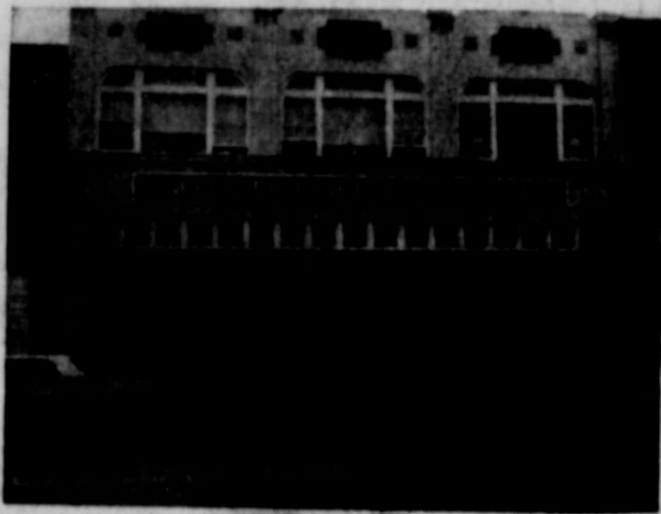

Wards Celebrating 40th Anniversary



Montgomery Ward of Ranger, the largest one-stop family department store between Abilene and Fort Worth, is celebrating its 40th anniversary of service to people of Eastland and surrounding counties.

It was in November, 1928 that the store was established at 407 Main St., occupying what is now the dry goods and housewares department. Three years later, the building was enlarged to accommodate the hardware and automobile supplies as well as the office. In 1966, the adjacent building, formerly Mission Garage was acquired and converted into the present automotive service department.

An extensive repair and remodeling program has been in progress during recent months. Under the supervision of Manager George Kloss, the catalogue order department has been provided with additional space and accorded a separate identity. Fluorescent lighting and paneling have added much to the appearance of the furniture and appliance departments.

The upstairs area of the tri-level building is now the bargain floor and also houses the office and credit department.

The company may well point with pride to the fact that there have been 66 store-wide weekly increases in business compared to only eight decreases in 74 weeks. The store enjoyed 35 consecutive weekly increases with only two decreases since July, 1967.

Manager Kloss attributed the consistent sales increases to a determined effort on the part of the store's 25 employees to improve facilities, merchandise and service, nor are they content with present status. They plan to continue seeking ways and means of expanding and improving the service. Already there are plans for further remodeling as they begin the fifth decade.

A host of satisfied customers are wishing for the "Big Store" a "Happy Birthday" and many prosperous returns.

Additional State Sales Tax Begins Oct. 2nd

Local citizens start paying an additional penny on the dollar in sales taxes on purchases on Wednesday, Oct. 2, as the one per cent increase voted by the Legislature last summer takes effect.

The state sales tax rate will be three per cent but many citizens will be paying four per cent as 304 Texas cities also levy a one per cent sales tax locally. This group includes Cisco and Ranger in Eastland County.

Also taking effect Wednesday will be an increase from the present two per cent to three per cent in the auto sales tax — just in time for consumers who have been captivated by Detroit's 1969 products. This adds about \$30 to the price of a car.

With the increase in effect, the state sales tax starts at a penny on purchases of 17 cents. In cities with local sales taxes, the breaking point is 13 cents. Vending machine sales of 16 cents or less are exempt.

In cities without a local sales tax, the rate is one cent on sales of 17-49 cents, two cents on sales of 50-83 cents and three cents on sales of 84 to \$1.16.

Where local taxes are in force, the rates are one cent, no sale of 13-37 cents, two cents of purchases of 38-62 cents, three cents on sales of 63-87 cents and four cents on purchases of 88 cents through \$1.12.

The Legislature did not change the exemptions from the tax, which are the same for both state and local taxes.

Ranger shoppers are reminded that, beginning Tuesday, Oct. 1, merchants will collect 4% State of Texas and Local City Tax starting on sales of \$13 or more.

Bulldogs Face Notre Dame, (W.F.) Here Friday With 8 p. m. Kickoff

The Ranger Bulldogs will host Notre Dame — of Wichita Falls here Friday night, with an 8 p.m. kickoff.

The Bulldogs battled the Bobcats of San Angelo Subversity to a 20-20 deadlock in Bulldog Stadium here Saturday night.

The first quarter found both teams battling it out defensively as the Bobcats took the opening kick-off and moved the ball down to the 39 yard line in 13 plays before the Bulldog defense could hold.

With 4:37 left on the clock before the first half, San Angelo intercepted a Bulldog pass on the 28 yard line and returned the ball to the four In ten plays San Angelo scored on a two yard drive by full-back Robert Steeley. The extra point try failed as the half ended.

The Bulldogs received the second half kick-off. Tom Fox III was the man of the night for the Bulldogs as he took the kick on about the 15 yard line and raced 85 yards for the first touchdown for Ranger. Ranger quarterback Bill Watkins gave to Fox for the two point conversion which put Ranger in the lead 8-6.

Ranger again took possession of the ball on their own 36 yard line. Quarterback Watkins again hit Fox with a 56 yard pass and ran play for the touchdown. Watkins' try for extra point failed.

Midway in the third quarter, San Angelo's Sammy Gonzales intercepted a Ranger pass and raced 65 yards for another touchdown. Stanley Howard ran to the right side of the line for the tying score at 14-14.

With 4:28, Angelo's Howard handed to fullback Robert Steeley as he hit the middle of the Bulldog line for 6 points. The extra point try failed and Angelo led 20-14.

Late in the fourth quarter the Bulldogs began throwing the long passes. With 1:20 left in the game, Watkins called for the option play. He handed to Fox as Fox hit Armandi Raper with a 31 yard TD pass. Renteria tried for the game-winning point but the kick was blocked. The game ended 20-20.

Other outstanding players besides Bill Watkins and Tom Fox III, who had 215 yards rushing, were Brad White, Gene Bilby, Roger Rutledge, Larry Williamson and Johnny Graham.

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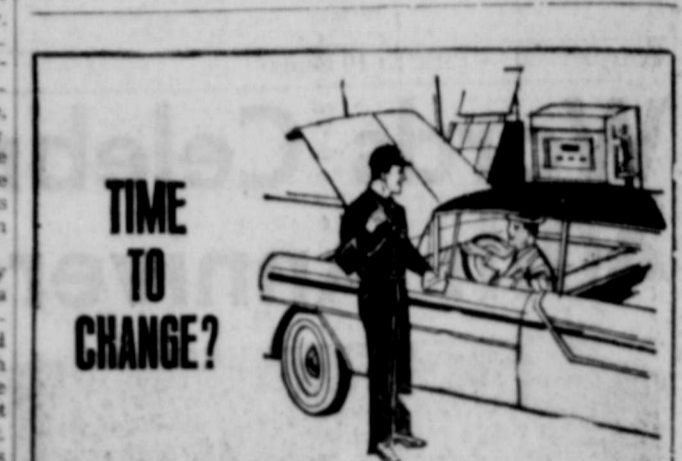

Fire Prevention Week Observance Is Urged

Chief Authur Camacho and Jack Cozart, director of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, have urged county citizens to pay attention to the observance of National Fire Prevention Week October 6-12.

He asks that everyone develop good fire safety habits by taking care with matches, smoking, good housekeeping to rid the home of rubbish, proper use of electrical appliances and extensions, etc., the chief said. He said, "Fires killed more than 12,200 persons and cost more than \$1.7 billion in the last year."

Cozart said the fall and winter months are the most vulnerable times of the year for fires. "When fire occurs on farm or rural property, damage is three to six times greater than in the city fire," the Farm Bureau president added.

The Farm Bureau has two programs designed to help cur-

tail fire losses. The county Farm Bureau, in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau, sponsors the attendance of local volunteer firemen to the annual Firemen's Training School each summer in College Station. More than 600 firemen have attended under Farm Bureau sponsorship during the past six years.

The state and local Farm Bureaus also pay \$75 to fire departments for fighting rural fires on Farm Bureau insured property.

In addition to these programs, county Farm Bureaus sponsor a graphic 45 minute fire prevention demonstration. More than 100 were given before schools, civic clubs and other groups by the TFB Safety Department during the past school year. Also, almost 20,000 fire extinguishers have been sold to Farm Bureau members as a continuing program of rural fire protection.
