

office. This could be a most critical fire season for range and forest fires. We have a large amount of grass and vegetation this fall. Abundant rainfall during the growing season produced a large quantity, and since the frosts this vegetation is like a tinder box.

Especially will this be the case with low humidity and high winds during the Thanksgiving period when folks are cleaning up around the home for Thanksgiving.

Carelessness with trash burning around the house is a major cause of fires, particularly between November and February. Trash around the home should be disposed of in a fire-safe trash burner.

The peanut yield in the county continue to look very good. Several more farmers have told me their yields are best they have ever made. Not only are yields high but peanuts are grading extremely high. I've heard of several dry land farms that averaged over 60 bushels per acre and irrigated farms that averaged




