## RANGER NEEDS A NEW HOSPITAL

Ranger is in need of a new hospital, it was pointed out at a meeting Friday night in the conference room of the First State Bank. The present hospital does not meet the standards that are set by the state.

The meeting was held Friday night for the purpose of studying the feasibility of building a new hospital. Several means of building a new hospital were mentioned at the meeting.

A committee was appointed to study the best way to go about getting a new hospital. The committee appointed were Dr. W. P. Watkins, Dr. E. W. Mince, Dr. Luther Gohlke, Bill Marslander, Pat Collins, and Wayne Matthews. This committee will work with the Citizens Advisory Committee which was appointed by the City Commission several weeks ago.

The big question is, "Do You Want a New Hospital?" Ranger needs a new hospital and some of the ways to raise the necessary amount of money for a new hospital is to sell subscriptions for the hospital, revenue bonds, vote a tax or go through the HUD program.

Another meeting will be held Monday night at 7:30 o'clock in the conference room at the Junior College to continue the study on the hospital and other needs for the program.

## Damage Suit for \$102,929 Filed In 91st Court

A Cisco man is suing a cosmetics firm for \$102,929.29 in connection with the death of his wife, according to records on file Friday at the courthouse in Eastland.

The suit was filed by W. E. Ricks, Eastland County resident, and his daughter, Lucille Ricks Beard, of Caddo Parish, Louisiana, against Cosmair, Inc., a national cosmetics firm represented in Texas by Prentice-Hall Corporation System, Inc., of Austin. The suit was filed in 91st District Court by Turner and Seabury, Eastland attorney, representing Ricks and Alice D. Ricks, 53 at the time of her death, died a Hendrick Hospital in Abilene August 15, 1966. She was the wife of W. E. Ricks and the mother of Mrs. Beard.

The suit alleges that a beauty operator put "New Excellence Formula Immedia Petite Creme Shampoo Colour" on Mrs. Ricks' hair June 30, 1966 and that Mrs. Ricks suffered a severe reaction and was hospitalized. She was transferred to the Abilene hospital on July 4, 1966.

Claiming that "the use of the compound on the hair of Alice D. Ricks was a prominent cause of the resulting reaction and injuries sustained by Mrs. Ricks and her hospital and medical treatment of her subsequent death," the suit asks \$1,929.29 for hospital and medical costs, \$1,009 for funeral expenses, and the sum of \$100,000 for personal suffering.

## Improvement Program Has Begun On Campus of Ranger Junior College

A major campus improvement program has begun at Ranger Junior College to get the school ready for an expected record enrollment this fall.

Some of the campus improvements will be obvious to even the most casual visitor to the school. Other changes will be obvious only to students and faculty.

The most obvious change in the campus will result from the campus-wide curbing, guttering, and paving program now under way. Workmen have already begun laying concrete for the curbs and gutters and paving work is expected to begin shortly.

The change that will be most obvious to students and faculty members is a result of

a central air conditioning system recently installed in the Education Building. The central air system will make it possible for the school to offer classes throughout the year without regard to the weather. Plans are being made now to air condition the Science Building and college officials hope the day will soon come when all buildings on the campus will be air conditioned.

In recent action, the board of regents authorized the remodeling of the third floor of the Joseph Building, the college's downtown dormitory. The program will provide dormitory space for 59 additional resident students.

Ranger Hall, the largest men's dormitory on campus, is being completely remodeled inside and out. Furniture is being refinished, the entire interior is being repainted, floors refinished, and the exterior trim is being repainted to match the rest of the campus.

The old Student Union Building on the north side of the campus will be remodeled this summer and turned into a Business Building. The building will contain two classrooms, restrooms, and office space for business teachers. New furniture for the building has been purchased. The building will provide instruction space for all business and secretarial science courses.

Plans are being made to acquire two new buildings for the campus by this fall. One of the buildings will be used for a student center and the other will be turned into a practice gymnasium.

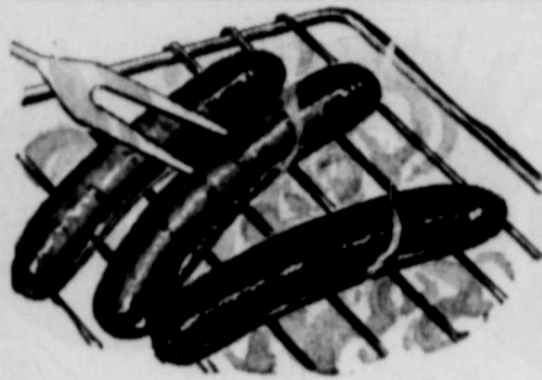


