

Labels should be read before storing for any special requirement for storage. Some pesticides have warnings about low temperature storage and other require-

"Empty" chemical containers can be a source of danger All remnants of chemi cal should be dumped into a deep pit dug in level soil and located to avoid contamination of water.

Large containers such a drums or barrels should be washed thoroughly and rinse water buried. Drums and barrels should be returned to the supplier or sold to a firm which can neutralize the toxicity of the chemicals.

Last week I read of a tragdy that occurred at Dunning. ruska, on June 29, 1968 empty pesticide barrel purchasd for \$2 was instru-mntal in the death of one boy and the serious illness of two others.

It was a hot Saturday after oon on June 9, 1968. The three boys - Byron Milleson, 6; David Copp. age 7; and Kurt Saner, age 6-were running through the sprinkler in the Milleson yard. The boys decided the new tresh barrel could add to their fun. They olled it into the yard and filled it with water. Since the parrel belonged to the Millsons and the play was in their yard, Byron spent more time in the Barrel. David and Kurt took truns jumping in the barrel with Byron. It is believed the boys play-

ed in the barrel 30 to 45 minutes. Two and one half hours later Byron got sick and was taken to the hospital. Later the other two boys got sick. The label on the barrel was nutilated and could not be ead. The original contents of the barrel were not known, but a similar barrel was located. Then it was discovered that the barrel had contained parathion and that atropine

Atropine was administered to the boys. It was too late for Byron but the other boys recovered after a serious ill-

This is a sad but true story The parents of Byron Milleson have consented to its use with the hope that the information will in some way pre-vent similar accidents involving pesticides and empty con
