Season Football Tickets Now On Sale

Football season tickets have been printed and are now on sale in the office of the Superintendent of Schools James R. Clark. There are five home games this year and when bought in advance the five tickets sell for \$1.25 each or \$6.25 a book.

Reserved seat tickets bought at the gate the night of the game will sell for \$1.50 each or \$7.50 for five home games.

Holders of last years season tickets should come by the office of Supt. Clark at once and mark their seats on the chart even though they pay at later day. They will have first choice on the seats until Sept. 3 at which time anyone can buy any seat left.

General admission tickets to adults and those not in public school or college is \$1.25. Public School students and college students will pay 50 cents per game as long as they can identify themselves as students.

The five home games this year are with Eastland, San Angelo, Notre Dame of Wichita Falls, Baird and Glen Rose.

Boone Yarbrough Named Asst. Coach At Trustee Meeting Tues.

The Board of Trustees of Ranger Independent School District met Tuesday night and nearly completed the school faculty and other employees and adopted a budget for 1968-69 that shows no change in the tax rate or no change in the per cent of the taxing value of the land. The rate remains at \$1.50 per hundred dollars value based on 30 per cent of actual value. This has been in effect at the same rate for many years.

Mrs. Zora Lea Hughes tax assessor and collector, presented the tax rolls which the board approved. The rolls showed a tax value of \$5,817,330 or an increase of \$535,140 over last year in taxable property value.

The college rolls, which the regents had already accepted, will be \$5,323,670 or an increase of \$472,450 in taxable property value.

Total tax to be collected is \$140,496.65 based on 100 per cent collections. The public school hopes to collect \$87,259.95 and the college \$53,236.70 which includes maintenance tax and bond tax for the interest and sinking fund. The schools never collect 100 per cent but always over 92 per cent of the rolls.

Boone Yarbrough, former college coach at RJC and former assistant Bulldog coach for many years, was elected as an assistant this year to Coach Charlie Smith, replacing James R. Clopton who has resigned and moved to East Texas this week. The other coach is Tommy Walter who will coach junior senior high football.

Mrs. Martha Sheppard Davis, first grade; Tom Fox Jr., high school custodian; James R. Clopton, coach; Mrs. Olin Odom, primary teacher; Ernest Dempsey, Hodges custodian; Mrs. Esther Bobb, Young School teacher; Melvin Adams, member of the Board of Equalization for the school and college; and Edgar Taylor, collector of delinquent taxes for the school and college.

Sinclair Oil Company was low bidder on supplying regular gasoline to the district for the next twelve months. State laws requires that bids be taken on this large a purchase.

The milk bid of Borden was low and accepted by the trustees for 68-69. Their bid was 7.5c per half pint carton of white or chocolate milk that usually retails for ten cents. The school will sell

the milk for 4 cents when bought other than at meal time and the State will reimburse the district four cents. The price of the milk is subject to increase Borden officials said.

Prices of meals in all schools will remain the same in 68-69 school officials said. Students in Kindergarten, Hodges and Young will continue to pay 35 cents a meal as in the past and extra milks

at recess or at noon will be four cents a carton.

Junior - Senior High students will pay 40 cents for the noon meal again with milk bought extra being four cents.

Meals to teachers, workers, trustees will again be 45 cents since the State does not reimburse any for the meal or extra milks to adults.

Meals to salesmen, outsiders and townspeople will be 75 cents. This is recommended by the School Lunch Division in Austin although not required.

She has a B.A. from McMurry with a major in English and a minor in Biology. She has a Masters Degree in Zoology and has taught at RJC and at Travis High in Austin.

Mrs. Bruce Golemon was elected again to teach the Title I Kindergarten and Mrs. Patsy Helmcamp was elected to teach Remedial work again on Title I at Young School.

Mrs. Betty Kueck of Strawn, was elected to teach music and remedial reading at Hodges. She is now completing work at Hardin Simmons on her Bachelors degree in Elementary Education and has taught one year at Gordon. She will do her practice teaching for nine weeks at Hodges before going on the regular payroll.

Mrs. Arthur Camacho and Mrs. H. R. Tibbels will be teacher aides again in grade one at Hodges, being elected Tuesday night. The following secretaries were elected: Mrs. Gay Bagwell at Hodges, Mrs. Joe Weekes at Young and Mrs. Dorothy Johnson at the Junior-Senior High School. All are paid from Title I funds.

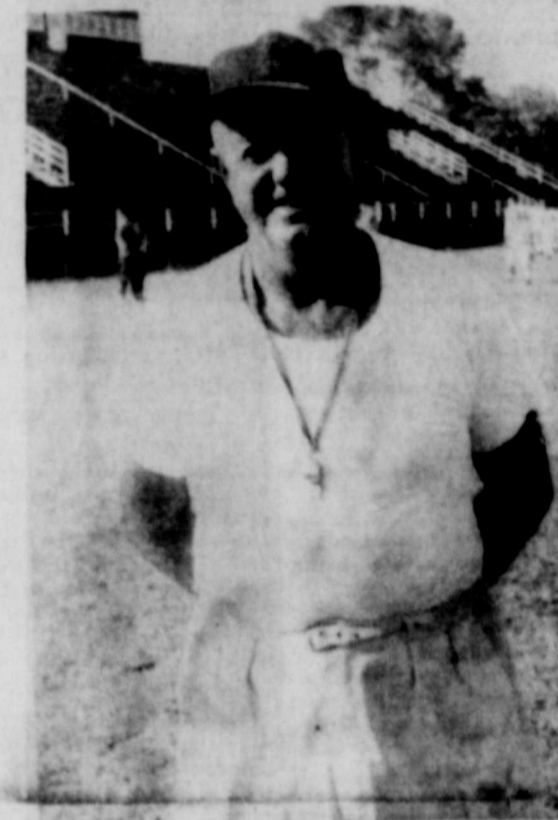

RANGER

County Clerk's Office Is 'Fascinating Place'

TEXAS CONSTITUTION, Article V, Section 20: "There shall be elected for each county, by the qualified voters, a County Clerk . . . who shall be clerk of the County and Commissioner's Courts and recorder of the county . . ."

Johnson Smith, who has served as Eastland County Clerk since 1953, says, "This office is one of the most fascinating places in the world." Then he adds, truthfully, "Even if it is one of the most confusing places in the world to the general public."

The office contains records of many kinds, most of them open to the public "at the convenience of the clerk," according to law. Some records are never open to the public, notably those dealing with juvenile delinquents. The office handles records of any criminal proceedings held in County Court.

Minutes of the Commissioner's meetings are also filed in the office.

Vital statistics; birth and death records, are filed there. (Note: in recent years, many cities keep these records at the city hall.) Marriage licenses and military discharges are there. The fee for obtaining the marriage license covers recording it following the wedding; there is no charge for recording a military discharge.

County Judge Scott Bailey says, "Title to land is only as good as the records which support it." All documents pertaining to land titles are filed in the clerk's office: deeds, warranty, mineral, trustee's right of way, cemetery, deeds of trust, proof of heirship; mechanic and materialman's lien; release of liens, and others.

(Note: the documents pertaining to land or property and marriage licenses are the "Filed for Record" listings found weekly in the newspaper. They are copied from the index record, which lists them alphabetically. Most questions concern the et ux," etc. which follows names. Et UX MEANS and wife"; et vir, and husband; and et al, and the deceased" following other names, and the other. For instance, if John Doe and three of his brothers buy a farm, the document itself contains all names; the document is filed and the key to filing—the index—is listed "John Doe, et al" meaning John Doe and others.

"Proof of heirship" means that, to settle an estate, or to clear title and clarify ownership, the heirs of the deceased person or the representatives of the state must file an affidavit, which is attached to the records of the property in question. The document is filed under the name of the deceased, which leads to the printed listing: "Jane Doe, deceased, et al, to the public, proof of heirship.")

Smith explains, "The index system is designed to help us find documents quickly, thereby giving information to the public quickly. This is a service office. People are welcome to come here to secure information. We are equipped to provide photostatic copies of documents for a fee. However, there is not usually a fee for information, as such which does not require a copy."

Marriage licenses are indexed by the last name both the male and the female; property records are indexed by both grantor and grantee.

As a matter of fact, people do go there for information. Deputy County Clerks are Mrs. Joann Johnson, there eight years; Mrs. Edith McCullough, there nine years; Mrs. Winnie Wright, one year; and Mrs. Gail Dennis, who has worked in the office at different times when she was an Eastland resident.

They help people who need proof of birth date for various reasons; who must have a copy of a deed; who want to check records for genealogical information; who need to have a birth certificate, which is incorrect, corrected.

And, then, some people merely like to "look around," as in a store. Records date back to 1874 and older records, are especially fascinating: one death record lists "cause of death" as "old age and a d g n e r a l softening of the brain." The dead person was 58. Another says of a child: "This child was not ritie since birth." Many times in the older books, the "undertaker" column says, "None called."

The old records give a vivid impression: man is born,

Within the next 2 or 3 weeks, we shall have passed our worst part of summer, and can look forward to cooler fall temperatures. WEATHER TIPS

By JAMES DABNEY
Official U. S. Weather Observer

In this article, we will attempt to deal with two items that are of interest, particularly in the middle of the summer — temperature and rainfall. Actually, we have had a relatively cool summer in Eastland County, as of this writing. We have had only four days of 100 degrees, or higher, temperatures, and these occurred Wednesday through Saturday, August 7-10, reaching a high of 104 degrees on Saturday, August 10th. Since then, the thermometer has not risen over 96 degrees. This was reached Thursday, August 22nd, the day this article was prepared.

And, though it may have seemed hotter to you, due to stillness, humidity, and biting mosquitoes to keep you awake, the highest nighttime temperature so far this summer has been 73 degrees. This occurred on Friday night, August 9th, just prior to the following day's high of 104.

However, you can feel thankful for our "relatively" cool temperatures. Be glad you do not live in, or near, Death Valley, California, at Greenlands Ranch with an elevation of minus 178 feet, because on July 10, 1913, the highest temperature ever recorded in the Continental United States was reached — 134 degrees.

And, for Texas residents, Seymour has the dubious honor of having the highest temperature officially recorded. This happened on August 12, 1936, when they sweltered under 120 degrees of heat. If there are readers who are curious as to the World's highest recorded temperature under standard conditions — well, this occurred in Azizia, North Africa, Sept. 13, 1922, when the natives endured a temperature of 136 degrees — just 2 degrees more than Death Valley's in 1913.

But, so much for heat. Let's talk about something a little more cooling, rain. August, thus far, has only produced 3.53 inches for Eastland. However, we will undoubtedly have more, as the seasons begin to change toward the latter part of the month, and more cool fronts try to push into our area and run into the warm, moist air now present.

Checking back over Weather Bureau records, one finds interesting data relating to rainfall throughout the United States, and the World. Of course, you must keep in mind that there are only about 12,000 official rain gauges throughout the U. S., or an average of about one gauge per 250 sq. miles. The opening through which rainfall enters the standard gauge is 8 inches in diameter, and, if all the gauges in the U. S. were concentrated in one large group, the total catchment area would be about the size of a standard baseball diamond, so consequently, it is almost impossible to actually, and officially, record rainfall from every rain storm throughout the country.

Weather Bureau records show that the heaviest rainfall ever recorded in Texas over a given period of time occurred at D'Hanis, Texas, May 31, 1935, when 22 inches fell in 2 hours and 45 minutes. Now, that's a lot of water. D' Hanis is in Medina County, about 50 miles west of San Antonio. And now, to clarify a discrepancy that frequently oc-

A sparkling panorama of big-name performers will appear in the beautiful new 2800-seat Theater for the Performing Arts and the 10,000-seat Arena from now through September.
