## Mrs. J. Speer Named Sec. of Ranger Schools

The Board of Trustees of Ranger Independent School District met in regular session Tuesday night in the office of Supt. James R. Clark and elected Mrs. Jerry Speer as secretary and bookkeeper for the administrative office.

Mrs. Speer recently moved here from Snyder where her husband was pastor of a Baptist Church. A son, Jessie, is a member of the Bulldog "B" football team and a daughter, Rebecca, is a cheerleader in the junior high school.

James W. Battle was employed to do custodial work at Hodges School.

A lot was sold to the highest bidder, Harvey Franklin. The lot has been advertised for sale for a month and only one bid was received.

James W. Childress, Boone Yarbrough and Mrs. Adaline Meredith were named Census Trustees for the January census. All are principals.

Clark told the board that next spring the teacher must select new textbooks in Chemistry 2, Drawing 7 and 8, Language and Grammar for grades 1-8, Dictionaries 3-12, Vocal Music 8, Literature 7 and 8, Spellers for grade one, Plane Geometry and Latin.

Fifteen teachers were appointed to the selection committee including the three principals and Supt. James R. Clark.

Clark read minutes of the Band Booster Club for their past two meetings to the trustees.

Discussion was held on employing a collector for delinquent taxes and action is expected to be taken in December on this matter.

An itemized list of bills to be approved from the Consolidated Application Fund was gone over and approved. The Athletic report and bills for October was also approved as was bills for Local Maintenance and Transportation Funds.

Financial reports were given on all recent football games as well as luncheon financial reports for October and luncheon menus for three weeks.

The tax collector's report showed \$14,981.25 was collected in October for school taxes for Ranger School District plus \$550.95 in delinquent taxes and \$79.83 in penalty and interest for late payment. Total collected was \$15,612.03.

But even bouncing back from a great season has its disadvantages — this will be a rebuilding year for RJC, and with only two sophomores on the squad, Coach Ron Butler looks for some closer scores this year. There won't be as much danger of some of the games turning into track meets.

## UIL Rule Limiting Students To One Major Award Is Unchanged

The University Interscholastic League rule limiting a student to only one major award costing not more than \$20 during his high school career in any one school has not been changed Supt. James R. Clark said today.

There has been discussion that the rule might be changed but the UIL Legislative Council met November and did not bring the matter up for a vote. Therefore, the rule still stands that an athlete, band member, golfer or other high school competitor cannot receive but one major \$20 award in his four years in high school.

Ranger High School has not made any decision as to when the major award will be given.

## Game To Be Played In Coleman

Ranger High School officials met with the officials of Goldthwaite in Coleman Saturday morning and decided on a site for the Bi-District Play-off between the Ranger Bulldogs and the Goldthwaite Eagles.

The game will be played in Hufford Stadium in Coleman Saturday, Nov. 23 at 7:30. Tickets for the game will go on sale Wednesday morning at the Superintendent's office. Tickets will be \$1 for all public school students in advance, \$2 for any reserve student or adult seats and \$2.50 at the gate, it was announced.

The stadium will seat 4,200 and Ranger will occupy the East side of the stadium. Coleman School will handle all details for the game, including the concessions, parking of automobiles, ushering, furnishing the game balls and taking care of the ticket sales.

Dallas officials will be used for this Bi-District game.

The Ranger Bulldogs proved Friday night at Dublin they were truly the District Champs as they kept their record clean by defeating the Lions 20-13. It was the last district game for eight Bulldogs, all seniors. For the past three years Bill Watkins, Johnny Graham, Johnny Cantwell, Bobby Sipes, Floyd Parks, Lewis Webb, Armando Renteria, and Brad White have participated in district play for the Bulldogs.

Armando Renteria, one of the safetymen for the Bulldogs, took the opening kickoff on his own 12-yard line and raced to the Dublin 29 before being hauled down. On

the first play of the game, Quarterback, Bill Watkins gave the ball to Brad White, who scampered around left end for the first touchdown of the night for the Bulldogs. The extra point conversion by Tom Fox III was good and the Bulldogs got a quick lead 7-0.

The Lions were not to be forgotten about as they raced 44 yards in six plays to set up their first score as fullback, Bobby Hickey, powered over the line from the one for the score. Billy Don Evans kicked the extra point to tie the score.

With power plays and end swipes both teams fought to a 7-7 tie to end the first half of play.

After intermission, Dublin came back into the game with "blood" in their eyes. The Lions received the kick-off on the 32-yard line and used Hickey and Mark Humphries to put the ball on the Bulldog 46. A sneak play by quarterback David Humphries took the Lions in for another TD to put his team ahead 13-7.

The Bulldogs then took the kickoff on Fox to dig up the necessary yardage in six plays as he ran over the right side of the line for six yards and a touchdown. Fox kicked the extra point to give the Bulldogs a 14-13 lead.

Mid-way of the final quarter Bill Watkins used a keeper play to the right side of the line for 11 yards to score the last TD for the Bulldogs. The point after attempt by Fox failed to go through the cross bars. The Bulldogs had a seven point lead as Dublin took to the air deep in Bulldog territory. The Lions were trying to out-manuever the Bulldogs as Humphries threw a pass, only to be intercepted by the Bulldogs.

The Bulldogs failed to make the necessary yardage and were forced to punt. Dublin had a first and ten on the 35 yard line and on a fourth down situation fumbled the ball on the 46 yard line. With time running out the Bulldogs had moved the ball down to the Lion 19-yard line and threatening to score again when the final whistle blew.

# THE GORDON SPOT

The surprise snow on November 8 gave some much needed moisture. Not everyone benefited from the snow however. It is pretty discouraging to look at some of our best pecan orchards in the county. The weight of the snow broke so many limbs that it looks as if a tornado hit the orchards. Only the well managed orchards received damage since they were the only ones that were still in full foliage. Leaves had already fallen from those trees where insects and diseases were not controlled. Little or no damages were done to these trees. Of course it is necessary to keep the foliage on the trees as long as possible to expect a good crop of pecans next year.

This could be a most critical fire season for range and forest fires. We have a large amount of grass and vegetation this fall. Abundant rainfall during the growing season produced a large quantity, and since the frosts this vegetation is like a tinder box.

Especially will this be the case with low humidity and high winds during the Thanksgiving period when folks are cleaning up around the home for Thanksgiving.

Carelessness with trash burning around the house is a major cause of fires, particularly between November and February. Trash around the home should be disposed of in a fire-safe trash burner.

Hunters as well as land owners may be interested in making agreements for leases for 1969 seasons before the hunters leave the farms and ranches this season. We have a new fact sheet "Leases for Hunting" which discussed provisions of a hunting lease. This publication encourages the use of a written agreement and helps to make individuals aware of some of the important elements of hunting lease agreements.

In addition to this we have some hunting lease forms for both seasonal leases and day or weekend hunting or fishing

The peanut yield in the county continue to look very good. Several more farmers have told me their yields are best they have ever made. Not only are yields high but peanuts are grading extremely high. I've heard of several dry land farms that averaged over 60 bushels per acre and irrigated farms that averaged over 90 bushels.
