

Rotary Dist. Governor To Visit Here Aug. 6

Ranger Rotarians are preparing for the Aug. 6 visit of the governor of this Rotary District, Dr. Ike H. Harrison of Fort Worth.

Dr. Harrison will attend a club assembly to be held at 8:30 p. m. on Tuesday, Aug. 6 at Lone Cedar Country Club. On Wednesday, Aug. 7, he will attend and be guest speaker for the weekly luncheon meeting of the club at Bryan's Steak and Coffee Shop and will confer with John Adair, club president and with other club officials to obtain information on the group's plans for its service activities and to offer suggestions on Rotary administrative matters.

Dr. Harrison is one of 288 Rotary governors in all parts of the world who are serving as representatives of Rotary International in districts composed of member clubs. Each district leader is responsible for supervising the clubs in his area. Rotary, an international men's service organization, has more than 633,000 members in some 13,319 clubs in 143 countries.

A member and past president of the Rotary Club of Fort Worth, Dr. Harrison is dean of the M. J. Neeley School of Business, Texas Christian University. He was elected to office at the Rotary convention in Mexico City in May, 1968 and will serve until June 30, 1969.

Though a seasoned Rotarian before his election to the office of district governor, Dr. Harrison attended an eight-day international assembly last May at Lake Placid, N. Y., U. S. A., at which all Rotary governors for 1968-69 attended in-depth seminars to plan for their jobs. One of his biggest jobs will be to hold a district conference of all Rotary clubs in this area. The conference will be held at the Sheraton Texas Hotel next March 13, 14, and 15, 1969, in Fort Worth.

Geo. Wallace Backers Meet, Organize Here

The Eastland County Convention of the American Political Party met at the Ranch and Farm Service Building in Eastland Tuesday night to organize and plan strategy in support of the George C. Wallace Campaign for President of the United States in 1968.

The presiding officer was Charles L. Hethcoat, Jr., Mineral Wells, district chairman of a nine-county area.

A taped speech by Henry Buckley of Mississippi was enthusiastically received by the some 30 people present, and there was a question and answer period of discussion.

Gordon Clark of Eastland was named county chairman and Mr. and Mrs. Richard Rosander, also of Eastland, accepted the responsibility of secretary and treasurer of the organization. Forty dollars was collected to promote the distribution of campaign literature locally. Four from Cisco attended.

The position of the party appears to be extreme right wing conservative, a spokesman said, and issues touched on were the Vietnam war, registration of guns, Supreme Court authority, sacredness of property rights and law enforcement in America.

It was pointed out that Texas voters may legally vote for the person of their choice in November regardless of their party pledge in the May elections. A strong statement was also made that the election of Wallace did not require a majority of all the votes cast, but just more votes than any other single candidate receives.

Future political activities of the party include a \$25 plate fund-raising dinner in Houston Aug. 6 when Candidate Wallace will speak; an area dinner at \$6 a plate at the Baker Hotel in Mineral Wells on Aug. 10; and the American Party State Convention to be held in Austin on Sept. 17.

Petitions Ask Elections to Combine Olden, Eastland Independent School Units

A meeting will be held Friday morning in County Commissioners Courtroom to discuss a date for setting the elections, County Judge Scott Bailey announced on Wednesday. Time for the

meeting will be 10 a. m. and all persons who signed the petitions and school officials from Olden and Eastland are invited to attend and participate in the date setting, he said.

Judge Bailey said he has found the petitions to be sufficient in number of names of qualified voters.

He guessed that Saturday, Aug. 24 to be the earliest date possible for the election.

Petitions asking elections to consider the consolidation of the Olden Independent School District with the Eastland Independent School District were filed with County Judge Scott Bailey Monday morning. The petition from Olden contained the names of 42 persons and the one from Eastland contained 24 names. Only 20 qualified voters are required to call such elections, officials report.

Judge Bailey said that he would probably check the validity of the signers Monday against the poll lists from the two towns and call the election on Tuesday. Most likely date for the elections in view of the 20-day absentee ballot period, would most likely be late August, possibly, Saturday, the 24th.

The matter would have to carry in both towns to accomplish the consolidation of Olden with Eastland, it is reported. In effect, the Olden voters would be voting to determine if a majority of them want to consolidate their school system with that of Eastland and the Eastland voters would be voting to determine if the Eastland school would receive the Olden system.

Many questions naturally arise from such a situation, and the word "consolidation" is relatively fresh in the minds of Eastland Countians in view of the six-district vote only a few years ago. A proposal to consolidate six of the nine (at that time) systems into one giant district was soundly defeated in each district then.

Knowledgeable authorities doubt that the voters in Olden will vote to consolidate at this time. It is further expected that school officials in Ranger will probably extend an invitation to the Olden officials to consider consolidating into that system.

The Olden schools are scheduled to open Sept. 3.

Last consolidation into the Eastland system was in 1949 when the Morton Valley Independent School District was consolidated into the Eastland system. Last consolidation in the county was when Seranton joined the Cisco system several years ago.

The question of "incentive aid" (a subject that drew much attention back during the six-district vote) would come under careful scrutiny under the proposed consolidation. The aid is a state program in which school districts which absorb other districts are granted certain amounts to assist them financially.

Presumably the teacher contracts and any other obligations now held by the Olden system would be absorbed by the Eastland system. The Olden system has no bonded indebtedness and is one of the few districts in the state to enjoy that distinction.

The Olden system is now scheduled for some eight classroom teacher units, an agriculture teacher, a coach, a superintendent, a part-time principal and a part-time home economics instructor. These probably would be reduced under consolidation, authorities report.

The Olden trustees have individually and so far, unofficially, expressed disapproval with the consolidation move, believing, they say, that it is not necessary at this time.

To be eligible for the state's incentive aid, the new consolidated district would have to have a total average daily attendance of 750 — which the Eastland and Olden schools would have.

Mrs. Halbert Reports On Family's Work-Vacation Trip To Northwest

From Mrs. A. B. Halbert comes the following interesting account of the family's work-vacation in the Northwest which we are happy to share with our readers.

This is, I believe, the most unusual vacation our family ever had, although at times I feel a homesickness for Texas and we will be happy to get back to Ranger this fall.

It took me 12 days to drive across country pulling the camping trailer but we had a safe trip with only parts of each day devoted to driving and finding the next campground. Estes Park, Colo. was so crowded on July 4th that we took a round of sight-seeing and moved on north to a National Forest area on the Cache La Poudre River where not quite so many people were stopping and no fireworks were allowed.

Yellowstone Park was equally crowded and we stayed one night in a cabin in order to secure a more desirable place in "Old Faithful" campground. Mary Evelyn was fascinated by the bears. One stood up against our car and looked through the closed window. Some New Yorkers were still feeding marshmallows to the bears but we refrained since it is not nutritious for the bears nor safe for the throwers.

We had very little car-trailer trouble except in Montana as we neared Butte via one of those fabulous interstate highways. We noted our car and Montana is well provided for this with running water and parking areas at all roadside parks so we learned to keep the motor running and pour on the water at each stop.

There was rain for 10 of the 12 days on the road. We slept under blankets and even Palo Duro Canyon was muddy where we remembered dust on other visits; also more snow on the mountains than in previous years, but only once were we able to stop and play in the snow.

Thanks to Robert's careful mapping, we were able to drive right through Seattle and on by the Space Needle and up Queen Ann's Hill to the dormitory where Mr. Halbert was staying. We arrived in time for supper in the school cafeteria. (I imagine we looked like wet-backs receiving a handout but we enjoyed the meal just the same).

We were able to move immediately to a college-owned house across the street from Seattle Pacific College. The house is unpretentious, bare in spots but our camping equipment has made it quite comfortable. Most interesting are some of its antique furnishings and the kitchen range - a combination wood-gas stove with two burners over the woodbox and a gas kindler to get the wood started. People here used compressed logs - logs made of shavings and sawdust pressed together to look like a giant rolling pin.

Flowers are gorgeous with Peace roses leading the field. In our yard there are dahlias, hydrangeas, perennial phlox, and day lilies, red and blue fuschia and roses. There is a cherry tree without fruit but Boysenberries are ripening.

We noted with approval Mr. Walker's comment in the Ranger Times that RJC teachers are having more work than vacation. This is certainly true of the group in Physics Institute here. Mr. Halbert has been so busy with Differential equations, vector analysis, electricity, Magnetism, relativity and other phases of physics and related mathematics that, even though many of his classes are in the shadow of the Space Needle, he hasn't had time to go in the Needle.

Family explorations have been broader, including the Needle and it's observation deck and revolving restaurant, downtown to the Port of Seattle across the floating bridges on Lake Washington, the Undersea Gardens across Puget Sound by ferry to Olympic National Park and by land all the way to the Pacific.

This weekend the Sea Fair, an annual 10-day celebration, begins and we expect to enjoy the activity. Janet, Mary and I attended the "All Wool" style show entitled "Dimensions '68" at the Frederick Nelson Dept. Store (the Neiman-Marcus of Seattle). We will visit the University of Washington campus today.

**OFFICIALS TELL HOW
HELPING FIGHT CRIME
IS EVERYBODY'S DUTY**

"It is the duty of the average citizen to cooperate in the prevention, detection and elimination of crime," said Assistant District Attorney Emory Walton. "This means calling a law enforcement officer if you see someone stealing a car," Walton said, "but it also means much more. It means you must be willing to go to court and identify the

theft." "Your community is as much your home as your own property or the quarters you live in," Walton declared, "and crime in your community is crime against you."

Sheriff L. E. Sublett listed ways each citizen can aid law enforcement officers. "Many crimes could be prevented," Sublett said. "People sometimes invite burglary by leaving cars and homes unlocked, or opening the door to strangers."

Sublett said that, with the exception of homicide, the crimes most common are auto larceny, credit card and other larcenies, burglaries, robbery and mugging, assaults, and crimes by and against children and youth.

"Any car runs the risk of theft," Sublett warned. "But you can reduce the risk by locking the car, the garage doors, keeping your car registration and driver's license with you and not in the car,

and leaving packages out of sight in the trunk. A purse or package inside a car is an invitation to a thief. When you are driving, keep the doors locked and use only major highways and streets, especially at night; and never pick up hitchhikers.

"Parents have a great responsibility toward teaching their children to avoid becoming crime victims. Teach children to stay away from strangers completely; refuse to talk

with them, refuse to ride or walk with them. Children should never walk alone at night. They should be taught to get descriptions of strangers who frequent the school area or make advances toward them. Even young children can be taught to describe people and cars."

Sublett said, "There are times when a police department of any size needs help from the average citizen. The citizen can assist in crime detection,

and prosecution. You should never resent questioning by an officer; he may be able to use information you consider worthless. When you need help, call for it immediately; don't assume the police have been notified, do it yourself. Give the address clearly and hold your ground if possible. Help will reach you in a few minutes."

"This help is a two-way street," Walton stressed. "Information given the officers may be information you will

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature, provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided; nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November

1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six percent (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1964, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

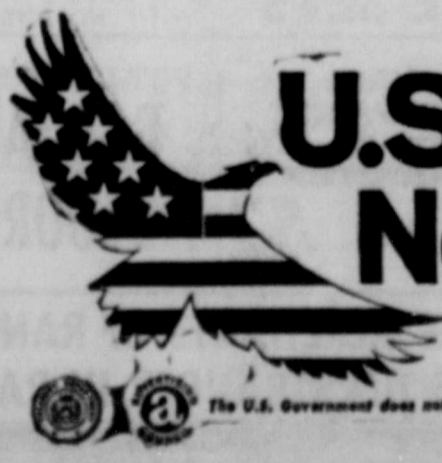

'68-'69 Cotton Expected Better Than Past Year

AUSTIN—Texas cotton production was down 16.1 per cent during the 1967-68 season, the Cotton Economic Research office at The University of Texas reports.

Tabulations as of Jan. 16, 1968, showed 2,638,896 running bales ginned. At the same time in 1967 there were 3,149,925.

The estimated value of lint cotton and cottonseed produced in Texas was down more than \$37 million from that of the previous season, the "Summary Report" said.

"The decrease in the value of production affects the entire economy of the state," the report explains, but hardest hit were segments of the industry other than the grower, primarily the gins, oil mills, compressors and warehouses.

And the cause of the decrease—that unpredictable Texas weather coupled with an increase in diverted acreage.

The report forecasts a brighter picture in 68-69: "All indicators point to an increase in the planted acreage in Texas for the 1968-69 season, along with improved weather conditions for increased production. New and improved varieties are being planted for improved cotton quality rather than for yield alone."

14 Amendments Are Set For Voters In General Election

Voters and vote counters will be confronted with 14 Constitutional amendment proposals in the Nov. 5 general election. A brief summary of the proposals follows, and individual amendments will be discussed in subsequent articles. This newspaper will begin printing complete texts of several of the amendments this week.

Amendment No. 1—Relating to the Employees Retirement System of Texas and revising existing provisions concerning the management of the retirement, disability, and death compensation fund for officers and employees and the administration of the system.

Amendment No. 2—Increasing the amount which may be expended in one year from state funds for public assistance payments to needy aged, needy disabled, needy blind and needy children to \$75,000,000.

Amendment No. 3—Providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System in certain types of securities within the "prudent man rule."

Amendment No. 4—Authorizing Dallas County, by vote of majority of qualified voting, to issue certain road bonds without the necessity for further legislation and providing that bonds issued or to be issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of Section 52, Article III, not be included in determining the debt limit.

Amendment No. 5—Authorizing an annual salary for members of the legislature in an amount not to exceed \$8,400 yearly and extending the

per diem allowance to 140 days of the Regular Session.

Amendment No. 6—Giving permissive authority to the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation devices installed to eliminate or abate harmful effects of air emissions or water effluents on air and water quality of the state.

Amendment No. 7—Providing for continuously reducing state ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all state ad valorem property taxes after Dec. 31, 1970, with the exception of the tax levied for certain institutions of higher education.

Amendment No. 8—Deleting certain constitutional provisions relating to the purchase of fuel by the state and the refurbishing under contract of rooms and halls used by the legislature and eliminating the requirement that the governor, the secretary of state, and the comptroller approve certain contracts of purchase.

Amendment No. 9—Allowing contributions to be made to the Teacher Retirement System of Texas on the basis of full salary of members.

Amendment No. 10—Authorizing the legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within corporate limits of Tarrant, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous with Tarrant.

Amendment No. 11—Authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions and giving political subdivisions authority to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties.

Amendment No. 12—Granting the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

Amendment No. 13—Exempting from ad valorem taxation certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse.

Amendment No. 14—Fixing the time during which members of the legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices.

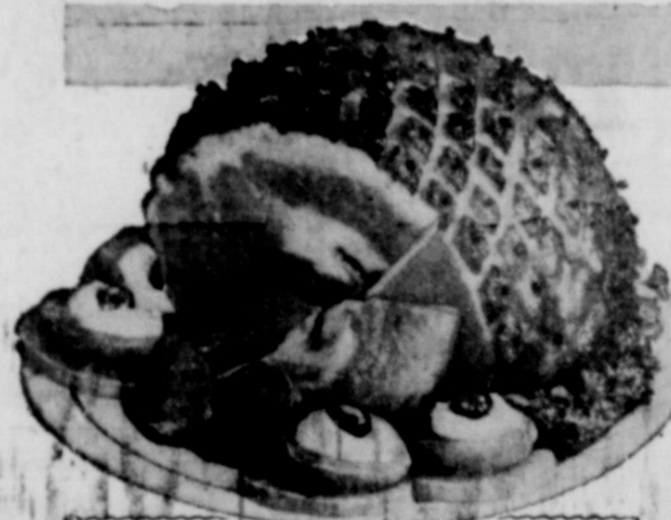
