

(Continued from page 1) half to an inch in diameter. Planting seed gives you a better root system, he believes, and your production will begin sooner by two or more years. Nursery trees lack all of the important tap root, he added. Water planted trees the first year or two, he said.

Smith's orchard includes peach and apple trees that are being replaced with pecans as the fruit trees die out.

This country produces good peoches and apples, he said, adding "you have about three days to market a peach crop when it ripens as compared with several months for pecans, and your fruit yields is not nearly as dependable."

Smith believes that the Comanche pecan, which was developed by Louis Romberg at the U. S. Pecan Experiment Station at Brownwood, is the best for this region. It is a large, round papershell pecan with a delicious meat and it does well in dry years.






