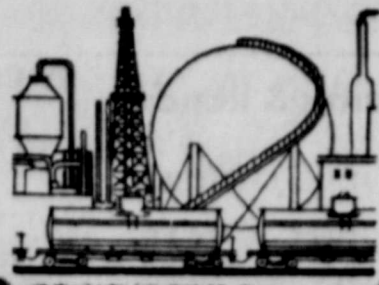
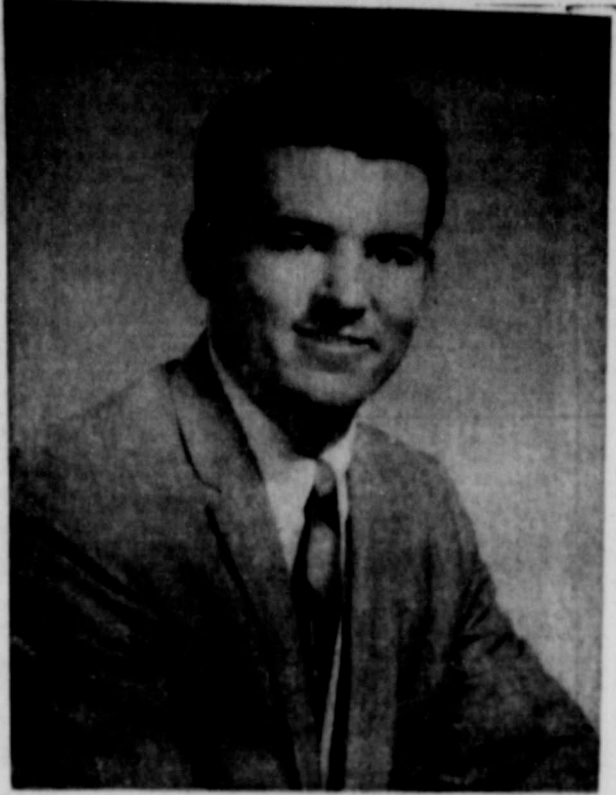

John Adair has tendered his resignation as vice-president of First State Bank of Ranger, effective Aug. 31, to assume the vice-presidency of First National Bank of Midlothian.

In making the announcement, bank president Glyn Gilliam stated that it is with regret that he accepts the resignation and wishes a successful career for Mr. Adair in the new community. Gilliam said that he anticipates no immediate change in bank personnel, that duties of Adair will be absorbed by J. R. Hunt, Bill Parnell and himself.

Adair moved from Cross Plains to Ranger in December, 1964 and has served as vice-president of the local bank since that date. He has been active in civic affairs, currently serving as president of Ranger Rotary Club, is a member of the Citizens Advisory Committee and City Equalization Board and a member of Ranger Jaycee.

Burglary, Fire Reported Here

Three Hospitalized After Gas Well Fire Saturday

Efforts were still underway Tuesday morning to extinguish a blazing gas well that caught fire in an explosion at 11 a. m. Saturday 12 miles southeast of Ranger in Eastland County. Six persons suffered burns, some serious, and there was extensive property damage in the explosion and fire.

Fred McCright of Cisco is owner of the drilling rig that was sinking oil test for I. J. Allen as his No. 3 N. C. Galey.

The location is on the Galey Ranch.

Grady F. Clark, 55, who lives on the Lake Cisco Road near Cisco, suffered burns on about 50 per cent of his upper body, and his condition was described as satisfactory. He was in All-Saints Hospital at Fort Worth and was expected to be in the intensive care unit for six to eight days and in the hospital at least a month, his wife told their daughter, Janice Calloway of Albuquerque, who arrived at their home here Monday.

Mrs. Clark said her husband had second degree burns about the face and head and third degree burns on his hands. She was with him in Fort Worth.

Two others burned in the blast were also at All-Saints Hospital. They are Lamar Perrin, 43, of the Chesny Community near Ranger, who had second and third degree burns over some 30 per cent of his body; and Kemp Slayton, 38, of Eastland who also had second and third degree burns. Their condition was described as satisfactory.

Mr. McCright had burns over both hands and arms and was treated at Ranger General Hospital. Also treated there and released were Clinton Wheat, 9, and his father, Derrill Wheat, of Hamlin. The three men at Fort Worth were taken there after receiving emergency treatment at Ranger General Hospital. They were taken to Fort Worth by Killingsworth Funeral Home of Ranger and Edwards Funeral Home of Strawn.

Mr. Clark was the driller of the crew, and Mr. Perrin was the derrick man with Mr. Slayton and Mr. Wheat serving as roughnecks.

Mr. McCright said that the gas, which has blown out of control, caught fire during efforts to start a small engine used to start the big diesel drilling engine. The hole was 2,440 feet and gas blew out the plug at about 2 a. m. Saturday.

As the fire started, the drilling derrick and other equipment was abandoned as it was too hot to get near the 40-foot flames. The derrick toppled at 1 p. m. Monday and workmen pulled it away. Mr. McCright said that efforts to extinguish the fire were continuing Tuesday morning.

Mr. McCright said that his equipment loss would exceed \$100,000. The loss was partly covered by insurance, he added. His drilling firm has a pipe yard and warehouse on Highway 80 East in Ranger.

The game is wanted for financial reasons to prevent a walk away with the players which sometimes is harmful.

Only eligible players from San Angelo will take part in the game and no seniors will represent the San Angelo sub-varsity team.

Public Notice
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18 and substituting in lieu thereof the following:
"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December of the year in which they were elected, but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day of December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."
If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:
"Section 2-a. Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 19)
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:
"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund."
"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."
Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:
"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."
"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."
Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

'Long' (506 Miles) Calls To Be Cheaper After Aug. 1

Since World War II, the consumer price index has risen 77 per cent. That means, in bread-and-butter terms, that whatever cost 20 cents in 1945 now costs 35 cents today.

But the bread-and-butter of communications — Long Distance telephone service — today costs about half as much as in 1945, thanks to the 23rd reduction in rates since coast-to-coast service began in 1915.

AT&T has announced, effective Aug. 1, a reduction in rates estimated to save customers \$20 million annually on interstate calls covering distances greater than 506 miles.

Back in 1915, when it was first possible to call from New York to Los Angeles, it cost \$20.70. After World War II it was \$4. Under the newest rates, that call will be \$1.70 (daytime, station-to-station, three minutes).

The latest reductions will lower rates for station-to-station daytime calls, placed between 7 a. m. and 5 p. m. Monday through Friday, from 5 to 10 cents for the first three minutes.

Only last November, AT&T reduced interstate rates \$100,000,000 annually.

Already, the customer can call station-to-station anywhere in the U. S. between 7 p. m. and 7 a. m. weeknights and all day weekends for \$1 or less.

Patsy Moseley, Olden 4-H girl, had the grand champion tomatoes at the 4-H tomato show July 26. Her champion entry was the Nematex variety. The 4-H members grew three or more varieties and most agreed that the Nematex was their best tomatoes.

Red spider mites are causing some damage to tomato vines as well as other vegetables. Charley Marshall of Eastland said the spider mites attacked his tomato plants about the middle of July.

Spider mites are about 1-60 inch in size. They are a yellowish or reddish mite which sucks juices from the underside of leaves. They cause pale blotches on upper and lower surfaces of foliage. A little webbing is often present. Plants gradually lose vigor and die. Kelthane is the best insecticide to control spider mites. Tomatoes can be harvested as early as two days after the Kelthane is applied. The Marshalls are using Kelthane on their tomatoes. Charlie and his two sons are known as good tomato growers. Both boys, John and Charles, won champion ribbons at the 4-H tomato show.

Peanut growers should be on the alert for the lesser cornstalk borer. I examined a peanut field near Rising Star last week and found a large number of lesser cornstalk borers. These worms did much damage last year and cost the peanut farmers thousands of dollars.

The borer can be found by looking around the base of the peanut plant and just beneath the soil surface. Usually you will first see small silken tubes or webbing just below the soil surface. The borers can often be found in the silken tubes. The borers are slender and are about 3/4 inch long when full grown. They are light blue or green with brown bands around their bodies.

The borers feed principally on the pegs, pods, stems, and roots.

Peanuts should be sprayed as soon as full grown larvae are found in the soil. The three insecticides recommended for the control of this borer are Diazinon, Parathion, and DDT. They can be applied as granules or sprays. Apply granules in a 12-14 inch uniform band directly over row just prior to pegging. Work into the top few inches of soil immediately. For spray applications use two nozzles per row so that the lower stems and a 6-8 inch band of soil are covered on each side of the row. Repeat applications at 3-4 week intervals as needed.

WASHINGTON "As it looks from here" OMAR BURLESON

WASHINGTON, D. C. — It is an axiom that behind most every great man there has been a great woman. Behind some men there have been many. It does not matter. What does matter is that man has aspired to his highest potential because of a desire to please and to earn the affection and respect of women.

The rewards of these efforts have usually resulted in material possessions or in power through military might, which led to material possessions.

After a long, long period, these possessions came to be measured by a substance known as gold. This mineral had absolutely no utilitarian value, it was extremely scarce and extremely beautiful. To acquire any quantity of it demanded high spirits, great energy, imagination, determination, courage and all the attributes that we assign to greatness in man.

Throughout time and in all societies, certain types of women were prized above others. To get the most highly prized woman one had to compete with most determined and courageous men. At first it was physical force, later brain power entered into the picture so that a combination of brain power and physical force was able to triumph over force alone.

Early man, whether he acquired more caves, more hides or killed more enemies, was above his fellow in the eyes of most desirable women. Eventually, these successes became to be measured quite incidentally in terms of gold.

Where lay the power of this gold? Of what use was it? It was adored by women. Man has lost his blood for gold. He has expired on the desert and in the high mountains looking for it. But to those who succeeded, gold became the symbol of existence. So gold was a homage of love. As such nothing in the world had higher value—though from a practical point of view it had none. It finally came about to be universally recognized that nothing was more valuable than gold. Gold would buy what the owner wanted, it was the magic medium. Unit values developed and it became the ultimate money. Until this time no Government had monetized it. Once it became the ultimate money, its desirability increased even more. It then came to represent the objectives of the greedy, the power hungry, the vengeful, the philanthropic. Even churches wanted gold. Its base, however, still lay in its desirability, its beauty and its meaning for women. It continues to represent a meaning peculiar to itself. The gold wedding ring has been the universal symbol of love for thousands of years graciously accepted by all young women from maids to queens and eagerly offered by all men from peons to kings.

Today gold has lost none of its romantic luster. To obtain it men continue to perpetrate dastardly crimes, rise to the most heroic heights and are led to the extreme of all emotions—hate, love, fear, glee.

But men will accept token money as long as they know it is as good as gold. Once they doubt that, they will not accept any more. When a government's paper money is not backed by gold, it is not backed by anything.

Trust is the foundation of all money. It is the belief that it will buy goods which are equal in value of the goods which were exchanged for the money in the first place. In earlier times a shoemaker might have traded a pair of shoes for a bushel of wheat. A farmer might have given 10 bushels of wheat for a mule or 10 mules for a house.

Clumsy it was. So a medium of exchange developed—gold and silver. Thus gold and silver were not a symbol of the wealth contained in a mule or a pair of shoes. It was the same wealth. It was wealth.

Then came currency to eliminate the cumbersome of this solid money as exchange. Paper money is not wealth. It is a symbol of gold and silver which is wealth, which was exchanged for a mule, wheat or a pair of shoes. Those who took gold and silver did not need to trust any man. Highway Dept. Assisting More Visitors Daily

AUSTIN — More people than ever before want to know what to see and do in Texas.
Most of them ask—and get the answer from—the Texas Highway Department.
In fact, 46 per cent more visitors were helped by the Department in the first six months of this year than in the same period of 1967.
State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall reported today that travel services rendered to visitors from January through June this year were 502,326. In the first six months of last year, the total was 342,115.
This includes assistance to travelers given at Tourist In-

formation Bureaus as well as inquiries answered by the Highway Department's Austin offices.
Altogether, nearly a million persons have requested and received travel services during the first half-year from the Texas Highway Department.
Comparatively, services rendered by the seven State-line Tourist Information Bureaus which were in operation in 1967 are up 30.4 per cent for the first half of 1968. Included are bureaus at Anthony, Denison, Gainesville, Orange, Texarkana, Waskom and Wichita Falls.
Two new bureaus opened this year at highway gateways in Amarillo and Laredo. The Highway Department also operates the Capitol Information Center in Austin and a special HemisFair center in the Institute of Texan Cultures.
"Each of the Department's

11 centers are operating at near-capacity now during the peak of the recreational travel season," Dingwall said.
"Trained travel counselors greet and assist visitors with their travels in Texas," he said. "Our travel counselors strive to encourage people to see more of our State."
Dingwall said the centers are an important part of the Highway Department's wide range of services and facilities for the highway traveler.
Most of the descriptive literature distributed in response to mail inquiries end by the Tourist Information Bureaus to mail inquiries and by the Tourist Information Bureaus is produced by the Department. An estimated five million pieces of literature have been distributed this year.
Other services also emphasize that "highways are for people."
For example, approximately 1,100 safety rest areas, road-

side parks and scenic turnouts are maintained on the State's 69-thousand-mile highway network.
New safety rest areas on Interstate Highways include comfort stations, drinking water and special Info-sites, which call attention to historical, recreational and cultural resources nearby. Each Info-site also has a dispenser offering free maps to the visitor.
Tourist Information Bureau supervisors also note increasing numbers of visitors are interested in Texas' recreational waterways.
Growing popularity of water sports underlies the Highway Department's boat ramp program with some 170 boat ramps completed, under construction or programmed for construction along Texas waterways.
"All these services are important adjuncts to the prime mission of the Texas Highway Department - providing the

safest most convenient highway facilities possible," Dingwall said.
