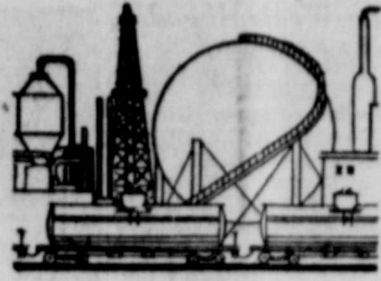

RJC Squad Goes to Cisco for Season's Final Football Game Saturday Night

The football teams of Cisco and Ranger junior colleges will meet for the second time this season in a conference game at 7:30 p.m. Saturday at Chesley Field in Cisco. They met earlier in the season's opener at Eastland's Peanut Bowl with Cisco winning a 32-16 game.

The game this week will be the final home game for Cisco and the season's finale for Ranger. The Wranglers go to Denton next Thursday night to end their 10-game schedule with the NTSU freshman team.

This week's game is expected to be a hard-fought affair with Cisco as a slight favorite on the basis of their season's records. The Rangers, however, have shown marked progress in the late season games and they are expected to put up a hard fight.

The Rangers are coached by Kenneth Pair with Brodie Campbell and Ronald Butler as assistants.

Probable starters for the Rangers were listed as follows: Ends, Searcy Anderson, 195, and Robert Jackson, 185; tackles, Joe Slaton, 220, and Max Rowlett, 195; guards, Bob Thacker, 205, and Larry Farmer, 195; center, Joe Senear, 200; quarterback, Gary Chandler, 195; halfbacks, Bill Cherry, 160, and Larry Quast, 165; and fullback, Jack Martin, 195.

Twenty-one members of the Ranger team — all sophomores — will be playing their final game for RJC.

Cisco's probable starters were listed as follows: Ends, Johnny Harrison, 195, and Clarence Jackson, 200; tackles, Gene Weber, 225, and Monte Kreis, 205; guards, Bobby Lara, 190, and Bruce Haynes, 255; center, Dewey Walker, 235; quarterback, Ronnie Bell, 175; halfbacks, Calvin Hinderman, 175, and Lloyd Sutton, 185; and fullback, David Burnett, 180.

2 Injured In Tuesday Crash Near Eastland

Two Granbury men were in Eastland Memorial Hospital Wednesday morning as the result of a car-truck crash west of Eastland Tuesday afternoon. Investigating Patrolman Bob Rivers reported a 1967 Chevrolet driven by Randy Vernon Ables apparently struck the left rear of a 1964 Ford Truck driven by William Lee Thomas of Ranger, while the auto was believed to have been passing. After the initial impact, the automobile, which was a virtually demolished, turned over several times.

Both Ables and a passenger in his auto, George Kenneth Holt, also of Granbury, were injured, with Holt having one of his feet pinned in the wreckage of the auto for some time. Both vehicles were eastbound at the time of the crash, about 4:45 p.m., about two miles west of Eastland on U.S. Highway 80.

The condition of the two Granbury men was described as serious at the hospital Wednesday. Thomas was uninjured.

Damage Suit Settled; 2 to Split Costs

A damage suit was being tried in 91st District Court in Eastland this week was settled out of court just before a jury was to have been given the case for deliberation.

Terms of the settlement reportedly are that Dr. R. R. Wells and Marlin Cagle of Eastland each pay one-half of the damages to building owned by O. D. Dillingham, of Abilene and Dallas.

Automobiles driven by the two men collided and one went on to crash into the Dillingham Building.

Dr. Wells of Whiteface was substituting for a local physician at the time of the incident.

The jury was due back in at 10 a.m. Wednesday to hear the charge and render a verdict in 91st District Court in a damage suit which resulted from an automobile collision which also damaged a building on West Main St. in Eastland last year.

The suit, which began Tuesday, is styled O. D. Dillingham (owner of the Foremost Building) vs. Dr. R. R. Wells, et al. Dr. Wells was driver of an automobile which was in collision with a vehicle driven by Marlin Cagle at the intersection of West Commerce and Green Sts. last year. The Cagle automobile went on, and crashed into the Foremost Building. A suit, filed in Deaf Smith County by Dr. Wells, naming Cagle, was transferred to this county on a plea of privilege and made part of the other suit.

Approximately \$1,300 in damages is being sought in the suit.

Testimony was heard Tuesday and charges were drawn Tuesday afternoon. Serving on the jury are Ethel Layne, Raymond Fox, C. M. Gibbs, M. S. Dry and Robert Kincaid, all of Eastland, S. G. Clary, Lynn Echols, Mrs. Bill Cardwell of Cisco; and C. A. Dawson, Nolen Butler and W. T. Eaton, all of Ranger.

COUNTY PECAN TREES DAMAGED IN BIG SNOW

The unexpected snow last week even caught nature unprepared, County Agent De Gordon said. Thousands of pecan trees in the county were severely damaged by the snow. Gordon said pecan trees that were well cared for, were still in full foliage. The dense green foliage caught the falling snow, causing many limbs to break.

The county agent inspected orchards owned by Earl Walker of Cisco, C. T. Barton of Pioneer and C. E. Smith of Rising Star. Severe limb breakage was found in all three orchards, he said. Ice caused much limb breakage to these same trees last winter.

Barton said if it had snowed for one more hour last Friday, it would have completely destroyed his large Burkett trees. Some broken limbs were estimated to have an eight inch diameter.

Most of the damage in Smith's orchard was done to young trees. Seventy-five per cent of the limbs were broken, Gordon estimates. Smith said it would take three years for his trees to replace the tops broken by the snow.

Gordon said several others had reported similar damage to their trees. Several large limbs were broken on the pecan trees around the courthouse.

The county agent said that normally a killing frost will cause the leaves to fall before it snows. The snow did not damage trees that had already lost their leaves.

Surviving are one son, J. T. Wilson of Eastland; two daughters, Mrs. J. R. Murray and Mrs. Gardner Harris, both of Eastland; 11 grandchildren, 14 great-grandchildren and a host of nieces and nephews.

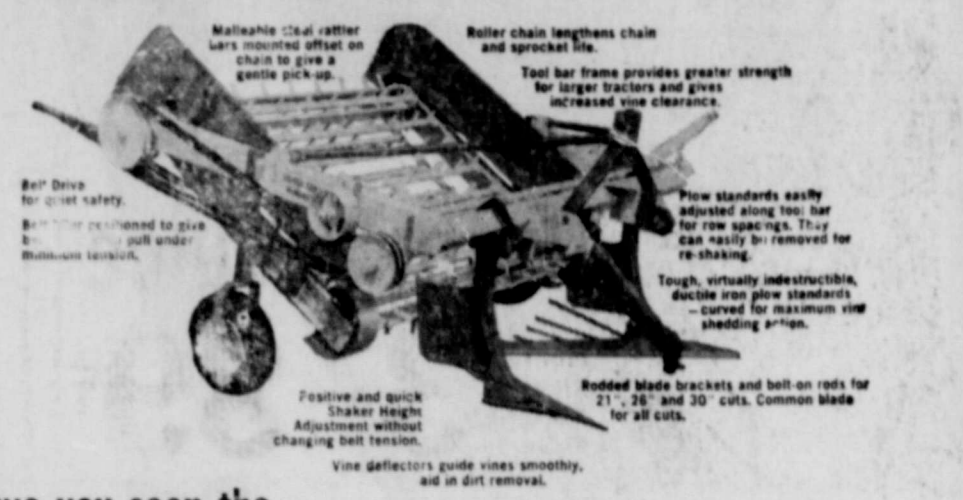

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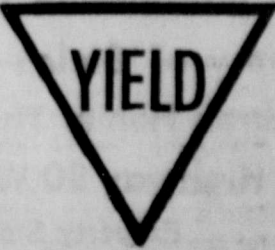

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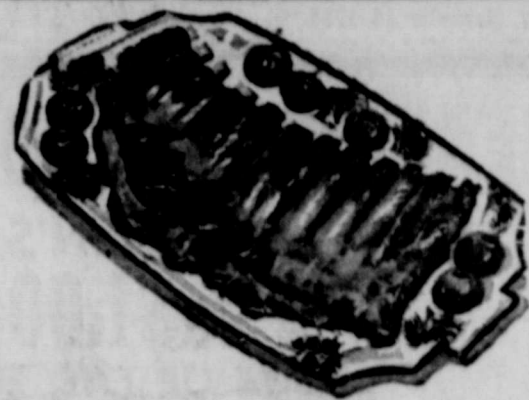
