Farm Bureau Elects Officers, Conducts Business at Meeting

The Eastland County Farm Bureau annual Convention was held October 7, 1968 at the first Christian Church annex.

Speakers for the event was Wayne Little, Organization Director of the Texas Farm Bureau.

Visitors welcomed were: Liz Leveridge, 1968 Eastland County Farm Bureau Queen; Ann Boney and George Sims, students sponsored by the Eastland County Farm Bureau to the 1968 High School Citizenship Seminar.

Resolutions adopted by the convention were: We recommend, Farm Bureau continue to support trade development corporations programs and that they include peanuts in it, also that Farm Bureau continue to support loan for peanuts as low as one is needed.

We believe our sample shelling machines should be calibrated in accordance to a sample of peanuts shelled by hand. This pattern of hand shelling, one sample, and adjust machine to do equal work.

### E. F. Harrison Elected Leon Soil Supervisor

E. F. Harrison was elected Supervisor for the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District in Zone 5, at Gorman Tuesday evening.

Mr. Harrison, an active conservationist for many years, succeeds Mr. C. M. McCain who has served 10 years.

Mr. Harrison farms and lives between Desdemona and Gorman where he is active in farming and ranching.

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District was created by local landowners some 27 years ago. It was created by and for local

people to work together in stopping erosion by wind and water and in improving land resources.

The program and plan was developed by local people and put into operation by local landowners and operators in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service.

All of our natural resources, soil, water, and plant resources were getting away at a rapid rate, and agriculture, as a way of life, was at a low ebb in this area.

Solving the problems of water and wind erosion, flood damages, no conservation equipment, poor roads, livestock water needs, farm credit, and other physical, economic, and social conditions, have resulted in stable soil, increased yields upstream watershed projects, increased land values, better roads, electricity for rural areas and a more stable farm and ranch income.

Much credit is due the local people and their leaders particularly members who served so unselfishly on the District Board for the many accomplishments. Services rendered by board members, who serve without salary are largely responsible for the success of the district.

The stage is now set for almost unlimited growth and development in future years. The District has goals and objectives looking to participation and involvement off all people in conserving and developing all natural resources for the prosperity and happiness of all people in this area. In other words we are looking forward to improving not only the physical resources but also to improving and developing human resources.

Upstream watersheds, treatments to hold soil and water on the farms, and more than 100 flood prevention structures to prevent floods downstream are a goal for the entire area.

Approval of a five county resource conservation and development project is a major goal for this area. It will involve needed industry to supplement farm income and help require participation and help by business and professional people along with landowners and operators.

Goals to have every landowner and operator of farms and ranches as a District Co-operator with a whole farm plan for developing and maintaining soil, water and plant resources is another major objective for this area. Other goals and objectives are to work with schools, 4-H Clubs, FFA Chapters and Boy Scouts to the point that conservation is taught in every grade and its importance understood by all youth. Essay contests, land and grass judging, conservation demonstrations and other encouragements are a regular part of each year's plan and activities.

To do these things and to continue growth and development, your local soil and water conservation district depends upon participation, service and involvement on the part of people throughout the district.

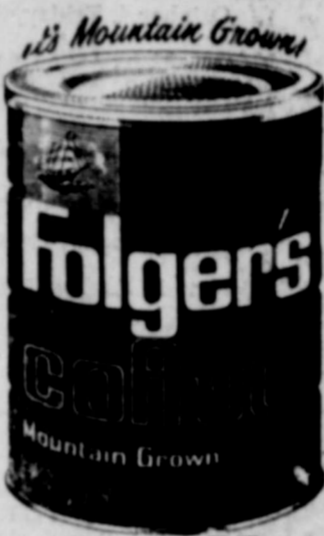

Congratulations to Bobby Williams of Gorman and Kathy Kincaid of Eastland. They are both state winning 4-H members. Bobby was judged state winner of the 1968 4-H Leadership Award. He will compete with other state winners for scholarships. Kathy was named a Santa Fe state winner and will receive a \$500 scholarship. She received the award because of excellent 4-H work in several areas. Both Kathy and Bobby will receive an expense paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress to

be held in Chicago Dec. 1-5. It is an honor to have a 4-H member win state in an awards program. It is very unusual and a high honor to have two from the same county. There are only 35 state winners from among the 254 counties in Texas who go to the National 4-H Congress.

As I travel around the county, I see many chemical containers, some are empty and some are not. I don't think

everyone realizes the danger involved with these chemical containers.

Labels should be read before storing for any special requirement for storage. Some pesticides have warnings about low temperature storage and other requirements.

"Empty" chemical containers can be a source of danger to humans, livestock and wild life. All remnants of chemical should be dumped into a deep pit dug in level soil and located to avoid contamination of water.

Large containers such as drums or barrels should be washed thoroughly and rinse water buried. Drums and barrels should be returned to the supplier or sold to a firm which can neutralize the toxicity of the chemicals.

Last week I read of a tragedy that occurred at Dunning, Nebraska, on June 29, 1968. An empty pesticide barrel purchased for \$2 was instrumental in the death of one boy and the serious illness of two others.

It was a hot Saturday afternoon on June 9, 1968. The three boys — Byron Milleson, age 6; David Copp, age 7; and Kurt Sauer, age 6 — were running through the sprinkler in the Milleson yard. The boys decided the new trash barrel could add to their fun. They rolled it into the yard and filled it with water. Since the barrel belonged to the Millesons and the play was in their yard, Byron spent more time in the barrel. David and Kurt took turns jumping in the barrel with Byron.

It is believed the boys played in the barrel 30 to 45 minutes. Two and one half hours later Byron got sick and was taken to the hospital. Later the other two boys got sick.

The label on the barrel was mutilated and could not be read. The original contents of the barrel were not known, but a similar barrel was located. Then it was discovered that the barrel had contained parathion and that atropine was antidotal.

Atropine was administered to the boys. It was too late for Byron but the other boys recovered after a serious illness.

This is a sad but true story. The parents of Byron Milleson have consented to its use with the hope that the information will in some way prevent similar accidents involving pesticides and empty containers.
