





The Chairman explained that the program to be voted on is essentially the same as When marketing quotas are in effect, price-support loans are available at not less than 75 percent of parity as of Aug. 1 -the beginning of the market-ing year. Under quotas, too, marketing penalties apply to "excess" peanuts of growers who exceed their acreage

allotments. If more than one third of the growers voting oppose the quotas, the loans available to growers who plant within their acreage allotments will drop to 50 percent parity, and no quotas or penalties will apply to the 1969 peanut crop. In such event, another referendum would be held next year on quotas for the following three crops peanuts.

"These are the same dates for the cotton referendum," the Chairman said, "and those producers who have both peanut and cotton allotments will get ballots for voting in each of the referendums."
