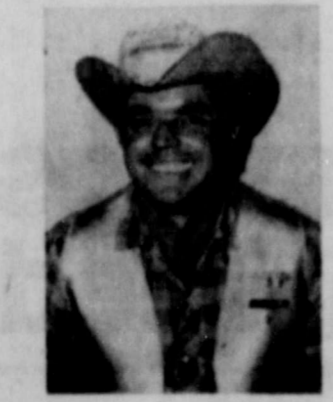

Ranger Again Assigned To District 10-A

Ranger has again been assigned to District 10-A Athletic conference for two more years according to a notice received this week from the Texas Interscholastic League in Austin by Supt. James R. Clark.

The same schools will be in 10-A. They are Ranger, Albany, Baird, De Leon, Dublin, Glen Rose. This is for the two school years after the present one, 1968-69.

Supt. Buddy Dulin, now chairman of 10-A, will organize the new district and draw up rules probably at the close of the present football district and new officers will be elected.

There are 32 Class A districts in Texas. This number allows a State Playoff to be conducted with no Open dates.

Class A schools have an average membership the year previous of 115 to 225 in the upper four grades. Ranger has about 185 average. AA schools range from 225 to 450. There is practically no chance that Ranger will ever leave Class A competition, Clark said.

Assignments of schools to Austin by enrollment in the upper four grades, geographical location of the school and arranging schools in such a manner as to have 32 districts.

About the only changes in the entire state is where the schools have been consolidated or new schools formed in the larger cities. Schools must compete in their own conference and may not be voted into a higher conference. In only a few cases may a school be allowed to change from one district to another and the U. I. L. must approve these rare cases.

'Law And Order' Is Key Point In Governor's Race

"Preston Smith said in August he detected a 'definite backturn' in crime. Ten days after he made that statement the Texas Department of Public Safety reported crime increased 15 per cent the first six months of 1968 compared with 1967. The report said a major crime is committed in Texas every 90 seconds.

"It's important for political leaders to become aware and fully informed about the crime problem."

"We're never going to reverse our upward crime trend!" Mrs. Bulgerin said. "without an awareness of the problem and unless we all become concerned and support steps to improve law enforcement."

4-H Club Youths Lead Way In Ag Program

The 4-H Clubs of Texas and the United States have just completed (Oct. 6-12) the celebration of their special week, National 4-H Club Week. The role of Texas in the National and International 4-H Club program is unique in that 4-H Club work found its beginning here.

In Jack County, Texas, a Jacksboro newspaper publisher, Thomas Merrivether Marks, discovered that youth could lead the way in expanding the Agricultural program. Mr. Marks turned to youth after a corn contest and show in 1907 had failed with only 3 entries. He organized the Corn Clubs of Jack County with one hundred and eleven boys participating. They were told how to grow corn according to the latest recommendations. As a result the 1908 Jack County Youth Corn Show was a great success.

From this sprang thousands of Texas Corn clubs. Soon thereafter girls were encouraged to grow tomatoes, can and sell them as a Canning Club project. This program exploded across the state. These two movements were the beginnings of Texas and National 4-H. An organization that has grown from a messenger one hundred and eleven members in one county in one state to 3 million boys and girls in 50 states. World-wide membership of 4-H is over 5 million boys and girls. The basic organization of 4-H is on the county level. Eastland County has approximately

250 4-H club boys and girls enrolled. A large number of these boys and girls live in rural areas; however, more than one-third of them live inside city limits. The changing face of 4-H is toward a larger urban membership with projects that can be conducted in the limited space that is available in cities.

Explaining Amendment

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution which will be explained weekly in order in which they will appear on the official ballot to be voted Nov. 5. These analyses are intended to be unbiased.

Amendment No. 1 — Relating to the Employees Retirement System of Texas and revising existing provisions concerning the management of the retirement, disability, and death compensation fund for officers and employees, and the administration of the system.

ARGUMENTS

For — In the modern concept of employment, pensions are

an absolutely indispensable complement of wages. As they are earned and contractual in nature, not free gifts, it is important that public employees have confidence in the perpetuity of the retirement system. By establishing the Employees Retirement System of Texas as a constitutional agency, as proposed by this amendment public employees will have greater assurance that the administering agency will be a permanent one.

2. Adequate safeguards for funds available for investment are included in the proposed amendment. However, under its terms, it is still possible for the Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System to place funds where greater returns on investment can be realized.

Against —

1. The Employees Retirement System of Texas is already a statutory agency. As the Board of Trustees of the

Employees Retirement System and the State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund now have constitutional status, it is not necessary that the agency be given this status also. There is no need to lengthen an already bulging Constitution by adding non-essential provisions that can be effectuated by statute.

2. The broadened investment authority granted the Board of Trustees whereby

stocks of companies within the United States may be purchased with money from the Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund is largely a technical change in that the Board already has comparable authority. It is authorized to purchase the same securities that are now or may hereafter be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or the Permanent School Fund.
