

Tuley said that up to now neneficiaries were asked to notify the Social Security Administration on postcard forms pre-addressed to one of six social security payment centers throughout the country. Beneficiaries received the postcard forms when they in itially applied for monthly They should now line through that address on the cards) and insert "Box 3258, Abilene, Texas 79604"

"This change in reporting methods will reduce the time needed to change addresses and process other information having an effect on payment of monthly benefits. This is now possible due to the increased capacity of social security district offices to transmit the information over high speed communications circuits to payment centers," Tuley
