
# Area digs out after storm

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



## Social Security in Castro County

By TERRY J. CLEMENTS

If you change jobs frequently, you probably will want to know if your earnings from different employers have been correctly entered in your Social Security record.

To find out, the first thing to do is to request Form SSA-7004PC (Request for Statement of Earnings) from any Social Security office. Complete it, mail it back, and in a few weeks, you will receive, free of charge, a statement of your earnings covered by Social Security.

This statement will show:

At your request, the statement can also show the number of quarters of coverage you have earned. If you are close to 62, it will also show a benefit estimate provided you asked for it.

Social Security recommends that every worker check his or her eaarnings record about every two or three years to be sure his or her earnings have been reported. It is very important, expecially for workers who change jobs often, to employment income was earned. verify if their earnings have or have not been correctly reported or cre- limit to report errors in his or her dited under their names and Social record, corrections may not be pos-Security numbers.

If an earnings statement shows that earnings have not been correct-

ly reported, the Social Security office will help to correct the record. It is advisable to take with you your W-2 form or other evidence showing your earnings for the year in question. Because of the time required to process earnings reports, the statement may not include earnings for the year immediately preceding the current year.

There is a time limit to correct a worker's earnings record. By law, the correction can be done at any time up to three years, three months and 15 days after the year in which the wages were paid or a self-

If a worker was past the time

There are some exceptions, however, for revising the earnings record after the time limit has passed. Some of these exceptions are to correct a mechanical, clerical, or other error; to correct an error in crediting earnings to the wrong person or the wrong period; to correct an entry established through fraud; to add wages paid in a period by an employer who made no report of any wages paid to the worker in that period and others.



lizer is needed to attain a desired yield goal, then its use is strongly recommended, says Ralston. Not fertilizing or reducing fertilizer rates may result in yield levels which will not generate enough income to cover basic production

On the other hand, direct savings can result when a soil test indicates that there are already adequate or near adequate levels of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium or other nutrients to attain a desired yield.

In either case, following soil test recommendations can effectively reduce the per unit cost of producing a commodity and increase the chances of making a profit, says

Of course, a good fertility program can only insure optimum

yields when other conditions affecting crop yields are favorable, adds Mr. Ralston. A good plant stand, adequate moisture, good physcial condition of the soil, and insect disease and weed control are all important in obtaining profitable returns from money invested in fertilizer.

Crop producers who have not yet made a final decision about which crop to plant on which field should submit soil samples now and request fertilizer recommendations for several cropping alternatives per soil sample. This information can be helpful in making final cropping decisions, notes Ralston.

## Planted cotton acreage is lower than expected



In many families, rituals develop or arise with the coming of children. Rituals are important not so much for what is said or done, but the results they yield, the sense of "we - ness" that grows out of a shared experience and the feeling of rightness that comes from repetition.

Rituals differ from family to family. Commonly, rituals are thought of only around holidays or special days. However, rituals need not be limited to these occasions. Families that have strong ties have more frequent rituals - for example, a special meal on Sun- one. days. These times are often described as "the way our family is."

Some people feel that today's

busy life styles work against family rituals. But strong families maintain their rituals to provide the sense of continuity, understanding and love that strengthens family closeness. Set aside some time when the family is together and make a list of your rituals. Ask "what do we do that has special meaning to us?" "What do we do over and over again that makes each of us feel good?" "What do we do that is a special memory of our family?" How did the ritual start?
