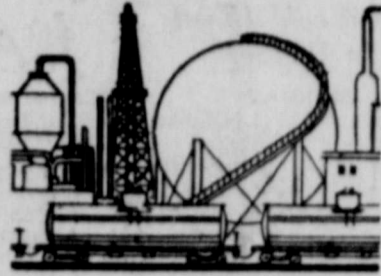

Planning Committee Makes Further Study For New Hospital In Ranger

A meeting was held Friday afternoon in the Ranger General Hospital by members of the Planning Committee to make further plans for a new hospital.

At the Friday meeting, Rod Bell, a representative of the Texas Hospital Association of

Austin, was present to advise the committee on ways to secure a new hospital.

Mr. Bell told the committee that "Hospitals have been changed in the last twenty years, the same as automobiles." The example he stressed was "That you can overhaul a 1958 model automobile and still have a 1948 automobile." This is not the same for hospitals. The standards change from year to year in the hospitals. The local hospital, which was built in 1923, does not meet the standards and

must make changes in order to receive the Medicare Provider Funds.

Several reasons were mentioned for the needs of a new hospital. It was pointed out that the present hospital needs more bathrooms, better electrical facilities, needs a scrub room for the operating rooms, a scrub room for the delivery room, the patient's rooms need enlarging, the ventilation of the hospital needs enlarging, and the elevator in the hospital needs to be larger.

It was also pointed out that Ranger could build a new hospital much cheaper than it could repair or remodel the present plant.

There are several ways in which to acquire a new hospital. Some of the ways mentioned were to raise taxes, sell subscriptions, Hospital Revenue Bonds, or go through the HUD program, and that a fund raising campaign could be started to furnish the necessary equipment for the hospital.

Members of the Citizens Committee will meet with Mr. Bell in Dallas in the near future to see several hospital plans and facilities in that city.

The Ranger Public Schools will open Tuesday morning at 8:30 as usual for their first day of school after observing Monday as Labor Day holiday. All buses will make their regular runs but may be a little early the first day. Supt. James R. Clark said. New drivers have to learn their routes so they will need more time the first day.

All lunchrooms will be open Tuesday.

Lynn Gentry will make his usual bus run in Chaney community on Route 1 in bus number 6. His bus is identified by the children with a red bird decal by the door.

Route 2 on Highway 80 east will be made by Jimmy Ratliff in bus number 3 that has an elephant decal on it for identification.

Route 3 northwest of town will be made by Bob Blair in bus number 4 that has a rabbit on its door.

Route 4 north of town to the Strawn highway will be made by Tom Fox Jr. in bus number 5 with a cat decal on it for identification.

The school will continue to make its usual runs in shuttling pupils from one side of town to a school across town. Newcomers to town should consult their neighbors as to bus to catch and the time.

Mrs. Eva Bobo, Kindergarten Teacher, Resigns

Mrs. Eva Bobo's Kindergarten has been discontinued as of this school year according to Mrs. Bobo who told Supt. James R. Clark that she felt she should stay home with her husband and that she had to "quit" sometime.

The school board in session Thursday night agreed to combine the Tyle 1 Kindergarten with Mrs. Bobo's that wish to attend and have just one class.

A tuition of \$10 per month will be charged for those who ordinarily attend Mrs. Bobo's class. This money will be used to help pay for a teacher aide to help Mrs. Golemon and to pay for teaching supplies that will have to be purchased for the additional pupils.

Supt. James Clark told the board he had tried to find a degree teacher who could operate a private kindergarten like Mrs. Bobo but could not find one. It was then that the trustees decided to combine the two classes.

In order to attend Mrs. Bruce Golemon's class the student must be six years of age on or before next September 1, 1969 and thus eligible for the first grade in one year. Proof of birth is required of new pupils Clark said.

The Kindergarten will be in the mornings only and in the afternoon Mrs. Golemon will work in the Hodges Oak Library as librarian and to encourage students in a reading program.

Parents paying the \$10 will pay at the Hodges Oak office where a receipt will be written. Parents may pay by the month in advance.

Hours of the Kindergarten will be from 8:30 to 11:30 a. m. Parents may pick up their children at 11:30 unless in emergency they need them earlier.

All students in the Kindergarten will have a morning milk break at which time they will go to the Hodges lunchroom where they may buy a 10 cent half-pint carton of milk white or chocolate, for four cents. Students are urged to pay the 20 cents per week for milk on Monday for the entire week if possible although exceptions will be made. They are not required to buy or drink milk if the parents object for any reason. The milk is "just a service" Supt. James Clark said.

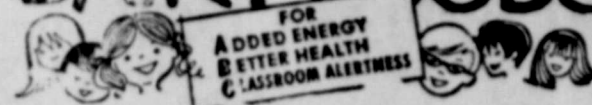

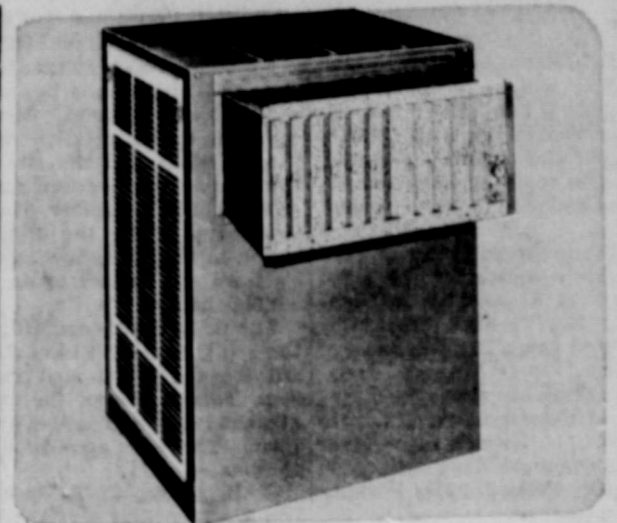

Back-to-School Days Here Again

AUSTIN — Here it is back-to-school time, but for many children and parent's it's "first time to school." Occasionally, the first-time experience can be nerve-wracking, but it is always important. So says the Texas State

Teachers Association (TSTA), which points out that the first few hours, days, and weeks are vital to a child's future in school. TSTA provides the following series of tips and information to help ease the first-time

school experience, and make it more productive. **Registrative Procedure** Any child who is 6 years old on or before September 1 of the school year may be admitted to school. The child's birth certificate must be presented at the time of enrollment. Some schools, in the interest of good health, require the child to be vaccinated against smallpox before enrollment. Also required may be immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, and

tetanus. Other information which may be needed is the name of the father, his occupation, where he works, and his phone number. The name and telephone number of the family doctor and hospital used may also be requested. Also helpful can be the address and the telephone numbers where parents can be reached in an emergency. But such details are only part of the picture, and the parents form an important partnership with teachers in getting the child off to a good start.

How Parents Can Help It will help if the child has opportunities to be away from his mother for short periods before he starts to school.

The child should be taught the safest way home from school. Also teach him to go directly home from school without loitering on the way—and remind him not to go with strangers. Children should learn that policemen are their friends and can give them help when needed.

A child should have definite duties to perform at home, and it will be helpful if he can learn good listening habits. He should get enough sleep. A good breakfast each morning will help start the school day right. So will making certain that he is happy before he leaves for school.

A child should learn to dress himself properly. He should be expected to respect the property rights of others, and should learn to do as much for himself as he is able to do. Habits of promptness, obedience, and respect for authority are also helpful.

Parents should show all interest in what the child has to tell about his work and play at school. Children need to be praised frequently, and to be made to feel successful. They should be encouraged to have playmates.

It is vital for the child to have confidence in his teacher. Remember that your attitude toward the school will be observed—and copied—by the child. Do not criticize school or teacher in the presence of the child. If there is a difficulty—conflict with another child, a difficult activity, a school rule—the child does not understand—take the time to help solve the prob-

lem instead of just criticizing the situation.

To get a child ready for school, begin broadening his horizons even before that first day. Reading good books to him will help, as will taking him to places such as the zoo, park, and library.

Personal belongings of the child should be labeled.

Teachers As The Parents Partners Teachers will help your child experience opportunities for group work and play. They will help him grow in thinking for himself, and becoming interested in the world around him. At school he learns democratic living, and teachers will work to make him feel at ease in his school environment. Early days and weeks help build the foundation for future learning experiences.

Teachers want to learn as much as possible about each child. They are interested in his academic progress, relations with others, self-control, ability to concentrate, and response to suggestions.

The child's readiness for learning is directly related to varying rates of growth—physical, mental, social, and emotional. The teacher attempts to understand these factors for each child by observing his behavior in the classroom and on the playground. But the parent can also help by supplying teachers with this kind of information.

Teachers help develop the child's respect for people and property, self-reliance, dependability, effort, and cooperation. They are interested in his health.

The interest of school teachers and administration in your child is a continuing thing. A child with a cold, sore throat, fever, skin rash, or a sick stomach is better off at home than at school. But a written excuse may be needed when your child returns from an absence.

Also, if a child cannot take part in outdoor play, a note should be given the teacher. When problems of any kind arise, the parent should feel free to discuss them with the child's teacher. But arrangements should be made in advance.

Parents Are Welcome At School As key partners in building the child's future, parents are

always welcome at school. It's better to stop by the administrative office first, where the principal will be pleased with a visit. You may also want to meet the teachers and the superintendent.

When it is necessary to bring a child's lunch or other supplies to school, they can be left with instructions at the school office. Classes should be interrupted while in session except by a call through the school office.

Joining the PTA and attending meetings gives a parent opportunities for meeting school personnel and working more closely with him.

Inspection Time Beginning Again

AUSTIN—The 1969 vehicle inspection period began Sept. 1 in Texas, according to Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"More than six-million vehicles are expected to receive the compulsory inspection prior to the April 15, 1969 deadline," Speir said. Inspections may be performed at any of the almost 5,500 vehicle inspection stations in Texas, each of which displays the official vehicle inspection station sign. Texas law requires inspection of the brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle, steering (including power) not to include removal of the wheel from the vehicle on all motor vehicles registered in the state. Special inspection provisions apply to trailers, semi-trailers, pole trailers or mobile homes having a load-gross weight in excess of 4,000 pounds.

The minimum fee is \$1.75. This does not include the cost of repairs or adjustments necessary to enable the vehicle to pass inspection.

Speir said the new vehicle inspection sticker will be a two and one-half inch square replica of a DPS patrolman's badge with red background. Motorists are urged to have the 1969 inspection performed as soon as possible to insure that their vehicles are mechanically safe for fall and winter driving.

Dove Season To Open Sept. 1st In This Region

Mourning doves in good supply are expected to be found by hunters as the new season begins for this region on Sunday, Sept. 1. Good rains most of the year produced a good supply for the birds.

Statewide, the dove crop was believed to be about 12 per cent less than normal. Locally, the birds were more plentiful recently than now due to late feed crops here. The doves have been migrating to areas where fall grain crops are already ripe.

Shooting hours will be from 12 noon (CST) to sunset. Daily bag limit is 12 birds with a possession limit of 24. Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than ten gauge. Hunting doves with rifles is prohibited. The season ends Oct. 30.

A hunting license is required unless you hunt in your home county. New hunting and fishing license are required after Aug. 31.
