Buster Mills Inducted to Football Hall of Fame

They all agreed, those who were honored and those who were in Breckenridge to help honor — the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame is an excellent idea and Breckenridge is the logical location.

The Hall of Fame became more than wishful thinking Monday night, it became reality when five of the greatest prep stars in this state's history were installed as members. Four of those enshrined were there for the occasion and the fifth was represented by his widow.

For old time football fans the names of the honorees brought back memories of a golden past. These were the men who as youths in the 1920's helped get high school football in Texas off in the direction which has brought the Interscholastic League program in the Lone Star State to the number one position in the nation today.

What student of Texas High School football hasn't heard of Clarence (Blue) Smith, Buster Mills, Boyce Magness, John Drew (Boody) Johnson or Leo Baldwin? Now those names will never be forgotten, for they have been permanently inscribed as the first of many high school stars who will eventually be inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame.

Claude (Chena) Gilstrap, athletic director of the University of Texas at Arlington, summed up the general attitude of those present about Breckenridge being the logical location for the Hall of Fame. "I know of no place where high school football holds the place of honor that it does in Breckenridge, Texas. This is indeed the Cooperstown of high school football," he declared.

Blue Smith, who led Cleburne to the state championship game in 1921, called his honor "one of the nicest things that ever happened to me." Then he quickly added, "I'm glad it happened in Breckenridge."

Leo Baldwin, who scored all but one touchdown on the great 1923 Wichita Falls team, said that football "... taught me that you just don't quit." He predicted the Hall of Fame "would grow to greatness."

Buster Mills, Ranger High School's all-around great in 1926, called the Hall of Fame an inspiration for all high school players.

Breckenridge's own Boyce Magness, super-star on the state championship team in 1929, said simply, "I thank all

of you good people for this privilege."

Mrs. John Johnson accepted the plaque for her husband, who died in 1967. She did so "... with great humility and great pride." Boody Johnson was a standout on the 1922 Waco High state championship team.

Harold Ratliff, retired sports editor of the Associated Press, introduced Blue Smith and Leo Baldwin. Ratliff has been championing Breckenridge as the logical location for the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame since 1962 and he along with Putt Powell, sports editor of the Amarillo Globe, who talked of aims and goals of the organization at Monday night's banquet, have been credited with local back-

ers as being the two men most responsible for the dream come true.

Eck Curtis, former coach at Breckenridge, Ranger, Highland Park and the University of Texas, introduced Mills and Pete Shotwell, famed Breckenridge and McMurry College coach, introduced Magness.

Dave Campbell, sports editor of the Waco News Tribune, introduced Mrs. Johnson.

Bill Whitmore, sports information director at Rice University, was master of ceremonies for the event. Bill Creash, president of the Association, welcomed visitors and Jake Sandefer introduced guests. The benediction, following a minute of silent prayer, was led by Ross Elliott.

Bulldogs to Test Clifton In Quarterfinals Friday

Ranger Bulldogs will meet the Clifton Cubs Friday night in the Quarterfinal playoff at 7:30 in Paul Tyson Stadium, Waco.

The game Friday night will be the second time the two

clubs have met in the Playoffs. Clifton defeated the Bulldogs last year 19-9 to knock them out of the playoffs.

Clifton can throw the ball adequately, but its running game that makes them strong.

The Cubs have two outstanding offensive players, according to a report. They run Wayne Preshler and Billy Helms off tackle most of the time, the report stated.

The Bulldogs will be in top shape for Friday's encounter with Clifton after several of the team were hit with a virus last week.
