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## Gun-Play

Brings Charges,

Confinement

Among the charges considered by the 91st District grand jury which went into session Tuesday were murder with malice and assault with a deadly weapon.

Clifford Rust of Eastland was in Eastland County jail Tuesday, being held without bond, charged with the Friday fatal shooting of another Eastland man.

Raymond Stuart, 23, of Eastland, was released from county jail Monday after making bond of \$1,000. He was charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

Following closely on the heels of Friday shooting, the second affray happened Saturday night and Stuart, wounded in the arm from a 30-30 rifle allegedly fired by Elmer Sullivent of Eastland, was taken before Eastland Justice of the Peace L. W. Dalton.

Eastland authorities reported that Stuart drove into Sullivent's driveway and began arguing with Sullivent. Stuart took a shotgun from his car and threatened Sullivent, who ran into his house for his rifle, law officers said.

The two men began to wrestle, and the rifle went off, grazing Stuart in the arm, the authorities said.



WASHINGTON, D.C. — On August 25, 1959, I introduced a Resolution in the Congress which would permit two companies of Marines to patrol the streets of Washington, which, of course, is a Federal City, in conjunction with the police.

Again on Feb. 26, 1963 and July 14, 1965, the same Resolution was introduced and each of these was referred to the Armed Services Committee where it was opposed by the Defense Department. In fact, Departmental reports, including the District of Columbia Commissioners, were adverse to the passage of this measure.

As time went on it is common knowledge as to what happened and, finally, the Marines and Soldiers were called in to quell riots and looting.

On three different occasions The House of Representatives passed legislation which would have the effect of nullifying many of the Supreme Court's decisions affecting arrest and prosecution of criminals. The Senate did not act.

At last, they have done so, and last week a bill was passed which has as its purpose to override certain Court judgments which have handicapped law enforcement and providing assistance to police enforcement in the States.

Title I of the Bill provides planning grants and action grants to State and local law enforcement agencies to develop and strengthen the total service. Title II of the Bill seeks to give authority back to the trial courts that they may not be handicapped by these decisions which have given encouragement to the criminal as against the public interest. The tendency of the Federal courts, and especially the Supreme Court, to disrupt the finality of State court decisions has eroded respect for law and diminished the fear of punishment.

Another important part of Title II says that the Supreme Court can not review the question of the voluntariness of a confession when the voluntary aspect has already been established by the highest court of a State. Under the proposed legislation, the standard for admitting confessions as evidence will return to the time-tested standard of true voluntariness. It sets aside the inflexible and technical rules established in the so-called Malloy case.



## Fort Griffin Was Rough and Tumble Outpost In Its Day

**ALBANY**—In the saga of the buffalo hunters, and marauding Comanches mingled and clashed throughout its exciting 14 year history. Shootouts and fist fights were part of everyday life at Fort Griffin, and both the town calaboose and the Fort Griffin guardhouse were full to overflowing.

Full of outlaws and scoundrels, the town had 35 public killings, eight or ten persons found dead, and 12 more either shot or strung up by officers of the law.

Wyatt Earp and Doc Holliday began their celebrated friendship in Fort Griffin, and the notorious outlaw "Joe Bowers" was a barkeeper in one of the numerous saloons

First known as Camp Wilson for the late son of the U. S. Senator from Massachusetts, the fort was established July 31, 1867 by units of the Sixth U. S. Cavalry commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Samuel D. Sturgis.

Temporary structures, chiefly tents and picket houses, were set up to house men, and log houses from a nearby ranch were hauled in and reconstructed to serve as headquarters for the post commander and as a hospital.

Built on a bluff overlooking the Clear Fork branch of the Brazos River, a site which came to be known as "Government Hill," Fort Griffin was in a commanding position to withstand attack, and had the added advantage of being close to a constant supply of good water.

The fort was an important supply post for buffalo hunters, trail drivers, and settlers. The Western Cattle Trail which wound through Fort Griffin brought more than 1,000,000 head of cattle driven by 2,000 cowboys through there in 1871.

At the time Fort Griffin was established, the situation along the far western border of Texas from the Red River to the Rio Grande was desperate indeed.

Some 500 persons on the frontier had been murdered by Indians in the period from June 1862 to 1867, and the Indian marauders, chiefly Kiowas and Comanches, usually managed to elude the punitive expeditions sent against them.

Scarcely a fifth of the ranches were occupied, according to a report in the "Waco Register" of April 21, 1866, and the area around Fort Griffin in particular was swarming with Comanches, drawn there by the numerous buffalo herds.

White outlaws dressed as Indians raided Indian Territory, stirring up the savages to shameful atrocities. Petitions and angry letters to Congress and to military authorities finally achieved the desired result—a decision to establish a new frontier defense line, one on which "Fort Griffin" was the most strategic point.

With troops from the fort garrisoning subposts at Belknap and west of Phantom Hill, the settlers at last had some measure of security against Indian raids.

After several campaigns and battles, the Indian problem in the Fort Griffin area was substantially solved, and plans to abandon the fort as early as 1873 were made.

But the settlers protested. They were by no means positive that the Indian menace was a thing of the past, and they drew up a formal petition, requesting the "border guardian" be maintained.

Their pleas were heeded, and troops stayed on at Fort Griffin for a number of years.

Frontier towns and forts, by their nature, attracted the most adventurous and roguish characters in the country, and during the years which Fort Griffin guarded the country, it got its share of fortune seekers and cutthroats.

Soldiers, settlers, cowboys,

in the town just south of Fort Griffin.

No frontier town would have been complete without its house of ill repute, and Fort Griffin had one with one of the most picturesque names in the west. It was called the "Place of Beautiful Sin" and was presided over by Mollie McCabe.

The roughness of the town, of course, is only one side of the coin. The beautiful land attracted sober and respectable businessmen and ranchers as well as ruffians; men such as Frank Conrad, W. C. Dalrymple, Judge C. K. Trilling, W. H. Ledbetter, Sam Newcomb, Mart V. Hoover, Barber Watkins Reynolds, John Alexander Mathers, and heads of other distinguished frontier families—"the vanguard of culture which would soon transform that country."

Law and order did ultimately prevail. The Comanches were subdued, the buffalo hunters had slaughtered most of the southern herd by 1879 and moved on to other pastures,

cattle drives along the Western Trails gradually diminished, and responsible citizens allied themselves with efficient military commanders to bring civilized peace to the area.

The fort was officially abandoned on May 31, 1881, when the last troops, Captain J. B. Irvine and Company A of the 22nd Infantry, marched off to Fort Clark for reassignment.

Within a few years, the frame structures had deteriorated or had been hauled away by settlers. On the level top of Government Hill today, only a few remains of the stone structures may be seen—crumbling walls, and naked rock chimneys, mute evidence of a rip-roaring past.

Now a part of Fort Griffin State Park, the site contains a 40-ton granite monument with a bronze tablet on which are recorded the dates of military occupancy, and a tribute to the town as the seat of West Texas civilization, headquarters for buffalo hunters, government surveyors, and primitive

supply station for trail drivers on the Fort Griffin-Fort Dodge trail, longest on the continent.

The Survey Committee has long encouraged the development of historical museums at the local level.

This year, the committee offered professional guidance to the state's smaller museums by sponsoring the Second Small Museum Institute in Fort Worth.
