2 Sentenced In County Court To Jail Terms

Two men were sentenced to jail terms by Eastland County Court this week. H. C. Cope received a one-year jail sentence on a charge of theft by false pretext and Carl Brattain was convicted on six separate counts of intent to defraud with worthless checks. Brattain was sentenced to a total of six months in county jail. In other action, the County Court fined four, transferred two cases to 91st District Court, and dismissed three charges for lack of sufficient evidence. Paying fines plus court cost for DWI charges were Texaileen Russell, \$100.50; Jerry Don Boles, \$150.50; and M. L. McMinn, \$148.50. Robert Earl Wesley was fined \$150.50 for carrying a prohibited weapon. The cases of Jacob Smith, DWI, and Melissa B. Harrison, liquor violation, were transferred to the district court. Dismissed were child desertion charges against two persons, and a theft by false pretext against another. Assistant County District Attorney Emory Walton prosecuted with Judge Scott Bailey presiding.

Ranger College Announces Evening Class Schedules

The final schedule of evening classes to be offered this fall at Ranger Junior College has been announced by Dean R. B. Golemon. The evening program—new this year at RJC—is designed to allow students who must hold daytime jobs to still get in up to ten hours of college work per semester. Classes in the evening program will meet one night per week from 7 until 9:40 p.m. All classes except P. E. and biology will meet in the newly air conditioned Academic Building. Classes to be offered on Monday evenings include: P. E. 101 and 201 (men's physical education); English 101 (freshman grammar and composition); Government 202 (American national government); and Spanish-100 (beginning Spanish). Classes to be offered on Tuesday evenings include: BA 103 (office machines); English 203 (masterpieces of world literature); Biology 101 (general biology lecture); and Biology Lab 101 (general biology laboratory). Classes to be offered on Thursday evenings include: Art 101 (Life drawing); BA 100T and 101T (beginning and intermediate typing); Biology Lab 101 (gen. biology laboratory); Math 103 (college algebra); History 101 (American history 1492-1865); and French 101 (beginning French). The French course will be offered as a reading seminar for students who desire to acquire a reading knowledge of the French language. Dean Golemon noted that the RJC evening program offers Ranger area residents a new opportunity to get a college education without having to give up their daytime jobs. Students may also register for both the daytime and evening programs in order to get in more hours. Interested students are invited to call Dean Golemon or Mr. Larry Hunt, director of student personnel, for further details. Evening classes begin September 12. Registration is being conducted through the remainder of August and will be opened again on September 11.

Pre-Registration To Continue Thru Aug. 31

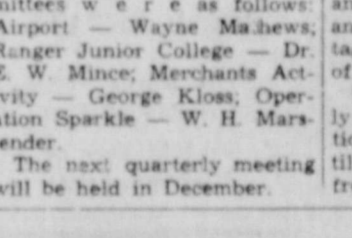

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows: "Section 2-a. NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following: "Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices." If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR1)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six percent (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of money paid into the fund. "Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as provided by law; and provided that the recipient of such pension retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas." "AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas." Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof. Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

AUSTIN—With the Republican gubernatorial convention out of the way, and his Democratic opponent Eggers of Wichita Falls, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, at back to his campaign for started on a round of

meetings with delegates to the State Democratic Convention to see what they want in the party platform.

Smith's 31 meetings with delegates from each of the 31 senatorial districts is an unusual approach to the party grassroots. He is asking the delegates to tell him how he should campaign to offset the growing Republican threat.

Democrats recall that in 1960, when then Vice-President

publican candidate for president, the unknown Republican, M. Steger, got 609,808 votes without even making a campaign. This time Eggers has been campaigning for candidate for governor, Will-months. He has been picking up support from dissident Democrats like Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo and, with Nixon on the top of the ticket again, he is considered a real threat.

Eggers has been making a series of regional bus tours, campaigning in as many as 30 towns in four days, in an effort to duplicate the Smith success with personal campaigning.

During the primary campaign, Smith visited in 225 counties, some of which had never before seen a candidate for governor. This hard work showed up when he won the Democratic nomination easily.

Legislative Conference—Texas House Speaker Ben Barnes will attend the National Legislative Conference in Miami, Florida, Aug. 20-22.

Among the topics to be discussed by the state legislative leaders from all 50 states are bloc grants to states from the

federal government, annual legislative sessions and others concerning the recent problems in state government.

Barnes is president-elect of the conference.

Ag Opinions: Community Action Agencies handling poverty programs may not be under the direction of county commissioners courts, according to an opinion by Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

Opinion notes that under the Texas Constitution, commissioners courts shall deal only with county business and concludes that poverty programs are not within the constitutional boundaries of commissioners court power.

Of the 55 CAAs in Texas, only five are handled through commissioners courts, so the effect of this ruling is not expected to be major.

In another opinion, Attorney General Martin ruled that the governor may authorize spending of federal funds to build a residence for the superintendent of the Huntsville State Fish Hatchery.

Authorization does not constitute an increase in the appropriation but merely authorizes the expenditure of the funds already allocated by the legislature. Martin said the superintendent's house burned after lightning hit it on May 19.

Governor Connally approved spending \$25,000 in available federal funds to build a new residence.

HemisFair Humphrey—Vice-president Hubert Humphrey toured HemisFair Saturday as the guest of Governor Connally and a number of other state and local officials.

Humphrey was scheduled to tour the United States Pavilion, the Institute of Texan

Cultures and the international sector of the World's Fair. At the U. S. Pavilion, the program included remarks by the vice-president, Connally and Cong. Henry Gonzalez of San Antonio.

Humphrey was to meet with the heads of all international pavilions and to end his visit with a special Western Hemisphere solidarity program between the Mexican and Canadian pavilions.

Student Loans: Texas Opportunity Plan—a state program for making loans available to Texas college and university students—has helped 20,121 students since the program's inception in September, 1966.

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System reports that 42,000 loans totaling \$14,698,300 have been made, as of May 1, through 104 participating institutions.

Putnam-Native King's Book
'Dirty Stories' Due Out Soon

NEW YORK, N. Y. — The second book of a Texan born in Putnam, nurtured near Cisco, and exposed to "book learning" in the Scranton Schools will be published this month by New American Library-World Publishing Company.

The man is 39-year-old Larry L. King; the book is entitled "And Other Dirty Stories". But King hastens to add that the book is "a clean book with a trick title." Basically, he says, it contains some thirteen articles he has published in a half-dozen national periodicals during the last four years as well as several new chapters depicting "the perils and pitfalls of the professional writer, the people he has written about, and his association with them—including President Johnson, boxer Sugar Ray Robinson, movie actress Hedy LaMarr, musician Louis Armstrong, writers Norman Mailer and Bill Buckley, Con-

gressmen, and many others." "There's a lot of material treating my early life in Callahan and Eastland Counties," King remarked recently as he relaxed in his Washington, D. C. apartment across the street from Vice-President Hubert Humphrey's home. "You know, I was a farm boy from the Dan Horn Community—rode the bus to school at Scranton, walked to Cisco on Saturdays to take in whatever movie the Palace Theater happened to be showing. That's all in the book." Another chapter in the book is devoted to King's early days in Putnam, "Requiem for a West Texas Town". That article appeared in Harper's some two years ago.

Larry King (They'll remember me in Eastland County as Lawrence", he grins) has published more than 200 articles, essays, and book reviews in national publications. His novel of politics, "The One-Eyed Man", was a Literary Guild Book Club Selection two years ago and received critical acclaim. Now a contributing editor of Harper's, King is the nephew of the late Dr. F. E. Clark of Cisco and of Mrs. John Gilbert of that city.

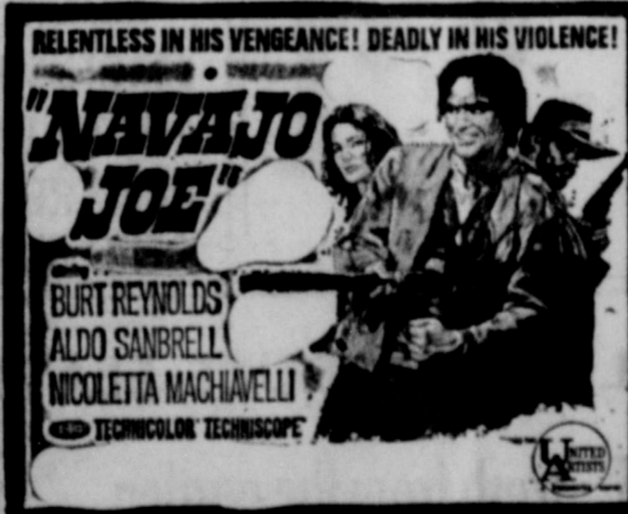

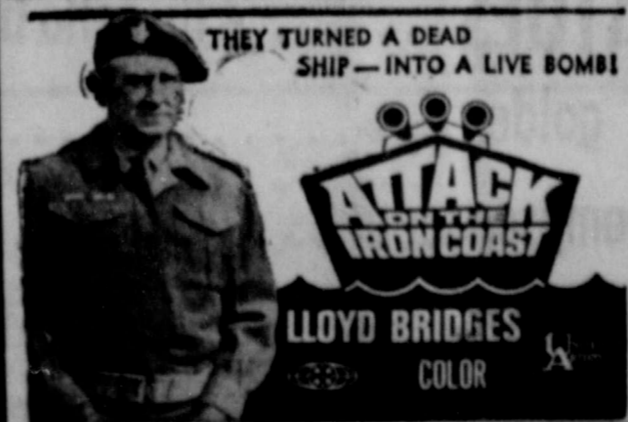
