present, tax year Supt. James R. Clark told the Rotary Club Wednesday noon.

Last year the district lost \$187,000 in value due to pipe lines being dug up and buildings torn down or sold and some property devalued.

It appears that the Board of Equalization will raise the tax roll by about \$200,000 this summer after some raising, and cutting in an effort to equalize taxes in the school district.

The Board appears to be doing a fine job in the short time they can operate Clark said but it has only taken up the slack in cut values and has not helped to meet an anticipated deficit next term, Clark told the group.

Clark listed the known increases in expenditures that he will recommend to the school trustees. They are \$2,500 for a full time janitor at Young, \$450 for total increase in present custodians due to raises or overtime pay, \$400 for a Science Kit for a new science program in the elementary school at Young, \$525 for dues in Region XIV Regional XIV Regional Media Center, (all but two schools in this entire area joined this year and Ranger was one of

the two), increased cost of tax collection after allowing for college cost \$638.

The State is requiring the district to pay \$1,467 more for teacher salaries next year. In five years this local share of

salaries has been increased over \$5,000 without local taxes being increased to offset it, Clark said.

Increase in cost of band director and a new coach to be hired will cost an additional

\$350 Clark estimated. The cost of salaries for the three member board of equalization is not known but they have worked long hours and the trustees have voted to pay them for their work.

Young School needs either a new boiler or 13 individual room space heaters installed at a cost of about \$3,000. The district will owe the Transportation Fund about \$1,500 for mileage traveled this year Clark said and perhaps \$1,300 will need to be borrowed to complete this school year. Cost of fire insurance has gone up \$1,300 next year due to rate increase and a shorter number of years to pay the premiums. Increased cost of school supplies is not included in the total.

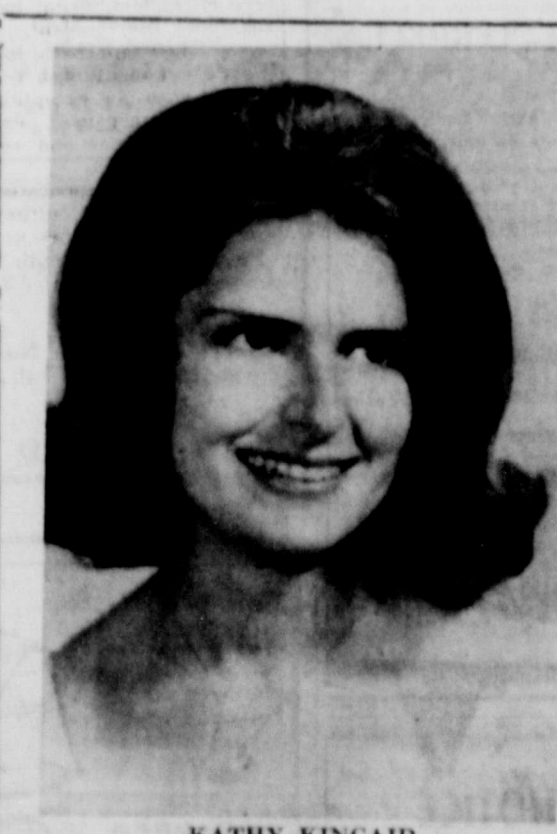
Total new cost for 68-69 is \$13,750. The \$200,000 increase in values should bring in \$2,300 for Local Maintenance. This leaves a deficit of \$11,450.

This means the taxpayer will have to pay more taxes he said. This increase does not include new windows needed, painting of all windows in the district, repairs to roofs that are new leaking nor new lights and many other things would do this soon.

He said that 27 school districts in Texas give their teachers continuing contracts after a three year probationary period and he hoped Ranger would do this soon.

He said that 27 schools districts have a professional consultation agreement between their school board and the faculty and that he thought this was a good idea.

He told the club that 38 percent of all taxes to the schools were paid by 16 large corporations or local firms. He said the district has about 113,558 acres on the tax roll at an average assessment value of \$7.50 per acre which represents 30 percent of selling price. He said the public school tax on the average acre is a little over 11 cents per acre while the college tax was a little over seven cents an acre. Total tax is about eighteen and three-fourths cents per acre for the college and public schools combined.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS:

Section 1. On the 24th day of June, 1968, at 6:30 p.m. in the City Commission Chamber of the City Hall of the City of Ranger, Texas, the Commission will hold a public hearing giving all interested persons the right to appear and be heard on the proposed annexation by the City of Ranger, Texas, of the following described property, to wit:

THIS GIVES NOTICE THAT under the authority of Section 9, Article IX, Constitution of the State of Texas, a bill which authorizes the creation of a Ranger Hospital District in Eastland County, Texas will be submitted to the State of Texas for its consideration.

It is hereby provided by the Legislature that among other things that the district has the power to issue bonds to provide funds for the acquisition or construction, or both, of necessary buildings and equipment for hospital purposes and to levy taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation of all taxable property in the district to support the bonds issued and the maintenance and operating expenses of the district.

HOWEVER, the bill requires the approval of a majority of the qualified property tax-paying electors of the district voting at an election called for that purpose; and the bill prohibits, after the creation of the district, all other municipalities or political subdivisions from the levy of taxes and the issuance of bonds and other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district.

Section 3. The importance of this ordinance creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the rule requiring ordinances be read at three several meetings be suspended, and this rule is hereby suspended, and the ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption.

A motion to adopt the foregoing Ordinance was made by Commissioner Van Bibber, seconded by Commissioner Marslander. Upon count the vote was found to be AYES: ALL; NAYS: None Thereupon, the Ordinance was found to be duly adopted and passed according to City Statutes. Passed and approved this 30th day of May 1968.

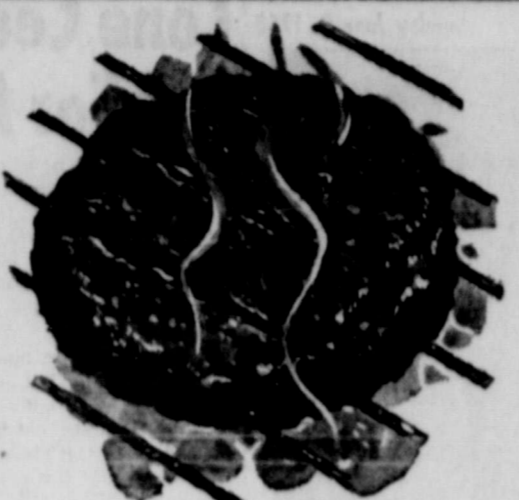

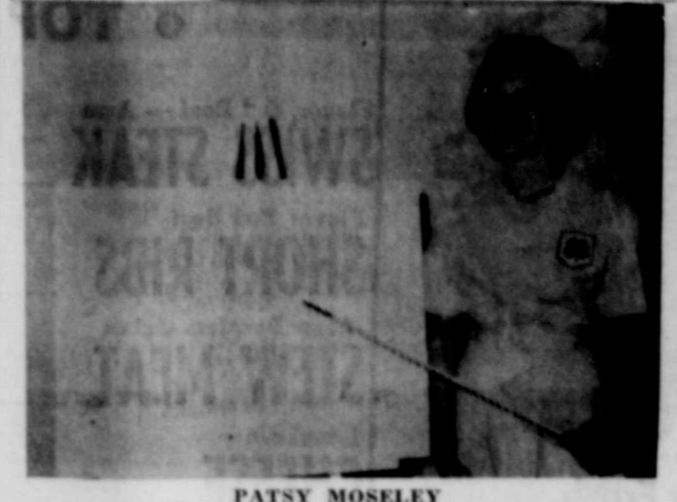

 1 small jar pimentos, chopped and drained  
 3 1/2 ounces of ripe, pitted olives; drained and chopped  
 1 can cream of mushroom soup  
 5 ounces mild cheddar cheese, shredded  
 Boil chicken until tender. Save the broth, chop up chicken and set aside. Cook cel-

ery, green pepper, onion, and garlic salt in butter. Cook slowly for 30 minutes in a covered dish. When done, add worcestershire sauce and set aside. In chicken broth, cook spaghetti by package directions. When spaghetti is done, add pimentos, olives, mushroom soup, and all other ingredients and fold in cheese. Put in casserole dish and warm in oven until heated through. Garnish as desired. Serves 6 to 8.

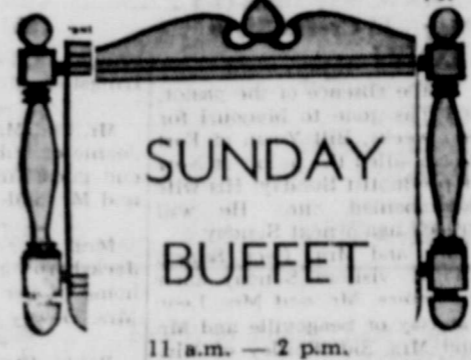

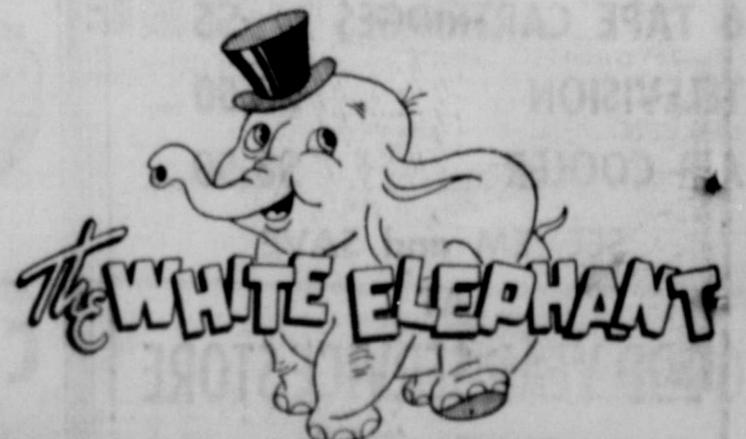

**THE GORDON SPOT**

If you have not sprayed your pecan trees to control the pecan nut casebearer this should be done right away. The best time to spray was between May 24 and May 28. Most of the trees I have looked at have a good crop of pecans. We also expect a large number of insects so this should be the year when a good spray program will really pay off.

It also looks like insects are going to be a real problem in the vegetable garden this summer. Sometimes a small cloud of insecticide decides who will enjoy the delicious vegetables in your garden — you or those garden pests. Insecticides, applied at the right time and the right place, are your guarantee that you and your family will be able to enjoy the vegetables from your garden.

Garden chemicals are carefully screened by USDA and the Food and Drug Administration before manufacturers are allowed to make them available to producers. The label clearly states the insects for which the insecticide is effective, its rate of application and the necessary waiting interval between application and eating or processing the vegetables.

The most commonly used insecticides for home gardens are carbaryl (Sevin), chlor-dane, DDT, diazinon, malathion, methoxychlor, rotenone, and sulfur.

For specific information on home garden insect control come by the county agent's office and pick up a copy of "Insect Control in the Home Garden."

Treatment now for cattle grubs can mean extra money in your pocket on sale day. The heel fly activity has ceased and this is a sign of the start of the cattle grub cycle. It is best to apply systemic in this critical time before the young grubs can do their damage to meat and hide of slaughter animals. Various formulations of "Ruelene", "Co-Ral", and "Neguvon" can be applied as either dips, sprays, or back-line pour-ons. Ronnel can be administered as free choice block or granular mineral mix to range animal — "Rid-Ey" granules and "Trolene-FM" feed mix can be mixed into animals' rations. Some of these materials will also control horn flies, lice, and ticks when used properly.

Not only do grubs damage the meat and hide, but they complete with the animal for vital nutrients. Adult flies can cause cattle fleeing from the bothersome pest to lose energy and weight.
