Dear Pat,
I am writing this letter to the citizens of Ranger that have respect for themselves and their families and their friends.

My wife and I made the unfortunate mistake of seeing "Rosemary's Baby," a movie starring Mia Farrow and John Cassavetes. The idea behind this movie is "God is dead." This idea is presented in the most gruesome, revolting way imaginable.

I am of the opinion that the trend to turn away from God is the cause underlying most of the trouble in our world today. The question of whether or not God is dead has been presented in several magazines and books and discussed over television. This is the first occasion, to my knowledge, of it being presented so blatantly to the American public.

The advertisements all have clearly written on them, "for mature audiences." You should have seen the mature audiences entering the theater. Old people of at least 8 or 10 years.

I say neither mature audiences nor any audience should see this trash. It should be banned from every city or town in our nation.

Our nation has suffered because of a few people who are willing to speak up for what they believe. A small group of atheists have caused prayer to be banned in our public schools. In one instance, in my own home town, a cross was removed from the fire station that had glowed gloriously every Christmas for as long as I can remember because of the complaints of a small group. Our police and law enforcement agencies almost have their hands tied because of Supreme Court rulings protecting criminals. I feel that it's time for some rulings protecting me and my family and all the millions of American citizens like me that are average, law abiding, peace loving, and God fearing people.

Why don't we millions of people let our voice of protest be heard. There would be a roar across the nation so loud that even the Supreme Court would not dare to turn away.

Again, the purpose of this letter is to ask everyone in the city of Ranger and anyone else that should happen to read it, regardless of where you are, to place a private ban on "Rosemary's Baby."

Second Semester Registration To Begin Monday At Ranger College

English, government, history, and mathematics courses will be offered during the second summer session at Ranger Junior College beginning July 15.

Registration for the second

six-weeks term will begin at 6 p. m. on the 15th. Classes begin at 7 p. m. on Tuesday, July 16.

All summer school classes at RJC will be held in the completely air conditioned Academic Building on the RJC campus.

Summer classes meet two times a week for three hours per night. Classes begin at 7 and run until 10:15.

Three courses will be offered on Monday and Thursday evenings: English 102, the second semester of Freshman English; Government 201; State and Local Government; and Math 104, College Trigonometry.

On Tuesday and Friday evenings, two courses will be offered: English 202, English literature from the romantic period to the present day; and History 102, American history from 1865 to the present day.

Instructors for the second summer session will include Floyd A. Walker, who will teach both English courses; Ellis Frazier, instructor in

history and government and head coach at Eastland High School, will teach the history and government courses; and Orland Aldridge who will teach the math course.

Cost for each course at RJC is \$25. In addition, each student is required to pay a \$10 registration fee.

Ranger's Royal Neighbors of America placed in the float division with Ranger High School Cheerleaders in second place and Ranger Little League All-Stars in third.

Marimela Henderson, Eaton and Hardy Tanner were first, second and third place winners in the bicycle division. Group winners received trophies and individuals (bicycle) were awarded gift certificates from Ranger merchants.

Bo Bland and his Tricky "T" Model Ford won applause from the large crowd of spectators and thrilled local youngsters privileged to ride in the ancient struggle buggy. Another attraction was Miss Charlene Hargrave of Stamford and her small gray horse called "Sandy, the Texas-size Stick Horse."

In the bareback bronc riding event three Graham cowboys were among the top contenders as Danny Sloan scored a 51 for the high point with Al Gardner second with

a 47, Runt Sloan, 46 and Virgil Martin of Graham scored a 44.

Royce Kitchens of Cisco was the top roper of the night Thursday as he tied his calf in 11.5 seconds. Connie Gibbs of Winters was second with a 13.3 and Timmy Griffin of Fort Worth placed third in the calf roping event with a 14.7 second timing.

A new event for the sixth annual Jaycee Rodeo was the Match Sack Race which caused a lot of excitement in the Thursday night performance of the rodeo. The Ranger Riding Club challenged the Riding Club of DeLeon in this event. The Sack Race is rather new in this area of rodeos. The DeLeon Riding Club won the race as riders of each club raced around the arena and the one that put a sack into a barrel in the center of the arena was declared the winner.

In the girl's barrel race Connie Wilkinson of New Castle placed first with an 18.8 second run around the barrels. Tying for second place was Lana Wise of Stephenville and Ginger Hilton of Olney with a fast 19.4 second run.

In the final event of the night D. M. Simms of Borger scored a 56 in the Brahama bull riding. Prater Gibbs of Belton was second with a score of 55 points.
